THE BERGER COMPROMISE TO DATE

The chief delense Comrade Berger and his Milwaukee supporters now make for advising Socialists to support a capitalist candidate, is to quote alleged foreign examples. The Socialists in Germany, Italy, France, have always done such things, so it is claimed by Berger. You are all ignorammes for making such a fuss. If you only knew it, we in Milwaukee are quite in line with universal international factics.

Berger in his latest defense even quotes Marx and Liebknecht, but is careful to go back to 1850 for his quotation from Marx and to 1881 for Liebknecht's words, though the latter wrote his "No Compromise" nearly 20 years later.

It really doesn't matter to us what they did or do in Europe. Our only question is, What does our own constitution declare? On this point, there has been an attempt made by the defenders of Berger to ignore the provision which has been violated and to quote one which has not. No one claims that the Milwaukee comrades refrained from making nominagions in order to favor the capitalist candidate. That is not at all the clause in the constitution which we claim is violated and it is quite beside the point to

THE LAND OF MYTH AND LEGEND

The newspapers published recently a dispatch announcing that Georgia, a Russian province in Transcaucasta, was in a state of insurrection, which called for the proclamation of martial law. The things that are happening there will, I think, be of interest to American Socialists. They sound romantic and are worth telling.

Few Americans know anything at all of Georgia of today. Most of them have heard a great deal of what was going on there 5,000 years ago. For it is the land of Golden Colchis whither the Argonauti directed filer asteruturous quest, and from which Jason carried off the golden fleets. There the fire-breathing bulls of Vulcan turned the furrows into which Cadmus sowed the serpent's teeth and resped a harvest of armed men. Into this country were driven from Olympus the primitive race of Pelasgi. There, ou an Island off the coast, was located by the poets the palace of Autora where in were kept up the perpetual dances and songs of the hours, and where the son was daily reborn. Such was Georgia when the world was in its Infancy. How about Georgia of today?

The Socialist propaganda, in making, its rounds among the peoples of the world, rousing them with the call: "Awakel Arise! The day is breaking?" has also come to Gouri, a district in the province of Georgia, Transacuazais. How the call was heard by the peasants and how they answered it is a atory worthy of some romancer. I can give only have facts.

Among the tribes of Gouri we find, the pureat type of the Caucasian-rax Tall and slender of stature, with raven black hair and burning, caressit eyes, the men of Gouri have become famous for their valor and the wome for their beauty. The Georgians date their history back to the year 240. C and their recorded struggles have furnished subjects for song and ato to many poets and romancers. But since the last hundred years the Russi tyrant held Georgia under his iron yoke and, while he did not break it spirit-of the Georgians, he impoversibed them as he did all others of a toiling subjects. The peasants of Gouri differ from all other peasants Russia in their high native love of freedom. Besides there are few filteratia in Gouri. The economic conditions under which they live do not diff from the conditions found in other parts of Russia. The peasants own one-tenth of the land and are compelled to rent arable land and pastur from the great landlords. The condition of the peasant partakes still of character of servitude, as he is bound to render many services to the land off. In addition, the great amjority of the peasant pseuvity in ded.
