ination of the progressives. Many of the progressive candidates were men of brilliant talents and national reputations. But the landslide mowed them down just the same. In Illinois Raymond Robins, who felt certain of election to the United States senate, ran third. Albert J. Beveridge, of Indiana; Pinchot, of Pennsylvania; Murdock, of Kansas all went down to defeat. Everywhere (except in California) the progressive party seems to have been a bad third. New York, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, Indiana, Illinois, all tell the same story, while Wisconsin, which is the home of the original progressive movement, has witnessed the almost complete elimination of the La Follette progressive forces.

Thus the radical reform movement, represented by the progressive party, seems to have utterly failed. The reactionary forces have weathered the storm of the spasmodic outburst of two years ago and are everywhere crawling back into power.

What are the people to do now? What remains?

Socialism and the Socialist party remain. Its program is as clear,. logical, rational and constructive as ever. Its membership is slowly but steadily growing. And its voting constituency is withstanding the shock of every imaginable sort of attack, strategy and landslide, holding its lines intact across the nation and for the most part making steady, sure gains.

The field is clearing for the final fight between plutocracy and the people,-between the many and the few,-between capitalism and Socialism.

The future is ours!
