GERMANY.

In the application of the science of medicine due regard must be paid to the body with all its complexity, a co-ordination of the physical forces of which is so essential to the welfare of the whole, and therefore we must adjust our therapeutics so that it may affect the mental, physical and moral.

THE CLASS STRUGGLE.

Magazine writers have recently made the astonishing discovery that our present government is a government by interests. Socialists made the same discovery nearly sixty years ago. They are nevertheless glad that at least the truth of their statement is generally recognized.

Our National Congress is made up of representatives of the railroads, telegraphs, express companies, coal mines, breweries, lumber companies, and the other great industries that have the nation for their field of operation.

To be exact, it is not the industries themselves but the owners that are so represented. There are occasional disagreements as to how these owners shall use the forces of government. These disagreements are always much less important, however, than the fundamental agreement that the power of government—national, State and municipal—shall always be used in the interest of the capitalist class, whenever the interests of that class as a whole need governmental help.

Each of these interests keeps a lobby, whose business it is to see that the members of these legislative bodies do the work of their masters. These lobbies serve the same purpose that watchmen, detective agencies and supervising officials serve in the shop and factory.

It is rather silly, however, for the working class to send down a lobby to influence capitalist legislators. It is almost as foolish as it would be to send a committee from a union to direct the management of industry, while the capitalist still has legal possession.

When workers elect their own men to legislative bodies, then they can send their own committees down to tell what they want done with the certainty that their requirements will be granted.

The remarkable thing about this matter is that these representatives of capitalist interests were all elected by working-class votes. There are not enough votes of any other kind to elect them.

The workers are beginning to wake up to this fact and are proposing to elect members of the Legislature that will represent working-class interests. In nearly all European countries there are many such representatives of the interests of labor.

American workers are just beginning to realize the necessity of electing representatives of their own class to make the laws under which the working-class must live. In Illinois and Wisconsin there are a few such representatives to-day.

The capitalists are frightened at the prospect of the working-class waking up and electing its own representatives to legislative bodies. They are trying by every possible means to keep the laborers deceived.
