

PROPOSED CONSTITUTION.

Of the Socialist Party of Cook County.

Below is printed a copy of the proposed new constitution of the Socialist Party for Cook County.

At the last meeting mentioned above, a mass of correspondence and reports was handed in. Among these was one from the Twenty-eighth Ward proposing an amendment to the proposed constitution.

ARTICLE I.

Section 1.—This organization shall be known as the Socialist Party of Cook County, and it shall be part of the Socialist Party of Illinois.

ARTICLE II.

Section 1.—The County Central Committee shall be composed of two (2) delegates from each Branch.

ARTICLE III.

Section 1.—The Executive Committee shall be an administrative body of the Socialist Party of Cook County.

ARTICLE IV.

Section 1.—The County Central Committee shall be composed of two (2) delegates from each Branch.

ARTICLE V.

Section 1.—All active members of the Socialist Party residing in a Ward of the city of Chicago or in a district in the County shall be eligible to vote.

County Central Committee, provided it shall give at least five (5) days' notice to each delegate.

ARTICLE VI.

Section 1.—All active members of the Socialist Party residing within the limits of a primary district of a ward in the city of Chicago, or those residing in a town or city in a district outside of Chicago, shall constitute a club.

ARTICLE VII.

Section 1.—A district in the meaning of this Constitution shall be composed of a group of wards.

ARTICLE VIII.

Section 1.—The County Central Committee shall be composed of two (2) delegates from each Branch.

ARTICLE IX.

Section 1.—The County Central Committee shall be composed of two (2) delegates from each Branch.
