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TOT MEETING with success in their efforts to split the unity of the maritime unions through maneuvers across the conference table in carrying on negotiations, the shipowners are making use of the frame-up in a desperate effort to weaken and divide the waterfront unions.

The Point Lobos murder frame-up, engineered against the militant leadership of the Marine Firemen's Union and crudely attempting to involve the Communist Party, is calculated to turn the waterfront workers away from their militant leadership.

The statement by District Attorney Warren that "this is not a case against union labor, but rather one against certain murderous racketeering individuals who have forced themselves into a position of power," is inspired by the shipowners in futherance of their aim to drive a wedge between the leadership and the rank and file of the unions.

In this, too, the shipowners stubbed their toes. Up and down the Pacific Coast maritime unions and shoreside unions, immediately on hearing of the arrests, passed resolutions denouncing the move as an odious frameup and demanding the release of the arrested workers.

Seeing this healthy, class conscious reaction of organized labor to the attempted frameup, the capitalist press steps in with long, hysterical editorials denouncing the protest movement.

The "liberal" NEWS actually went as far as to call for a repudiation by the longshoremen and organized labor generally of the statement of the I.L.A. publicity committee which terms the maritime workers' arrest a frame-up! NAZIS PLAN TO DROWN EUROPE IN SLAUGHTER

Anti-Soviet Slanders Are Smoke Screen For Hitler

MOSCOW.-Adolph Hitler is preparing events which will bring Europe closer to slaughter, Soviet Union newspapers stated, concerning recent violent attacks against the Soviet Union in the Nazi press.

Pravda, Communist Party organ, called the anti-Soviet slanders "a provocative campaign of preparation for new foreign political adventures.

"It is just a smoke screen for Hitler to spring a new surprise which is demanded by his venturesome program.

Fascist War Plans "German Fascism, armed to the teeth, is preparing for new slaughter in Europe."

Nazi preparations for war are sending workers to the verge of food shortage and eventual starvation, said Pravda.

CHICAGO. - "This Exhibition of Sadism Wouldn't Have Happened In Red Russia," was the caption over a six-column picture layout of the public hanging of a Negro in Kentucky, printed in the Chicago Defender, influential Negro newspaper.

"Here can be seen part of the crowd of more than 20,000 bloodthirsty whites who came from miles around Owensboro, Ky.. to witness the public 'legal lynch ing' of Rainey Bethea, 22 years old, accused slayer of a 70-year old white woman," said the Defender.

FRENCH C.P. **GIVES SPAIN** AID SLOGANS

Thorez Outlines Fight For Defense Of France

PARIS.—With the outcome of the struggle between forces of Fascism and democracy in Spain today of immediate vital interest to France and to the French People's Front, Maurice Thorez, general secretary of the Communist Party of France, spoke at a mass meeting of Paris Com-

munists on August 6th. Part of his speech, outlining the Party position, follows:

Critical Situation "We are in a serious situation, from the internal viewpoint as well as internationally. Reaction in France is striving to oppose the progress towards which our people are moving. Things abroad have taken a serious turn.

"In Spain, there is a rebellion of the privileged classes and the plotters against the republic, against universal suffrage. There An overwhelming majority of is intervention-open or hypocritical—by the German and Italian Fascists, who have hired and are arming the traitors to their country supporting General Franco. This makes the Spanish situation a grave international problem.

"In this situation the Communist Party speaks to the people and to the country. It gives out its correct slogans for the French Front, against the enemy at home and abroad, against Fasbeen too much for the Fascist in our country, for the defense of the republic and the security of our country.
"The Communist Party alone

had the merit of putting clearly the question of struggle against Hitler, after the March 7thcoup de force. "We said: 'No confidence in

B. and found an empty bunk in a small focs'le, where seven men slept. The mattress was like a hatch-cover. Saw a fan on the bulkhead and wen to turn it on by a switch and the one small light went out.

One of the sailors told me that to have the fan on, you had to screw the bulb-out and plug the fan in. Some fun, eh?

Then I went into the washroom, and it brought me back to the time I went on a farm for a visit when I was a kid. That backhouse on the farm and the toilet" on the U.S.A.T. "Scotts burg" are the same.

Stand in Line to Shave Then I had to pack my water in a bucket from midships to the washroom. I decided I needed shave and looked around for mirror. CONDITIONS OF TRAWLERNEN

Welsh Worker Tells Grievances In Cardiff

By a Worker Correspondent.

CARDIFF, Wales-Although I am a trade unionist, the section of marine workers that I belong to are absolutely unorganized and little or no attempts are beunions to recruit them.

I refer in the main to the trawlermen. There are many difficulties to overcome in efforts to organize the trawlermen. For example, in the Cardiff trawlers it is just a kick in the pants between talking about getting organized and getting the sack: Immediately our "well meaning" and patriotic bosses get the wire that anyone is talking about the trawlermen's need to organize, then the gangway is greased for the departure of the person who has had the temerity to want the men to stick out for

their rights. Our grievances are many, but I will give a few points here:

Grievances of Men Firemen work 6-hour watches (12 hours per day), trim their own coal and pull the ashes up from the stokehold with a piece of rope. Deckhands work all hours, they seem to be always turning out and never sleeping, many a day they hardly have five hours off.

Engineers and officers are not much better off than the rest of he crew. The cook works 15 for 21 hours—not even the scanhours a day in a galley you ty rations of beans, coffee and the Spanish fascists and for the couldn't swing a cat around in. Longshore Work

When a trawler docks, the deckhands must "turn to" after hard day's work and unload the cargo of fish. This work keeps them busy all night and robs them of a chance of a night at home in bed. Should anyone fail to "turn in," he is fined a pound (\$5). This is illegal, but to complain about this matter means the severing of connections for all time with the trawler owners.



Any amount of well cooked left-over meat and the Green gang. They are givtwice or even three times that amount of cold boiled potatoes, a fair sized onion, chopped fairly fine, and a little pepper and salt. You put it in a skillet, slightly greased, and then you leave it lay, and don't you stir it. The fire should be very low and it must take a good fifteen minutes to brown. You can burn it much quicker, but finally got off. let's have it browned.

In the old South, they make cornbread exactly as they please; sometimes an egg goes in it, and sometimes it doesn't. You can bake it in the oven or you can cook it on top of the stove in a frying pan over an easy fire. This is about the way you do: You take a cup of cornmeal and a half a cup of flour, a half a teaspoonful of salt, three even teaspoonfuls of baking powder, and a cup of milk (or milk and water) and three tablespoonsful of melted shortening or cooking oil. If you have sour milk use that and use onehalf teaspoonful of baking soda, and only two teaspoonsful of baking powder. MENSTRUAL PAINS

SHOULD like to get your opinion of the advice a doctor gave me.

I suffer very severely every month with ramps. My doctor proposes an operation o di'ate the mouth of the womb.

As an alternative to this she suggests giving a radium treatment to stop menstruation ompletely, and cramps also, of course. Are such treatments at all common and suc-

ANSWER-There are so many causes of mentrual pains and so many different forms of reatment, that each

case must be treated by tself, according to the indings. It is therefore mpossible for me to say pecifically what sort of reatment you should nave.

I can say that both he dilation treatment and the radium treatment are used frequently in cases that show that they should be so

Causes

Painful menstruation, or dysmenorrhea, may

be caused by any of the infections and tumors that affect the pelvic organs. If this is the case, THE police raid on the Futan which of course only an examination can deter-University (Shanghai), in mine, the pains will probably continue until the pelvic disease is cured.

Where no other disease can be found, generally changing to a more healthy mode of living will clear up the condition causing the cramps. It is interesting to note that among women who engage in vigorous labor under healthy conditions, letter which appeared in "Au mentsrual cramps are almost unknown.

Most important is to get plenty of exercise, out of doors if at all possible. This should be carried on even during the menstruation and not stay in bed as so many women do. For women that are unable to follow some outdoor sport. the following exercises have been devised for sufferers from the cramps.

1. Floor Polishing-Kneel on "all fours." Swing right arm with elbow stiff, through a semi-circle, as if polishing the floor, reaching as far forward and as far back as possible. Repeat swing ten times with each arm.

2. (a) Bending—Stand with feet apart, Stretch arms above head, bend forward and touch ground with knees straight. Return to first position. Repeat slowly eight times,

(b) Twisting-Stand with feet apart. Stretch tions of the dormitory. Without arms to side on level with shoulders. Twist trunk round until right arm points directly backwards. Twist again until left arm points direct-

ly backwards. Repeat vigorously ten times. (c) Swaying-Stand with feet apart. Stretch which to increase their purchas- of intimidation, finally forced arms above head. Sway body and arms to right,

3. "Rowing"—Sit on floor with knees straight and feet pressed against wall. Lean forward and No strangers are allowed on Later, it was found out that touch wall with knuckles, allowing knees to bendslightly. Repeat rhythmically twenty times.

4. Right to Left and Left to Right-Stand with feet apart. Swing right arm up as far as possible. Bend down, bringing right arm over, and touch left foot. Repeat six times. The same with the left arm and right foot.

5. Floor Patting-Kneel, sitting back on heels, Maui we immediately went to band, she did however succeed Twist body and tap floor with both hands four. times on left side. Kneel upright. Twist body and repeat tapping on right side. Repeat eight.


