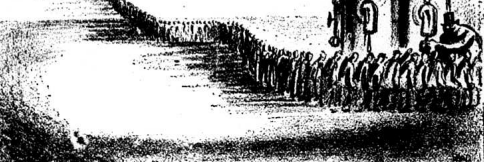
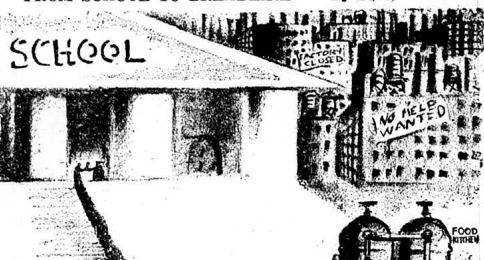

Revolutionary Role of Shop Nuclei

(Extract from remarks delivered to the YCL Plenum by Comrade Brown of the Central Committee of the Communist Party)
Why must the Party and YCL be built on the basis of shop nuclei? For the simple reason that the capitalist system concentrates masses of workers inside factories, where they work collectively; because it is there that the workers are exploited; it is there that, while working collectively, the benefits of their work don't go to them but to the owners; because there is the place of struggle between the working class and the capitalist class. Because of the daily struggle because of the continuous exploitation there, the workers become class conscious. The most advanced on the basis of the teachings of Marx understand that the working class because of its position in the capitalist system as the producing class, must become the class that will build up the socialist society.

YOUNG WORKER
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Reduction A La Hoover
Or How to Increase Arms While Reducing Them and Showing Pacifist Illusions

LAST week, every capitalist newspaper in the country came out with screaming headlines to the effect that president Hoover had proposed a two-thirds cut in armaments. To the young workers who are not accustomed to looking behind the curtain for body of the dead rat whose stench can be smelt up in front, the "Young Worker" offers the following facts for consideration:

- 1.—Under the terms of the Hoover proposal, admitted by Washington officials, Great Britain would have to scrap 130,000 tons of cruisers, Japan, 77,000 tons of cruisers, but the United States would be allowed to BUILD 33,500 tons of cruisers and 9,950 of aircraft.
2.—The United States offers to scrap 165,910 tons of destroyers but it is admitted by Washington officials that the United States has 189,000 tons of ships which are so bowed with old age they could be sunk with a pea shooter and which will be scrapped anyway.
3.—On the basis of 1 soldier to 650 citizens, which is what Germany is allowed under the peace treaty, and what Hoover proposed in his plan, the United States would be able to increase its army from 140,000 officers and men to 190,000.

This should indicate just where the dead rat lies. It should indicate also just how the bosses try to take the smell of burning powder out of the air by filling it with such hypocritical "peace" stench as this. "Peace plan, my eye! It's a war plan!"

New York "Young Worker"
A Fearless Blow at the Sectarian Isolation of the League in New York City

THE New York District of the YCL in discussing the question of really beginning to smash through the stone wall of isolation which holds the League away from the young workers, has come to the conclusion that one of the best methods of doing so is through a proper utilization of the YOUNG WORKER in every day tasks of the units.

A drive has been started to raise \$1000.00 by that date. It means a much more increased circulation. If all forces are mobilized behind the drive, it means that the New York District will have taken the first step in fearlessly breaking through the isolation in which the League is today. The Central Committee of the YCL greets this step forward on the part of the New York District, and pledges its utmost support to the NEW YORK WORKER.

Y. C. L. PLENUM DISCUSSION
Meaning of Stalin Letter for Our League
(Toward the Bolshevikization of the League)

Some months ago, Comrade Stalin wrote a letter to the editors of the YCL, in which he criticized the "Proletarian Revolution" a Bolshevik theoretical magazine. In this letter, Comrade Stalin severely condemned tendencies of rotten liberalism which had expressed themselves in the ranks of the Bolshevik Party. There showed themselves in a liberal tendency to remnants of "left" Luxemburgist and semi-Trotskyist ideology. The letter demanded an increased vigilance on the theoretical front, and a sharper struggle against all right and "left" opportunism. It pointed out that Leninism (the theory and tactics of the proletarian revolution), arose, grew and became strong in a relentless struggle against all opportunism of every shade.

Importance of Letter
The letter of Comrade Stalin is of tremendous importance to the entire revolutionary movement. Today, when war is already on in the Paris East, when the masses are becoming more and more revolutionary, the danger of opportunism is especially great. It is precisely at this time that the socialist and especially the "left" socialists are extremely dangerous. It is for this reason that they tolerate to opportunism in our own ranks—that is, tolerance to the ideology of the enemy class, is equivalent to betrayal.
For the American Young Communist League the Stalin letter has an even greater significance. The youth did not experience the last war. They are not steeped in the fight against the social-chauvinists. Furthermore, the theoretical level of the YCL is extremely low, thus creating more fertile ground for opportunism. In the ranks of the League we also find strong tendencies towards "left" sectarianism and "right" opportunism. For this reason, the Stalin letter has a special importance.

Stalin
In the ranks of the League there is no real understanding of this important letter. The membership of the League is completely ignorant of the history of the Bolshevik Party.
Narrow Interpretation
Secondly, the leadership looks upon the letter of Comrade Stalin very narrowly. It fails whatsoever to see any connection between the fight against opportunism in the Bolshevik Party and the need for intensifying the fight against these tendencies in our own League.

How to Lead and Win Struggles in Small Shop

Our comrades considered the methods of using shop work as their "big" on the scale of a strike. They do not realize that only by carrying on small successful struggles can we draw the workers into broader ones, and prove that we are capable of leading the larger and more important strikes.

Need for Vanguard
The German Left did not understand the need for and the role of the proletarian vanguard—the Communist Party. In 1923 when Lenin raised sharply the need for a closely knit, disciplined party, composed of the best fighters, the rank and file inside the ranks of the working class and its youth.

Small struggles of this sort are very valuable. If we really expect to establish ourselves in the shops, we must be able to draw them into our shop groups and units. proletarian power.
It is this same underestimation of the role of the proletariat which is the basic mistake of Trotsky and which led by his entire counter-revolutionary position. This failure to see the peasantry as a revolutionary force, resulted logically in an underestimation of the inner force of the Russian Revolution, and that in a backward peasant country such as the Soviet Union the building of socialism is impossible before the proletarian triumph in other lands.

Expressed in United States
This theory finds its expression also in the United States. The fact that the U.S. is a highly industrialized nation, leads many comrades to forget that this is also a large rural land with 80 per cent of the population on the farms. While it is true that the farmers in America will not play the same role as the peasant country such as Russia, nevertheless, the proletariat in America must also develop a strong alliance with the farming masses. The agrarian crisis has created such a situation for large numbers of farming masses that they realize they will not get anything through a proletarian revolution unless they change their present conditions.

First, it is shown in a liberal approach towards opportunism, tendencies in our ranks. Secondly, it is shown in an underestimation of the role and character of the Social Patriots. This holds especially true of our attitude towards the "left" Social Patriots, the Stuetzels, Lovestones and Trotskyites.

For years in the League there has existed the opinion that the influence of the Social Patriots among the youth is negligible. This opinion was a result of mechanical considering their pure organizational strength, without taking into account their much larger ideological influence. The activity of the Stuetzels among the youth in the UMWVA strikes in Ohio and West Virginia, the recent growth of the Young Peoples Social League, especially the so-called "Militants," all prove how dangerous is above error. The recent YCL Resolution on our League, points out that the Social Patriots are the main enemies to fight inside the ranks of the working class and its youth.

HUGE CINEMA COMBINE NOW BEING BUILT NEAR MOSCOW.  
The world's largest cinema combine is now under construction at Poylikha, a suburb of Moscow. The combine will consist of a plant for the manufacturing of motion pictures, the United Kino factory, studios for the production of sound movies, cinematography typographic and modern picture houses and dwellings for the workers. The construction is proceeding very rapidly and is almost completed—most of the equipment having already been installed. Some 9,000,000 rubles have been appropriated for the construction of the combine.

Many pictures are now being filmed at the studio, which is scheduled to release 26 films this year. Of these, 10 will be sound pictures and 16 silent. One of the directors of the Combine, in an interview with the press, stated that 95 per cent of all pictures to be produced will be in not later than July 15.

SOVIET FILM NOTES  
The Tram, the Young Workers Theatre Movement, is planning to produce its first film, a picture dealing with the danger of war. The film is being produced by the studio in Moscow, has been invited to act as consultant in the production of the film.

The Mesharpo film studio announced a contest for the scenario dealing with the 15th anniversary of the Soviet Revolution. The following awards will be made: first prize 3,000 rubles; two second prizes 2,000 rubles each, and three third prizes of 1,000 rubles each. All scenarios must be in not later than July 15.

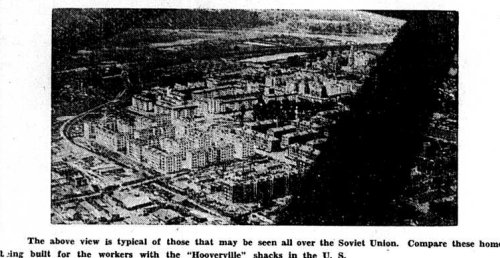
So Says Starvation Skipper to Hungry Crew on Bull Boat

MEN ON COOLIE LEVEL Are Losing Gains Won by Struggle in Past

BALTIMORE, Md.—I, a seaman, joined the starvation ship, Millinocket. Unorganized and unemployed I took a job on the ship from A. H. Bull and Co. This happened in May, 1932. After looking over the ship for the mess room, I found it in the sun parlor (that being the new name for the bunkers) both deck and engine departments eat their grub what fits they get. "Salt and pepper is good enough for any sailor," says the big pot-bellied skipper who also said that the dirty crew "don't need a mess boy."

After eating the crew is required by the skipper to wash their dishes in the same water as the cooking utensils are washed in, and to try to get the salt and pepper, which are black and filthy from the coal fires, also greasy with grease used for three or more different times. The hands of the seamen individually washing dishes is very unsanitary. The deck department sails with no less than an epidemic of typhoid. This is some more of the rotten skipper's work. The crew works hard every day and yet I think this is a fine way old man is helping out the unemployed seamen. This skipper is trying to set the sea for reducing the members of the crew. These conditions are bringing us back to worst the season had years ago. Soon we will be worse off than the Chinese coolies. These conditions can be changed only by organizing. It is up to us to get together and fight against these rotten conditions by organizing in the Maritime Workers Industrial Union and form ship committees in all ships to stop this damnable and contemptible treatment. **MORE THAN HALF OF MINN. FARMS IN BANKRUPTCY**

Young Farmers Must Be Organized Now

BROOKING, Minn.—Conditions here are going from bad to worse. We find it hard to meet our expenses. The taxes continue high while the farm products keep getting lower and lower. The farmers here are only getting from 10 to 20 cents a bushel for potatoes, around \$10 for cattle and butterfat is only around 15 cents a pound.

In some townships here more than 50 per cent of the farmers couldn't pay their taxes any more, mortgages are being foreclosed and the families are being forced out because they are unable to pay their taxes and interest on the mortgages. But still some of the farmers here (especially in Harwood County) believe in the IWW and the National program that organizes the farmers. At last it got better times are almost here and that we have nothing to kick about. Young workers and farmers! We shouldn't believe in all the bunk that is told us. Instead of that we must learn to organize a fight against these unbearable conditions.

Unemployed Youth Is Given 55 Day Jail Sentence by Cops

JOBLESS CALLED "VAGS" Hospital Treatment Refused by Clinic

LOS ANGELES.—I arrived in Los Angeles, Cal., on a Saturday evening on a freight train from Bakerfield, Ore. "Los Angeles—Hell" is a hellish place, Los Angeles, not at all the beautiful city I had heard and read about. I soon learned where all the soup lines and employment offices were located and most of my time was spent sitting in the employment agencies, walking the streets looking for work or sitting in the damned missions listening to a lot of hokey about Jesus while waiting for a bowl of slop. After a few weeks when I couldn't find a job I got weak from lack of proper food. Refused Clinical Treatment. When I came to the city I had a bad disease. So I went to a clinic but they wouldn't treat me. I then tried to get in the County Hospital but they sent me to Wilshire Sanitarium, the rottenest place in Southern California where about fifty men with every type of venereal disease are mixed up together in one tank. The doctor put me on the water-cure—one day of water every hour—so that all the treatment I ever got there. When I got out I bumped some medicine and treated myself. Later I was examined by a doctor and he said I was all right. The old routine of sleeping in the streets and eating on the soup line went on and on until one day the cops arrested me and three more into jail for vagrancy. The judge gave me thirty days. I was out of jail four days. This was I arrested again. This time I got twenty-five days.

One day I met a Mexican fellow. I liked him and soon we became regular buddies. He had a broken leg caused by a truck running over it. Twice a week he went to a clinic to get his leg bandaged. I got a better. I think Joe was the nerviest fellow I ever saw. I've seen him walk the streets at night and I couldn't find a place to sleep and it was too cold to sleep out, with his leg in a hospital or a ticket home. I went up to find out what it was all about and discovered it was the Unemployed Council.

The Communists are constantly doing things like that and what is more important than getting individual relief to those who need it, are organizing workers all over the world to overthrow this rotten capitalist system and establish a Workers and Farmers Government.

That's what we are up against in this town. The bosses expect us to stay in the profits. But we are beginning to organize. Unless they raise the price we won't fish. With the present price we will barely make enough to live through the summer, and what will we do during the winter? The way things look now the town of Inwaco is a doomed place.

I told the nurse that I was not going. She was "surprised at me."

At last it got beyond endurance and I asked him if he would let me alone. He left. The next morning, I was going to be operated on. About 15 minutes before I went on the "sister" made her appearance. She told me I must sign a confession. It was a sin, a shame, etc. By that time I was in a daze but I still refused to do so.

Speak About Death. Then the mother superior came in. The mother superior went out I was ready to do anything as long as they leave me alone. When I was in the hospital, I might die, etc. This proves that religion is not only used in churches and in schools, but also in hospitals.

The way I got into the League was through struggle. I became convinced that the YCL was the only organization which was carrying on a struggle. About a year ago the CP came down to North Detroit and had an open air meeting. I responded to this open air meeting of the Party, and finally one day the YCL came down and had a meeting right around the corner of the poolroom where we used to hang out. We listened to the speakers. There were about three or four of us. After the meeting we went back to the poolroom and began discussing what we had heard. Some were for and some against. The following week the YCL had another meeting and again we listened and again we discussed. Then the YCL disappeared and not until the Briggs hunger march in November did we see the YCL again. As we were standing near the poolroom we saw a mass come up and the cops trying to break it up. We certainly witnessed a battle there.

We naturally followed the mass. After this hunger march the YCL dropped out of the picture again. The next we heard of it was at the Ford hunger march. We began reading of the newspaper reports of the Party and we decided that there must be something in this organization that keeps them driving on.

When we found out that four comrades were arrested for their bodies would be on view, we went down to see them. The next day we went down to the meeting of the counter-demonstration made such an impression on us that we got into line and began marching with the others. I will never forget this demonstration.

The way that we came into the League is the way other young workers will come into the League. I think that struggle is the only way that will get young workers into the League. You must fight as the line and show that you mean what you say. If you keep on talking and don't do anything, it will not do.

Conditions in the Briggs were so bad that which follows got 12 cents an hour. One of my friends worked 48 hours and received 12 cents an hour. I am out of the factory now, but my friend is working on some contract order to establish a grievance committee. We are going slowly about the work because it's very hard. The workers are afraid; but we hope to accomplish something.

## TERROR HITS MEXICAN YOUTH

A few weeks ago the military forces of the City Government assaulted the headquarters of the Confederation Sindical Unitaria de Mexico, the Mexican Revolutionary Trade Union Center, and arrested over 50 workers, a large number of whom were women. A few days later the police swooped down on the San Bruno factory and arrested the whole staff of the revolutionary union, including the youth secretary.

The National Committee of the Young Communist League has already sent a protest to the Mexican officials, and calls upon all youth organizations and young workers to pass resolutions against this wave of terror. To organize protest meetings, etc. Only mass pressure will release our Mexican comrades from the clutches of the agents of Yankee imperialism.

## THE ROLE OF THE AMERICAN SOCIALIST PARTY IN THE LAST IMPERIALIST WAR

BY JOE CLARK  
IT IS A GENERAL misconception that the American Socialist Party played a radically different role in the World War than did their brethren in Europe.

In Europe the Socialist Parties, members of the Second International—with the exception of the Russian Bolshevik Party and the Italian Socialist Party—were all their anti-war resolutions during the war. They were the first to break with their imperialist masters when war actually broke out. All the other parties of the American Socialist Party issued a statement against war. But fully aware of the danger of their defeat, they were the first to call for the abolition of the "Socialist Party" in the United States.

"The Socialist Party finally did do something" about war shipment. They sent a ridiculous letter to President Wilson on February 2, 1917, begging him to "For the example of your Jefferson professor, Thomas H. Jefferson, Mr. President, and have a complete embargo placed on all shipments. It will end the war."

"Words. But No Deeds."  
When the United States finally entered the war a special convention of the Socialist Party called for April 7, 1917, at St. Louis. The majority of most of the party members took the attitude of a real anti-war resolution. But when it came to real action against the war, the Socialist leaders sabotaged the resolution. For example, they called for mass meetings on the Fourth of July, saying: "The Fourth of July is the most American of American holidays. Most of the others will be absent. The European workers to fight against their own bourgeois governments and their social democratic agents."

So, therefore, call on the people of this country to make this Fourth of July mark the beginning of a new spirit of independence. Our forefathers in 1776 cast off the bonds of political slavery on this day. Let us reaffirm and repudiate the fetters of military slavery that has been forced on us in 1917.

The Socialists made no attempt to give a CLASS analysis of the war situation. They made no appeal to the WORKERS and their organizations, to declare war on imperialists, but they appealed to the patriotic instincts of "all the people."

The Revolutionary Socialists of the Party of the type of Charles E. Buchanan, who later became one of the founders of the Communist Party of the United States, were the only party to really control the Party deliberately sabotaged the revolutionary struggle against war.

It is important to recall the attitude of the Socialist Party leaders to the last World War in order to prevent them from misleading the American workers in the present war situation. The right against war can appear only as a line of revolutionary working class struggle before and during the war. Only the Communist Party and the Young Communist League leads the workers in this fight.

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## Soviet Youth Explore the Polar Zone

# ARMOUR PLANT CONTINUES WAGE-CUT

## SPEED UP ON CHAIN CAUSES INJURIES

Discrimination employed Against Negroes and Women

(By a "Young Worker" Correspondent.)  
KANSAS CITY, Kansas.—I have been reading your paper, the YOUNG WORKER, and I would like to tell you a few things about the conditions in Armour's Plant in Kansas City, Kansas.

The worst thing is the way they have been cutting pay. They gave us two ten per cent cuts within a few months time. The average is now 35c per hour for men, boys get 22 cents per hour, experienced girls get 20 cents, and new girls get 19 1/2c. Besides this the company has started an insurance plan. They take 35c every week from our pay checks.

**Speed-up Causes Injury**  
When we get cut, they send us to the "ignor doctor" who shows a few rays on us. And how is it that, we are always getting cut? Because the foremen are always trying to get everything they can out of us. Their motto is, "do it or get out." They are out to make a record, so they speed up the chain so much that no man can keep from getting cut. And boy, can they speed up that chain. We holder like hell when we see that the day's slavery is done. If you work here a while you can feel them cutting you, working the life cut of us.

Discrimination Against Women and Negroes  
The women's staff get a bad break. Their condition is so rotten that three girls of the lacon also went out one day ago before the boss told them to quit. They could not stand it any longer. Of course they got to go. What I would like to see is the whole department to walk out. Then let them try to fire all on top of getting out there for their work, the girls have to treat the boss right or they go to jail. It was told about one woman who quit when the boss always kept us in line. She like him in front of everybody how she had to bring him liquor and cigars for her job. And then she wanted to much out of her job.

## CAB COMPANY CUTS WAGES

SACRAMENTO, Calif.—The City Cab Company of this city has cut the wages of its cab drivers from \$2.50 a day to \$1.35. The cut went into effect several days ago. 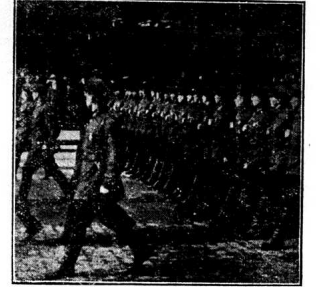

## YOUNG SHIPPING CLERKS SUFFER SPEED UP; NO PAY FOR OVERTIME

(By a "Young Worker" Correspondent.)  
NEW YORK CITY.—I work in a dress shop on Seventh Ave. near 37th St. This place does the cutting and gives it out to contractors in Brooklyn and Jersey. In the busy season they have about four young cutters and two shipping clerks. These young cutters are doubly oppressed. Some of them get \$16 to \$17 a week and doing a man's work. The head shipping clerk gets \$15 and his assistant \$12, working until 7:30 to 8:30 at night without extra pay.

When it is busy the cutters work until nine a night o'clock and also on Sunday. But when it is slow they are laid off. These boys work 50 fast and late until they are out on a job. Another way the boss cheats us is when we come in an hour late for some reason, we lost a half day's pay.

**Perfidy Speed-up**  
In order to speed us up, the boss tells us that a certain lot has to go out tonight. We boys fell for that and cutted our boss off. The next day we found the lot all complete lying on the table. In order to stop this the shipping clerks must get together with the cutters and finishers, elect a shop committee, and present our demands to the boss.

## Conditions of Farmers Get Worse

The following contains excerpts from a letter received from Elks Grove, California by the Young Worker describing some of the miserable conditions on farms.

"In our locality these are the conditions: A farmer owning a farm worth \$40,000 with a dairy farm and orchard on the Consumes River—the mother was forced to go back to teaching school in order to help pay the taxes on the farm.

"Next door to this farm, a family of a wife and six children moved last week into a barn. The farm had been rented to a dairyman. He had a vegetable garden, planned planning for the winter food supply, but which he was obliged to leave when the owner rented the farm.

"Farmers are cutting out use of power for irrigation, also use of tractors. We are cutting out house power for stove and water heating, on account of too great an expense. We just sold our lambs for \$2 a head, seventy pounds. We have no prospects for selling our food crop covering feed for the winter.

"Last year pickers made from 75 cents to a dollar a day. They had to leave themselves.

"In the schools the trustees are dismissing the married teachers who are better fitted to teach in the favor of the unmarried teachers in order that the income will be spread out.

**CATCH GOPHER TAILS FOR LIVING.**  
WILLISTON, N. D.—The farmers and workers here are so hard up for money that they are pulling gopher tails for them to use for fuel for themselves and their families. Some of them catch gopher tails for which they get 5 cents a piece to make a living.

**EVICTED FROM 11 YR. HOME.**  
CHARLOTTE, N. C.—I am a young worker in the streets because they can't pay rent. They made a family that had been living in a house for 11 years when they couldn't pay rent. We want all young workers to fight against these conditions and the bloodsucking landlords.

## LAST STEPS FOR WAR ON USSR TAKEN

British Inspired Army Moves on Soviet Mongolia

Youth Fight Boss War Will Demonstrate on International Youth Day September 9

The final step in the plans of the imperialist countries for armed attack on the Soviet Union has been taken in the last few weeks. Almost simultaneously with the broadening out of the invasion of the province of Szechuan in Inner Mongolia by the Japanese capitalist armies, a Tibetan army, armed and supported by the British capitalists, has been hurled at Soviet Mongolia whose workers and peasants were emancipated from the rule of the landlords and capitalists following the Russian revolution.

**Troop Concentrations**  
Together with these two open war moves, large detachments of Japanese armies are concentrating on both the southern and western borders of Soviet Mongolia. These troop concentrations can be used by the Japanese capitalists to strike all of northern China or to attack Soviet Mongolia.

Already there has been a sharp exchange of diplomatic notes between the Japanese and the American capitalists. The Wall Street strata accuse the Japanese of moving rapidly to force Japan to act as the spearhead of attack on the Soviet Union in order that she intrudes in Northern China may be anticipated.

**War on Workers**  
The invasion of Inner Mongolia and the advance of the Tibetan army on Soviet Mongolia is taking place with the full cooperation of the Nanking Chinese government. Although not offering the slightest resistance to the invasion of the Japanese and Tibetan armies, the Nanking government is charging on a murderous campaign against the workers and peasants of China.

This campaign however, is meeting with the most successful resistance on the part of the Chinese Red Army. Already the Soviet Communist suppression drive, inspired by and paid for by British, American and Japanese capitalists, have been defeated with large sections of the Nanking army deserting in masses to the cause of the Communist army.

**Youth Must Act**  
In the face of such open war moves against the Soviet Union, the land where there is no crisis, no starvation, no unemployment, the young workers, farmers and working class students of the

## WANDER ALL OVER U.S. IN SEARCH FOR FOOD, JOBS

Die "On Road" by the Scores of Starvation Disease, Accident

As a direct result of the attacks on the living conditions of the young workers carried through by the Wall St. government with Hoover at its head, the government is forced to admit that an army of young workers numbering about 300,000 are ranging about the country in gangs without a home and hungry. This is a minimum estimate. The real number is nearer 500,000. They may stay from 7 to 20 days. Many of them are girls, who are forced into a life of prostitution, while the boys are forced to criminal activity in order to live.

The official report cynically states:  
"They may not get for days with nothing to eat but coffee, bread and beans. In winter they suffer from exposure. Last winter in one Western city, 35 young men and boys were removed from box cars, seriously some of them in an advanced stage of pneumonia."

This while the entire boss class and the Socialist Party rant about the "food shortage in the Soviet Union" they help to cover up one of the most heinous crimes of capitalism, the brutal starvation of hundreds of thousands of young workers in Pennsylvania, where they are hunting against the Socialist Union in Soviet Russia, young workers enjoy the first and only cold blooded scolding of the boss class. All have jobs and they are invited to participate in the government.

The Socialist Party with the undivided aid of the leadership of the Young Peoples Socialist League, proposes that 2 million more young workers be thrown out of their present jobs and hurled into some position as the homeless youth.

At the state convention of the Socialist Party in Pennsylvania a major plank was adopted reading: "No employment of children under 18 years of age." Without making provision of any kind for their future welfare, this demand means only a cold blooded scolding of the ranks of the young workers now roaming over the country.

It is no wonder that young Tolly Mincher and Mary Stouffert now touring the country to mobilize young workers in Pennsylvania, are the Communist Party election program and its standard bearers. William Z. Foster and John W. Ford report that their meeting are filled with hundreds of young workers. Many of these young workers are joining the Young Communist League and all have pledged to fight for their immediate needs and the leadership of the Communist Party and Young Communist League.

## Make The Wind Change

IN NEW JERSEY, a few weeks ago, the honorable Governor Moore amused his capitalist friends by staging a mock "riot" of unemployed workers who were supposed to have been dispersed by tear gas bombs hurled at them by members of the National Guard. It so happened that the wind changed. The tear gas, instead of eating away at the eyes and lungs of the young workers in the National Guard who took the part of jobless workers, came in the Governor's direction and started the tears rolling down his dignified old parrot's face.

Now this was only an accident. The wind just happened to change. Instead of the workers being gassed, the capitalists in the person of the governor and his friends were gassed. The point is that the young workers in the National Guard who were so openly being prepared to attack their fellow workers in order to protect the profits of the bosses can't so rely on the wind to change all the time. They must remember that the time will come when he bosses will call out the National Guard to do in earnest what was then done in "mockery." When that time comes, they must see to it that the wind also changes, that they change with it, and that most important of all they do the changing. Not a single National Guardsman may allow himself to be used in order to beat back the struggle of the workers for higher wages, shorter hours or unemployment relief. On the contrary, they must follow the example of the 25 miners in Washington who refused to be used against the bonus marchers. With or without a uniform, the first task of a young worker is to fight for his own class and not for the class of millionaires who condemn him and his parents to starvation.

EVEN if you didn't learn in school that election day always comes the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November you could tell it was on its way by all the "name calling" in the air those days.

Smith calls Roosevelt a name and they both blame Hoover and Hoover blames the Senate for the present economic crisis and they all appeal to the "average citizen" (that's supposed to be us, our mothers and fathers)—but we'll talk about them and what they amount to some other time.

He almost got a job as errand boy for Wauwaugeton but he was only ten years old. He had to become an apprentice in the shop of a stone cutter and sculptor. His weekly net after wages and taxes was \$1.50 a week. At the end of the three years the boss

## Homeless Youth Workers Roam U.S. In Freight Cars Looking for Jobs

Suppose you and I are out of work and waiting around a railroad station for the next freight to get a pull in so we can get to some other town to get a job. We roll a Bull Durham cigarette and smoke it. We're a bit hungry because we stuffed ourselves with coffee an' sooner in the day—of course bummed the money to get it.

That damn train ought to be along pretty quick. It's getting late. Lots of other like us are wandering up now. About thirty or forty. The time must be getting close.

About 15 minutes it lies. Look at all the guys getting off, will you? Looks like a young army. Well, they won't stay in this town long, that's sure. They're looking for jobs here and the cops sure keeps guys like us on the run.

There's only three empty box cars on the whole train of sixty cars. Some fellow at the door of one gets up his hand and helps us crawl up. It's a long haul of men, though some sweating some standing up, some sitting on the floor.

Canned Heat.

The smell of stein' canned heat is strong enough. There must be lots of "canned heat armies" about. Maybe that's the only way us a crew can sleep so soundly. One of the fellows tells us a view railroad cop who is stationed along about where we are headed for.

side street, we come to the employment office disarist (better named the unemployment office). We find a pool room, card room, or cheap all night restaurant where we can sit around and doze till daylight when it gets warmer.

Find Peeps.

We find one crowded with a hundred or more others like us, some nodding in chairs and others talking loudly, half drunk with "canned heat" (denatured alcohol). After a person drinks that stuff a while he gets so he never cares for anything. He can't think and falls into a perpetual daze. If he keeps it up, it burns the lining out of his stomach and ruins his entire system. It doesn't take long for him to kick the bucket.

Many night workers from around town come to the place to eat. It's no use asking them for a couple of cents. They haven't got it anyway. Most of them are working just a couple of days in two weeks. So we hang around waiting for morning. No money to get. No money to get there. Some Communists took me at a few years ago that it would be like this. I didn't believe him then.

**The Revolutionary Leader.**

In 1900 he joined the Socialist Party—there wasn't any Communist Party then—but in 1909 he was expelled for being too radical. In 1910 he was arrested in Spokane, Washington during a fight for free speech. When Foster says that the voice of the working class shall be heard he isn't talking thru his hat like Hoover or Norman Thomas.

Two years later he was sent to Budapest as a delegate to an international conference of trade union leaders. He spent 12 months in Europe studying the conditions of the workers there. In 1917 he led the organization of 20,000 packing-house workers and then of course, in 1919 came the big steel strike. That's a long story all its own that we'll have to talk about some other time. It was the biggest strike in the history of the American labor movement—400,000 steel workers were involved.

In 1921 he went to Russia to attend the meeting of the Communist International and the International of Labor Unions. Since that time he has become one of the greatest leaders of the American working class—always fighting his battles in the front line.

Now for the third time he is the Communist candidate for president of the United States. Let's all get behind this election campaign and get a big enough vote to make the capitalists realize that when we say "Vote Communist!" it is shouted with the united voice of millions of workers, farmers, Negroes and white, all over the country.

## HITLER'S FASCIST MURDER GANGS AND THE GERMAN WORKING YOUTH

**BY IRVING JAGGER.**

The essence of fascism—and this cannot be too often emphasized—consists not only in the fact that it constitutes the most bloody, violent and brutal weapon in the service of the employers against the proletariat but that at the same time it is a policy of discontent and exasperation as the emancipation, while in the most cunning manner, it casts suspicion on the revolutionary aims of the proletariat.

Youth Flag Day Role.

In this connection, the youth flag day is really constituting the core of the fascist movement. Already some years ago, there was rightly pointed out the typical difference in the average age of the workers of the various parties.

In the case of the fascists, most of the members are between 17 and 25 years of age. All the elections have confirmed and shown that the fascists have been able to an overwhelming extent to attract the young voters, including a tremendous part of the young proletariat.

Was And Post-War Trends?

The war had had a very important contribution to make to the youth political activity, at the age of 17-18 the youth were called up to serve as cannon fodder. The economic crisis brought with it an increase in the youth, partly through greatly increased exploitation, partly to the impossibility of a young worker getting any kind of employment.

Nationalist Propaganda.

Before all the capitalists were of course able to win the youth by nationalist propaganda. Young officers, whom the result of the war had deprived of their jobs (but not of their bread) and the fascists in order to win over the youth, had to do the same.

It was the nationalist youth who fought in the Freikorps against the Spartacus League and the Bavarian Soviet Republic. It was the youth who during the French occupation of the Ruhr district, tried to combat the passive resistance of the workers into taking resistance to the youth who assassinated, Kessler and Rathenau.

Hit Youth of Paris Etc.

The fascist youth of Paris had a lot to contribute to the youth to the fascist political party and tradition. 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# "We Are Not Grey, Red People!"

"People having a superficial knowledge of socialism fabricate maintain that we Communists are opposed to individual well-being. They believe we are opposed to three or four remarkable things, and the first is that we are opposed to their money and their clothes. They believe we are stilling individuality; they imagine that socialism is a gray army where everybody dresses and lives in standard fashion. But a caricature of socialism is not socialism. The middle class intellectual, who is a relatively privileged class and is therefore incapable of conceiving a life more colorful and more interesting. We are not grey, red people, we are colorful people. Every one of us has his individuality which expresses itself in our Bolshevick character and is inspired to the socialist conviction.

"For this reason we are opposed to grey beautiful clothes. We are not austeres and do not search asceticism. We are for a full, bright life!

"It is primarily because we reject our individual well-being in the interests of the class that we enrich ourselves spiritually and in actual fact. It is because of this that we are progressive people, foreign to capitalist society. It is because of this that we are really worthy of our name."

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**COLossal Striving For Culture.**

"We have made unusual progress in the production of books. In 1931 we issued 50,000 titles, whereas Great Britain, Canada and America combined issued that year only 45,000.

"Not a single country in the world shows such colossal striving for culture, knowledge, science and art as the Soviet Union. There is not another government in the world which encourages these strivings and which has made such colossal progress in the cultural upbringing of the masses as does our proletarian government.

"At the beginning of the Five-Year Plan there were only 156,000 workers in the arts and sciences. At the present time there are more than 1,100,000 and by the end of the present year, there are expected to reach over one and a half million. This our entire only ten years ago. Our schools, scientific institutions are being made to attract the best youth.

**COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES.**

In the colleges and universities there are now over half a million students, the vast majority of them youth. The technicians have an enrollment of over 800,000.

"Considerable progress has been made in attracting the younger generation into industrial production. Of the total number of almost twenty million wage earners almost 33 per cent are under 23 years of age, and the percentage of young workers under 23 years of age is approximately 44.5 per cent.

"We have no unemployment, while the number of jobs in the capitalist world is continually increasing. In the United States there are over 4,600,000 young workers unemployed, who receive no aid from the government—in Germany, 1,500,000. Since 1929 unemployment in capitalist countries has increased steadily, while in the Soviet Union production, taking part in the government, in scientific work, and in the cultural field.

"In bourgeois society every one lives for himself. The experience acquired during the 15 years of Soviet power showed that an individual attained feelings of personality only when well being is attained by millions collectively under the leadership of the Party. Tens of millions of people who were subjected to suffering and privation in 1918 and 1919 are now happy and content.

"The present day member of the Soviet Young Communist League, born in 1929, has not known anything but social justice. He has been educated and raised under a proletarian regime. Based on the economic relations, we are forming a new morality, new ethics, new relations between people and society."

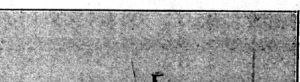

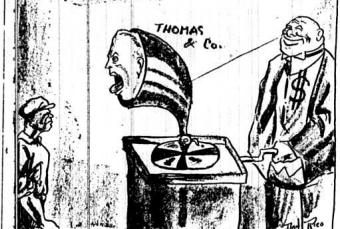

When we came back to the armory, they take money off the new men for foot lockers that have been paid for by men that got out of the service and were not allowed to take them along with them. In this way they collect money twice for the same lockers.

## France Negro YCL Member for Walking With White

KANSAS CITY, Mo.—For the "crime" of walking down the street together, police here arrested Henry Winston, a Negro member of the Young Communist League, and Marie Harcourt, white organizer of the local branch of the International Labor Defense. They are being held on a charge of "vagrancy."

Over a year ago an interracial dance here was broken up by police and over 40 workers were thrown into jail. The judge searched the statute books, but failed to find any law under which interracial dances would be held illegal. He released the workers, first telling them that it was "against the law of God" for the races to mix socially.

## KENTUCKY YOUTH FORCED TO BEG RED CROSS AID

MIDDLESBORO, Ky.—The Cardinal mines are only working two days a week and pay 20 cents per ton so it is very hard for a man that loads coal to make any actual money. The only way that most of them get it, script which has to be spent in the company store.

There are lots of working youth in these places where they are only working one and two days a week. They have to go to the Red Cross for their flour because they can't make enough at work to buy flour they use.

There is a mine in Hartan County that pays its men \$4 a week in script. If they work every day that's a week they get \$4 and if they work six days they only get four dollars.

I have been in the local camp for quite a while and these are the conditions. The food was rotten and the bread was stale. They gave us sour milk and told us it was good for us.

A rich boy's doctor signs a paper for a few dollars and that gets him a special diet and doesn't have to work hard. We poor boys, sons of workmen, drink sour milk, eat stale bread and half cooked food.

At seven thirty you get up and get washed. At eight you eat the slops they give you that's fit for a pig. From 8:30 to 10:00 you work sawing wood, digging ditches you and cleaning the latrines.

When a boy is sick he is treated and if it is during working hours he must go back and finish his work. For instance one boy chopped his foot with an axe and after he was treated he was required to continue his work.

They have no doctor at the camp, only a boy who knows a little about medicine. Each troop is adopted by a business men's club as if we were their mascot. When the fat belly of the club that is behind our troop give a dance, a ball, or a banquet we go down and fix up chairs, serve the people with food and stand around to let the people know that the club backs the Boy Scout movement in order to increase their popularity with the poor people.

In fact the company never paid a cent on their back wages, just laid them off. Please put this article in your paper.

## CHINESE RED ARMY TAKES MORE TOWNS

Japan Continues War On Jehol; Base For Attack On Soviets

Smashing through the bloody forces of Japanese imperialism, partisan troops in Manchuria have made two daring attacks on Mukden, where Japan thought itself strongest. Five thousand men armed with trench mortars and other weapons captured from the Japanese in previous battles or brought over by fleeing soldiers of the puppet state created by Japan in Manchuria were used in the battle.

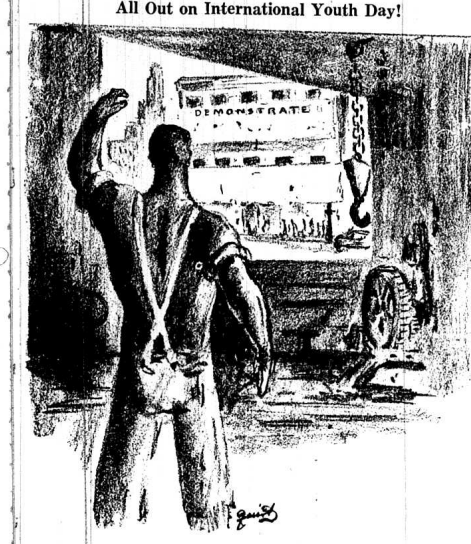
At the battle on Jehol, Japan is continuing its invasion of Jehol province which is being prepared as the base from which to capture Soviet Mongolia and attack the Soviet Union.

Soviet Army Grows  
As Japan is getting bold after how she least expected it the Chinese Red Armies in the interior of China are continuing their advance with lightning rapidity. Town after town falls into the broadening Soviet area as the Chinese government admits that its fifth campaign to wipe out the "bandit communists" has failed miserably. It is reported that not only are whole divisions of the Shanghai government's army deserting to the Reds but that the army of the Canton government is refusing to fight the workers' and peasants' forces. Eight districts in Kwangtung have been taken by the Red Army in Kwangtung Province from the Canton forces within the past few days.

Shanghai papers report that the Red Army is overcoming its most serious failure of the last year—the lack of airplanes and anti-aircraft guns. Fighting and observation planes bearing the flags of the Red forces are being seen. And a squad of Red planes is frequently seen in North Kwangtung.

Imperialists Active  
These successes of the Chinese workers' and peasants' are not going unnoticed. Japanese marines are being sent into Shanghai again under the pretext of their being "highlanders." And military representatives of France, the United States and other nations are reported as investigating the possibilities of giving more aid to the Chinese Chinese cliques. On International Youth Day and after it is up to the Young Workers in America to throw out the demand of no arms shipments to the Far East and we must proceed to see that no shipments leave the United States.

The main demand of the Communist Party for unemployment insurance is the demand for the Youth.

## Used As Flunkies While Being Trained for War

### Scout Camp Conditions Shown to Be As Bad As Those in Nat'l Guard Encampments

**NORWALK, Conn.**—As a member of the local Boy Scouts, I am in a position to expose the rotten conditions now existing in the local Scout camp. I believe these conditions prevail in every other Scout camp.

When I first joined the Scouts I did so under the impression that it would build up my morale and health and that it would teach me many things. However, I find it altogether different.

It is just an organization formed for the interests of the bosses to implant militarism in your mind and make you patriotic so that when you grow up you will join one of the military organizations to fight the interests of the bosses.

I have been in the local camp for quite a while and these are the conditions. The food was rotten and the bread was stale. They gave us sour milk and told us it was good for us.

A rich boy's doctor signs a paper for a special diet and doesn't have to work hard. We poor boys, sons of workmen, drink sour milk, eat stale bread and half cooked food. At seven thirty you get up and get washed. At eight you eat the slops they give you that ain't fit for a pig.

There are about 15 girls working and they have not been paid regularly. The company owes them two months back pay. They promise to pay them but so far they get only one pay every month and the rest of the pay is in the hands of the company. They laid off 10 girls last week and these girls were only given their last week's pay.

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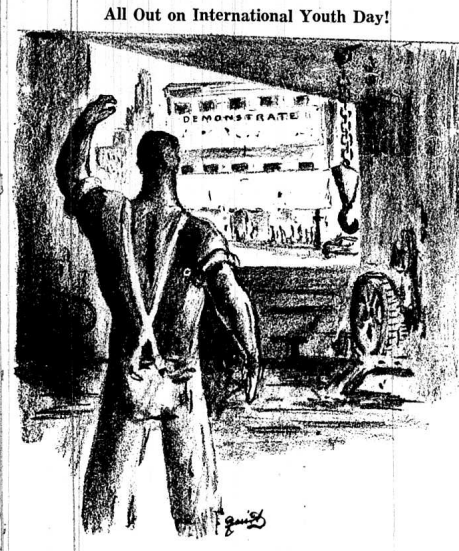
Smashing through the bloody forest of Japanese imperialist paratroopers in Manchuria have made two daring attacks on Mukden, where Japan thought itself strong.

It ain't only women but also boys between the ages of 1 and 20. I saw a "Western Pacific" freight train go past and I counted the young fellows riding the tops. I counted 27 on the tops and I guess that there were fifteen or twenty in the supplies that were on the train besides about 90 or 100 older men and a couple of women.

Trains loaded with war or youth have men, women and young boys—sometimes a man and his whole family in the train.—R. E. W.

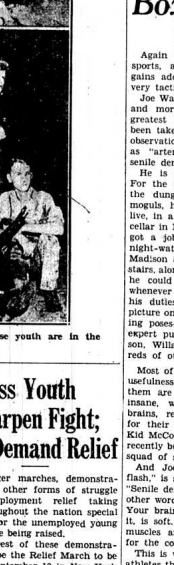

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## Forward to International Youth Day

Seventeen years ago, in September 1915, a group of young workers met in the city of Berne, Switzerland. These young workers had a serious task before them. All of Europe was embroiled in a bloody war which was being fought for the interests of capitalism. The workers in August 1914 had been betrayed by their "Socialist" leaders and placed at the mercy of the war machine. These youth came together at this conference to work out an international struggle against the war. Under the leadership of Lenin and Liebknecht these youth developed a revolutionary struggle against the war.

The conference of Berne, Switzerland, is of greatest historic importance for the youth. It is this conference which created an international day of struggle for the youth—International Youth Day. This day was created to show every year the growing solidarity of the youth the world over in their struggle against imperialist war.

This year on September 31st we are celebrating the 18th International Youth Day. Not since that conference in 1915 in the midst of the world war, have the youth faced more burning questions than this year. A new war is brewing in the Far East. In the United States the economic crisis has resulted in mass starvation for the unemployed youth. Five million youth are unemployed, of which 500,000 are homeless, waifs roaming the countryside.

This International Youth Day finds the youth facing the fourth consecutive winter of cold and hunger. The youth have no provisions for these months. No relief is given them by government. There is only one way out for the youth and that is organization and struggle. That is the lesson of the 18th International Youth Day.

The youth on September 31st must come out in numbers greater than ever before in mass demonstrations. They must shake a mighty fist in the face of the American capitalist class. They must develop a mass solidarity for struggle for their immediate demands during the coming winter months. They should join the only youth organization that leads their struggles—the Young Communist League!

## Follow Example of Denver

THE Young Communist League of Denver, in mobilizing young white and Negro workers in struggle against Jim-Crow lynch law has struck a blow at the face of Jim-Crowism. The two hundred Negro and white youth workers who participated in this militant action sets a brilliant example of struggle for the workers of America to follow. This fight to assert the mere rights of the young Negro workers was met with savage terror from the Denver police and the Denver ruling class.

It is these Jim-Crow practices enforced through lynchings and terror that create the basis for the robbery of the young Negro workers and the terrible oppression of the Negro people. To liberate the Negro "in his place" and to use him as a source of cheap labor, nine Negro boys in Scottsboro face legal lynching through the courts of the Southern ruling class.

Discrimination and persecution of young Negro workers is not limited only to Denver. In every city of the United States such conditions exist. And in every city young workers must prepare and organize mass violation of Jim-Crow practices involving white and Negro young workers against the discrimination in relief and jobs, at bathing beaches, theatres, restaurants, schools, charity offices, etc. Only through such action can we smash the barbarous Jim-Crow of the Negro masses.

Denver's mistake of doing little preparatory work among the white young workers, thus drawing few into this struggle alongside of the Negro youth must be sharply avoided in the preparation of these struggles. More white workers in participation at Denver would have lessened considerably the sharpness of the police attack and would have made realization of our demands a certainty.

# James W. Ford-- Negro Leader of Mass Struggles

More than fifty years ago, a Negro worker by the name of Forsh, his first name has not been recorded, was involved in the small town of Gainesville, Ga. ## James Ford, Communist Candidate for Vice-President



James W. Ford. How he got this name is a story in itself. Lyman Forsh, son of the Forsh who was lynched in Georgia, began working for the Tennessee Coal, Iron and Railroad Company in Pratt City, Ala. in the 1890's. When he got his first pay-envelope, he found that the name had been changed to "Ford". He appealed to the foreman. "Keep that name," said the white foreman. "I don't matter about a nigger's name now."

Today the grandson of a man who was lynched to show the niggers their place, the son of a laborer whose name was changed because "it don't matter about a nigger's name now" is a Communist Party member. He is active in the postal workers union and was sent as a delegate to the Chicago Federation of Labour.

James W. Ford was born at Pratt City, Ala., in the 1890's. When he was two years old his father, Lyman Forsh, had been lynched in Gainesville, Ga. His mother was Nancy Reynolds. The father of Lyman Forsh was a railroad track worker. When he was lynched the family was driven north and migrated to Pratt City, Ala. Here Lyman Forsh worked as a coal miner and steel worker. Later the family moved to Enley, Ala.

There were three in the Forsh family who was the oldest, and two sisters. Nancy Reynolds worked as a washwoman and cleaning woman in order to keep her children in school. But at fourteen years of age young James was forced to go to work. First he got a job as a waterboy on the railroad tracks, earning 50 cents a day. Then he worked in a blacksmith shop as a helper, later as a steam-hammer operator and machinist's helper. By using his money he was able to finish high school, and complete

working class, his tireless efforts in the organizing of workers, Negro and white, his leadership in the struggle against segregation and Jim-Crow, led to his early recognition as one of the most capable men in the party. He rose rapidly to a position of leadership. In the spring of 1928, he was one of the delegates elected to attend the Fourth Ward Congress of the Red International of Labour Unions in Moscow. He became a member of the R.I.L.U. executive committee, a position which he holds to day. He was chief organizer of the First International Conference of Negro workers in Hamburg, Germany in

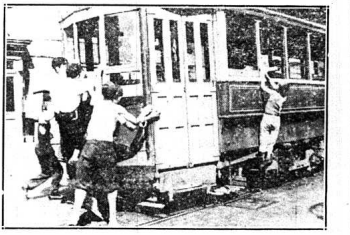
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1930. This conference which drew delegates from the United States and from East and West and South Africa, laid plans for the organization of Negro workers all over the world. Until 1932, Ford remained secretary of the International Trade Union Committee of Negro Workers which had been set up by the Hamburg Conference. In 1931, he made an extensive tour of Europe, speaking to great crowds of workers on the Scottish coast.

James Ford is today a member of the Central Committee of the Communist Party. He is the director of the Negro bureau of the Trade Union Unity League, a Federation of left-wing unions and groups composed of Negro and white workers.

I work 7 hours a day, 5 days a week and the work is very easy, no drivers, or buses standing over you. When my day's work is over I don't feel tired at all like I did in America. But I am ready for a good time, and believe me there is sure plenty here. We have opera every night, concerts every week, and all during the week various activities: excursions, etc. Almost every day we are free, and especially for foreign workers. We are given the cream of life. People here are so happy and feel we are entitled to everything here to make up for our suffering in capitalist countries.

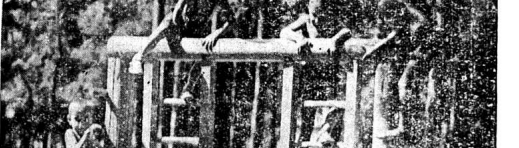
## "Which Side For The Intellectuals," "Y.C.L. Organizer" Is Guide for Working Class Youth

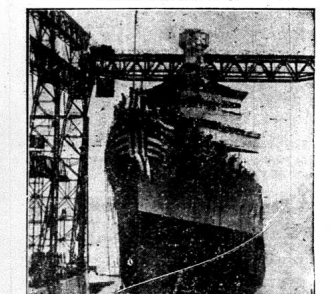

YOUTH LEADER GETS 6 MONTHS IN RELIEF FIGHT

Sam Brown, Negro worker, who is second organizer of the Youth Communist League in Harlem, has been sentenced to six months in jail for fighting for relief for unemployed youth.

Brown, who has been beaten up and arrested several times for workers' class activities, was seized at a Relief Bureau after a policeman had clubbed him with a club on his forehead.

On July 22, a bomb was sent to one of the most active women students, Maria Trotska. The man carrying the bomb was killed and Miss Proenza taken to the hospital, where she died.

Twenty girl comrades, coming to visit Julia at the hospital, were arrested and held at the Quantico jail.

On August 16, three school teachers, Felipe Donato, Angel Jimenez and Jose Mareno, directors of the municipal club in Havana, were arrested on the charge of "Communist activities" and are being held in the military jails.

At the same time that Pagan was killed, Armando Giray, a former student and now a leader of the Youth League, was kidnapped and remains concealed by the police.

"These acts of murder and jailing, closing of schools, and brutal suppression of student activities are carried on by the Machado government to maintain the profitable policies of American business interests with sugar, utilities and land investments in Cuba."

Garret, Young Negro Runs for State Rep. In Heart of South

CHARLOTTE, N. C.—Running on the Communist ticket in North Carolina for State Representative, Ralph Garrett, young Negro worker and leader of the southern Youth Communist League has already addressed several mass meetings of young and adult workers winning their support for the Communist party program of struggle. He is the only young worker running for office in the South.

Y. P. S. L. Refuses To Debate Y. C. L.; To Be Exposed

NEW YORK.—In spite of the refusal of the Youth People's Socialist League to debate with the Y. C. L. of New York the Youth Communist League has announced in an open letter to the members of the former organization that the debate will be held on Sept. 20 at the Manhattan Lyceum and urged them to force their leadership to answer the challenge.

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On With the Struggle for Free Gyms for Working Class Youth

(Reprinted from the NEW SPORT and PLAY, Sept. 1932.)

THE Fifth National Convention of the Labor Sports Union of America, just held, had a sharp keynote: FIGHT FOR FREE GYMS! It does such a need exist today?

We say that! It does. We say that the sport-loving workers of this country are suffering not only from lack of food, clothing and shelter—which are of course primary—but also from lack of recreational facilities—gyms, pools, fields, and the like.

Here are some figures. Look at 'em and tell us that we don't know what we are talking about. This table shows the per capita expenditures of the big cities on recreation. Notice how they've been cut down in the last year:

Table with 3 columns: City, 1930, 1931. Includes San Francisco, Los Angeles, Cleveland, Detroit, Milwaukee, Chicago, Pittsburgh, St. Louis, Philadelphia, Boston, Baltimore, New York.

(Figures are taken from the latest year book of the National Recreation Association.)

Notice the tremendous drop in Boston. Notice the trickery in Los Angeles figures, where they reckoned in the money spent by the city out of taxes wrung from workers and the lower middle class) for the Olympic Games, money which did not go for the Olympic sports. But New York City, where Jimmy Walker and every politician has his little "tin box", where the "city fathers" can maintain Betty Compton in riotous luxury—here money spent on recreation is the lowest! New York City spent altogether \$3,024,652 on recreation last year. This includes work done on parks, baseball diamonds, tennis courts etc. This was exactly 1/4 of 1 per cent of the city budget!

Brothers sportmen! Organize your basketball leagues in every city and town and demand free public gyms! Make the city officials give you gyms and playgrounds! Where there are none, demand that they be built—at trade union rates. Circulate petitions, send delegates to city halls, organize demonstrations of worker athletes!

We have a right to these facilities and we must assert our rights! These things must be reserved solely for the college athlete or the star in the big A. A. U. club. In this struggle the Labor Sports Union must constantly be in the forefront, fighting for the sports needs of the worker and farmer athlete, Negro and white. We will the masses of worker athletes see that we are the only sports organization that stands for them, the genuine amateur athletes.

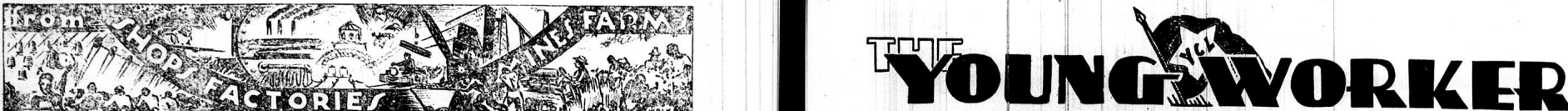

## Sacramento River Scene of Jobless Shantytown

SACRAMENTO, CAL. — I was walking along the bank of the Sacramento River when I met this man as he was building an additional room into his two room shack and I stopped to talk to him.

This man has a wife and three kids. He has lived in the city for two years he has been paying his rent up until month before he was thrown out. He has a hard time getting for his family. He had been able to find work until four months ago.

This fellow didn't know what the Workers Center was nor where it was at. He is coming up to the Workers Center as soon as he can.

There are hundreds of such cases in the Hooverville of this city where families are thrown out of their homes and are forced to build shacks on river banks and starve to death. It won't be long till there will be more in Hooverville than in the cities. There are families being forced out of their homes every day. There are more migratory workers pass through this city every day. There isn't a train that goes through that town that doesn't have

at least twenty, sometimes hundreds of them.  
There are more young workers than old workers that are up against it because some of them have parents and families to take care of besides themselves. I was talking to a young worker the other day. He has been out of work for three months. He was headed south thinking he would get a job.

## All Shops in Town Are Pulled Despite Terror

### Girls Stick By Red Union As Police and Thugs of South River Bar All "Outsiders"

(By a Young Worker Correspondent)

SOUTH RIVER, N. J.—Two thousand young girls and women working in dress factories here are on strike against wages of \$3, \$4 and \$5 for a 54 hour week.  
The rest against starvation, unorganized, first broke out in a shop of 180 workers on Aug. 22. The next day these strikers set out to "pull" every salve den in town with the slogan of "Why should anybody work and starve?" With the help of the Needle Trades "business" men and the South River girls were successful in halting production.

The election of a strike committee made of representatives of all shops and enthusiastic meetings convinced the bosses and the mayor of South River that the girls meant "business" and an reign of terror was started. The mayor first tried cunning words in order to gain control of the situation but was rebuffed out of the hall, the girls standing by their organizer, Jeanette Rubin. Since then every person coming from outside the town borders has been driven out. A reporter of the "Yewish Communist" daily, Morning Freiheit, was beaten up and forcibly ejected from town.

In spite of this mass picketing a friend of mine who is a member of the population of the town.  
Three times police have broken into strike committee meetings in order to get Jeanette Rubin but they were repulsed. On the fourth attempt they did drag her into the streets but here the cops met with the militant resistance of the strikers and were forced to give up the strike leader.

The bosses in conference with the strike committee have refused to give into the justified demands of the workers. These include return of the last wage cut which amounts to 7 cents and 8 cents per garment, 9 hour day and no overtime, abolition of blacklist and recognition of the shop committee.

The bosses are bringing in the Department of Labor in order to break the strike. And the workers are getting fighting advice from the farmers who are sending truckloads of food.

## Demand Relief for Unemployed Youth in Homeless, Penn.

Homeewood, Pa. — At a meeting called by the Unemployed Youth Committee at Baxter Jr. High School Auditorium, a committee of young workers, women and children was elected to go to the County Board in Pittsburgh and present the following demands:

Four dollars cash relief per week for every unemployed, single young worker, \$1.50 cash relief per week for every unemployed single young worker who lives at home, free school supplies, clothing, shoes and hot lunches for the children of the unemployed, no discrimination against Negro youths in the distribution of relief.

At the meeting young workers and children told of their miserable conditions. One child was so weak with hunger she could hardly be heard when she said: "My father hasn't worked for 2 years, my mother hasn't worked for 1 year and I go to school every morning with just a few pennies."

Already the teachers in the schools are trying to scare the children away from the demonstration by telling the children that the day the committee is to go to the Board to demand a 40 percent attendance at school.

## Demotions in Every Part Of World Demand Freedom. For 9

After eighteen months of worldwide protests the case of the Scottsboro boys comes before the highest court of the United States on October 10.  
As the Young Worker goes to press (Oct. 8) millions of workers throughout this country and every other country are demonstrating, picketing and boycotting, calling for the freedom of the nine boys who were sentenced to die on a frame-up charge of rape in Alabama.

The last week before the Supreme Court was to review the case and decide whether a new trial should be granted a powerful drive was made by young workers of the United States, led by the Communist League, to rally new forces to back up the young Negroes. The fact that the Supreme Court has been forced to take up the case is not influencing the organizations that have so far written on a victorious struggle.

**Seek to Throttle Student Rights in American Colleges**  
The stifling of all freedom of education is seen in a few recent moves of the government and the universities of America. In New York, Oakley Johnson, who has been active in the defense of political prisoners, and in the World Anti-War Congress, was dismissed as instructor at the City College in California. Leo Gallagher, an I. L. D. lawyer lost his instructor's job at the Southwestern University soon after he defended several young workers who demonstrated for the release of Tom Mooney at the Olympic Games.

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## Not Courts—The Workers Will Free Scottsboro Boys

The case of the nine Scottsboro boys comes up October 10 before the United States Supreme Court. Young and adult workers must not rely upon the "fairness" of this court which is controlled by the same bosses as control the Alabama Court which originally condemned these innocent convict class boys to the Electric Chair. Young workers must not look upon this case as an isolated example of terror against the Negro masses, this case is a symbol of the vicious campaign of terror against the entire working class, and especially the Negroes. The Negro youth among the greater part of the terror is inflicted as an attempt to smash the growing radicalization, and to smash the unity of Negro and white workers in the struggle for better conditions.

The entire world working class has voiced its protests against the burning of these boys. In Europe as well as America special youth demonstrations were held, demonstrations in which the youth showed its determination to wage an unceasing struggle for the Scottsboro boys' freedom. Mass protest succeeded in staying the hands of the boss lawyers and it will only be the united effort of the working class in militant protest that can demand "Hands off the boys of the Scottsboro boys."

As part of the growing terror against the workers in the struggle for better living conditions, in 1931, 107 lynchings took place in the United States. Most of them were kept secret. Sam Brown, state organizer of the Young Communist League, was sentenced to 6 months imprisonment for demanding relief from the Harlem Commission for a group of unemployed workers. For a similar charge a white woman was sentenced to 10 days. Jimmie Ford, young Negro pioneer leader, was sentenced to one year in the Pen for protesting against the discrimination of Negroes at the Bronx, N. Y., Bronxdale Pool.

## LIFE IN THE RED ARMY



THE RED ARMY OUT FOR SPORTS

(Fifteen years of the workers' and farmers' government in the Soviet Union will draw to a close on November 7th. What have the young workers gained because of this revolution? How do they live? In a series of articles we will attempt to answer these questions. Below is published an impression of a Red Army camp, written in his characteristic incisive style by Herwarth Walden, well-known German writer).

Yellow rectangles gravel beds, red mud, and a triumphantly roaring tractor. Several hundred horses beneath sheltering awnings. Flocks of geese. A mother hen with a considerable brood.

 "Whom shall I support in the elections?" is the question asked by eight million young fellows who are being elected to office. Still in their teens, almost unable to vote, are also asking this question. The election determines whether the family has starved miserably enough to deserve some bread, or whether it is eligible to vote "for the man and party which makes such kindness possible."

When he turns on the radio to hear a new Jazz tune so to forget his empty stomach or the latest wireless, he hears some long-tongued politician pouring forth a mountain of promises, the headline over some new campaign of which include returning prosperity, work and bread. If you add to this the fact that Jim's dad has been a staunch supporter of the Democrats for thirty years, and his girl Mary's old man a supporter of the Rep-

resent origin. This is a real mess. It consists of the prokariat with military training, which, together with his leaders, remains in constant contact with his class comrades outside the army. It takes part in daily events, political, educational, cultural.

Sections of the army take part in sports. The adopted ones are taught defense of their land. Selected Red Armywomen, in the villages, on political or cultural subjects. Assaults are rendered in any educational branch.

The Red Army accepts only those who have the Soviet franchise. In other words, producers—those who live without employing labor, who do not trade.

The Red Army is a real school of discipline, in the schools, those who are under training, were barred from education. Therefore now only they are sent through into the army, into which only a section of those eligible are accepted, for industry needs them also.

In spite of the freedom in the ranks, discipline is exemplary. Old peasants, with old memories of the times, are amazed during maneuvers, that not one chicken disappears. All orders and regulations must be in the mother tongue of the Red Armyman. In those regions where several nationalities are represented, companies are formed according to language.

Truly—the Red Armyman are free men, in the freest land there is, the USSR.

"Awakened at 6:30 the boys are taken to washrooms for a hand wash of the day. There are no toilets or washing facilities in the cells. Getting-up exercises at 7:30 are followed by breakfast at 8: At 8:55 the boys are marched out in gangs for their day of hard labor. More are employed in cleaning, repairing, road work and farming than in any other fields. This despite the fact that practically all are city bred. At 11:30 the farm laborers are marched back for lunch; at 12:30 they return to the work gang. At 3:45 they return to the yard and almost immediately have their evening meal.

"By 4:10 or 4:15 extreme quiet has fallen on the institution. This regimen is not only cruel and wasteful but is morally harmful. Most of the boys are adolescent. They are locked in their cells from 4:15 P. M. to 6:30 A. M., more than fourteen hours a day, to their emotional and mental injury."

The New Hampton reformatory is no isolated example. Similar conditions obtain in reformatory, and prisons throughout the United States especially the South.

The things you run these institutions are noted in their brutal, disciplinary methods.

 Riga—A total of 83 years in jail has been given to 12 young workers charged with the murder of members of the illegal Young Communist League of Latvia.

## 9 More Negroes Face the Electric Chair

Washington, D. C.—Nine young Negroes are held in jail here charged with murder.

This new frame-up attempt has grown out of the death of one of the most brutal cops, Milo Kennedy. Kennedy took part in shooting down the war veterans. He had previous record in smashing demonstrations of the hungry. The cops had to be known for his vicious attacks on the Negroes especially against Logan Circle where he worked. During band concerts Negroes were ordered to stand up. Those who failed to move fast enough were kicked and beaten by him. The anger of the Negroes grew. The younger fellows especially fought against these Jim-crow tactics.

Thug Kennedy decided to "get even." He arrested two young Negroes on August 6. The next day he came back for more victims. The workers related and Kennedy first drew his club, then his gun. In the final struggle Milo's head was crushed.

As usual the newspapers tried to create a lynch spirit. Negro whites and picked up on the streets and jailed. Those who were arrested the day before the death were accused. Today, as the Scottsboro nine face the Supreme Court, in what so far has been a victorious fight, the International Labor Defense has taken up the case. Logan Circle. But again, as in the Scottsboro case, not merely legal defense will free these boys, but a wave of mass protest.

## Tell of Horrible Jail Conditions

New York—A survey just made by Public School Principal Peyer for Brooklyn, shows the jail conditions under which young prisoners at the New Hampton reformatory must live. The conditions under which young prisoners between the ages of 16 and 20 are crowded together in disease infested, badly ventilated rooms. The survey states:

"Awakened at 6:30 the boys are taken to washrooms for a hand wash of the day. There are no toilets or washing facilities in the cells. Getting-up exercises at 7:30 are followed by breakfast at 8: At 8:55 the boys are marched out in gangs for their day of hard labor. More are employed in cleaning, repairing, road work and farming than in any other fields. This despite the fact that practically all are city bred. At 11:30 the farm laborers are marched back for lunch; at 12:30 they return to the work gang. At 3:45 they return to the yard and almost immediately have their evening meal.

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### YOUTH PLAYS LEADING ROLE IN N. J. STRIKE

#### Farmers Paid Less Than Cost for Prunes (By a Young Worker Correspondent)

Sacramento, Calif., 18th, 1932.—The farmers are only getting five cents a pound for the prunes this year. The big corporations give the farmers a disgraceful price for the prunes and then sell them and make a big profit.

The farmers say that it doesn't pay to harvest the fruit this year. The farmers are going into the red every year as the result of these robbers.

The corporations promised the farmers 1½ cents a pound for their prunes and when the farmers bring them into the packing houses they always find something wrong with the prunes and only pay the farmers 1½ cents a pound for the prunes. They said the prunes for 8 cents a pound and then took them off the farmers at a cent and a half.

#### Girls Mistreated in R. C. A. Factory (By a Young Worker Correspondent)

Cleveland.—Two weeks ago the girls in the meeting department of the R. C. A. factory received a 5¢ wage cut. We have been told by Mr. Springstead that we got out because of a piece of trouble at home. The other day he sent a girl home at 11. The girls had three rejections by that time.

Another boss, Mr. Church, tries to take advantage of us; if we refuse to go out with him, he sees that we get fired.

When any of us gets ill, and we go to get medical care, there is a young doctor who makes us strip and paw us all over. He doesn't have to do it, but because we do not stick together, the bosses and their agents take advantage of us. They make us work fast and if we don't they cut our wages and fire us. We are treated like a bunch of animals. If any of us happen to feel ill we have to tell the whole history of our lives before we can leave the factory earlier.

There is no reason why we should aggravate ourselves with such conditions. We can do something about them. We can organize ourselves into groups in every department, in every unit. If we stick together, they won't fire us.

#### Shutting Down Auto Plant in Toledo, O.

Toledo, Ohio.—The Willys-Overland factory, the largest factory in the city of Toledo which employs from 500 to 700 young workers, is shutting down various departments. Other departments will only work a day a week or whenever the bosses call the men in. The young workers in the Willys Overland have been working on starvation wages and now they will not even receive this.

The Social Service Federation in Toledo states that it is unable to help the young, single workers.

Young workers of the Overland should organize into the Unemployed Councils and fight for immediate relief. Organize in the factory to force wage cuts and the speed-up system.

#### Strike of Dress Workers Over; Win Concessions in Spite of Terror (By Lloyd Brown)

South River, N. J.—In the fierce struggle of the 1,700 striking dressmakers in South River, New Jersey, which lasted for 3 weeks, the young workers played a heroic role. The majority of the strikers were young girls; these served on the strike committee, on the relief committee, and picketed in masses. Their voices were the first to be raised in protest against the wile-out tactics of Mr. Koffler, of the U. S. Department of Labor.

#### General Electric Wages Cut 20-50% (Schenebady, N. Y.)

Schenecady, N. Y.—The most horrible conditions exist in the General Electric plant at Schenecady. A hardy writes a young worker of that plant. The youth employed at the plant have had their wages cut from 20 to 50% and are now earning 9-8 dollars a week under the most vicious speed-up conditions. On the 2nd floor of the plant the drill press workers just as many hours make from 3.4 dollars a week or about 15 to 25 cents an hour. Similar conditions are the same throughout the entire plant.

#### These are some of the young strikers arrested for fighting the miserable wages. Many are still held in jail. The International Labor Defense is defending those jailed.

All the young workers in town factories had to shut down. Not only the young workers from the dress shops came out in protest on the day of the funeral, but also 400 young girls of the General Electric factory took part forcing the shop to suspend for the morning.

#### 1,200 at Debate; Y. P. S. L. Falls to Come

Baltimore.—Twenty-nine children have been brought into the hospitals suffering from lead poisoning. The disease, according to doctors, "comes from the burning of storage batteries in many homes in Baltimore, chiefly among the poorer and colored classes."

The report of the doctors on the disease which is continuing to work havoc among the workers' children states "when the poison gets into the blood stream it is very dangerous because it often causes mental degeneracy."

#### Girls in Baltimore Canning Co. Work 24-Hour Shifts for \$1.45 (By a Young Worker Correspondent)

Baltimore.—In the Booth & Olbbe Packing Co. over 250 young workers were slaving away at a canning ketchup for very low wages. The majority of them are girls. A few days ago a young girl worked 24 hours straight, many of the other girls are doing the same. They start at 4 in the morning and work until the next morning. Then after staying home for 24 hours they start the work over again. Their average wage is from \$1.45 to \$1.75. These girls are being made to separate the tomatoes are getting 16 cents an hour while the men get 20 cents. The girls that kill the tomatoes are getting 4 cents a basket and the most they can get in 24 hours is 20 baskets.

#### Young Mine Leader Released From Jail (By a Young Worker Correspondent)

We print below an excerpt from a letter that has just been received from Bob Young, member of the Young Communist League who was released from a Pennsylvania jail last week after serving 11 months for his activity in the strike of last year.

Comrade Young, who was shot by a constable during the strike, was released together with Tom Myerwood, leader of the National Miners Union.

Dear Comrades—A few words now about the comrades still being in the jail. Out of this number there are 2 young comrades, Edie Thompson, who was given 2 years, is to come out in May. Edie Thompson is serving 3-6 years and Stella 2 years. The spirit of the comrades is still good. Leo's spirit is great. Because he proved to have the courage of his convictions he was singled out and spent 2 months in solitary confinement and was in the hole twice. He is sick and in bad shape. I left him in the hospital. Three weeks ago he was operated on his left arm.

#### 18-Hour Day Pays \$1.80 for Youths (By a Young Worker Correspondent)

Bellingham, Wash.—A furniture factory was built here 9 hours and under construction it was stated by the owners that this would better the conditions of the workers. They got young fellows from other cities and put them to work. Some of those working get 2 dollars or less for 9 hours and others put in 13½ to 15 and even 18 hours a day at piece work. If they are good they make \$1.80. Many of the fellows have to support families on such wages.

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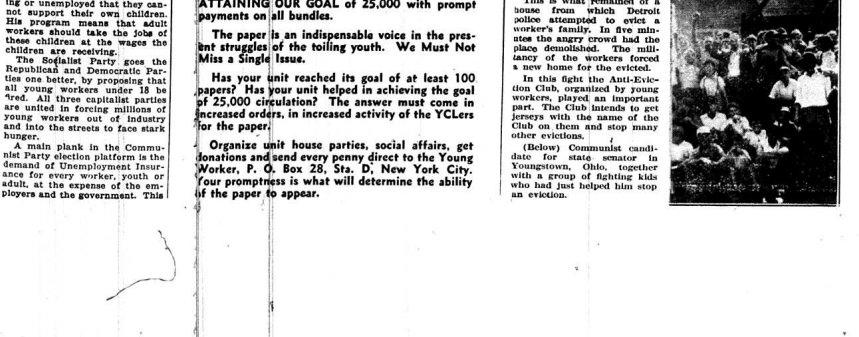

The police at this instance increased their force of uniformed and plainclothes thugs who broke up the demonstration through carrying of the above attacks.

### Release Keith, Y. C. L. Organizer in Boston

Boston, Mass.—Irving Keith, Y. C. L. organizer, arrested and brutally beaten after demonstrating for unemployed relief on Boston Common last February, was released this week after a 7-month captivity.

His release was forced by the mass protest of workers organizations. From the day sentence was pronounced Gov. Eli's office was almost raided on a daily basis by the police. The mass arrests are result of the rapidly growing revolutionary movement.

### Steel Wages in South Cut to Less Than Half; Make 18 Cents an Hour

Birmingham, Ala.—I know you would like to hear about conditions here so I am writing this work in the American Casting Pipe Co. The bosses care nothing at all for the workers. They have cut the wages down to less than half. We used to get from \$3 to \$3.50 a day for an 8 hour day. Now we get 18 cents per hour—which means \$1.44 per day. And we only get 1 or 2 days in a week.

The biggest portion of the workers are young workers who are getting lower wages than the adult workers and do the heavy and dirty work.

All the workers in the shop must organize. The only organization for the American Casting is Steel and Metal Workers Industrial Union. We must build up the union so we can fight against the rotten conditions and for more wages on the job.

Here's my "Statement of Earnings" for this week. You notice it is issued when "net amount is less than \$1." And believe me, there are plenty of these statements being issued. My "net earnings" have been to six cents for this week. I've seen others as low as four and some girls with, buy some clothes and for the money they need.

There are not many belonging to the G.E.U., and the recreation building is almost deserted. Most workers do not belong to the G.E.U. because it is just a dollar, too. Just notice all the things you can get deducted from your wages! They are taking 2 per cent off for the Unemployment Relief Fund, too. # Foster Calls on Youth to Vote Red

## Only Communists Struggle For Young Workers Needs

On November 8th, many of you will vote for the first time in a national election. Which of the present four political parties are you going to vote for? Which of these parties represents your interests and has a program which can provide work and bread for the starving youth?

The Republican Party appeals to the masses to support the present hunger government. Its main contention is that if it were not for Hoover and the Republican administration, conditions would be much worse. However, what have been the policies of the Republican administration ad who do they represent?

Hoover Represents Wall Street  
The policies of Mr. Hoover and the Republican Party have been the policies of their masters in Wall Street. Everything that Mr. Hoover did in his four years of office was for the benefit of the capitalist class, the millionaires and billionaires. In 1929 Mr. Hoover presented "a chicken in every pot and two autos in every garage." Instead he helped give bread lines. In 1929 Mr. Hoover primed the workers' pockets. There would be no wage-cut. Instead the wages of the workers have fallen more than 25 per cent.

Mr. Hoover, the puppet of Wall Street, has refused to give any relief whatsoever to the starving workers and farmers. Under the phrase "rugged individualism," he has rejected every proposal for unemployment insurance and immediate relief. Instead, the present government formed the Reconstruction Finance Corporation which raised four billion dollars for "poor" bankers. The present government has a also appropriated billions of dollars for increased armaments but nothing for the hungry masses.

Mr. Roosevelt and the "Forgotten Man"  
The Democratic Party and especially its candidate Mr. Roosevelt, poses as a radical in the election campaign. Nothing is further from the truth. Mr. Roosevelt and his party represent the same interests as does Mr. Hoover and the Republican Party. Roosevelt hopes to cap the votes of the starving masses by beautiful phrases about the "forgotten man." But Mr. Roosevelt's record shows the difference between his words and deeds.

For four years Mr. Roosevelt has been governor of the State of New York. During this period of time not one step was taken by the "radical" to feed the hungry masses. Mr. Roosevelt in a recent speech attacked Wall Street. But what did he do? Mr. Roosevelt cut Wall Street from his mind for four years so as to provide relief for the workers.

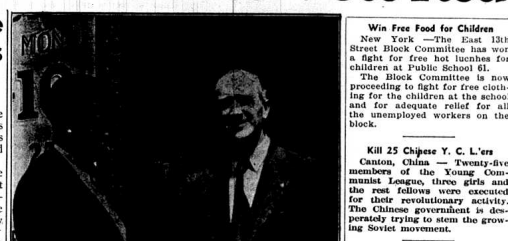
Bullets Instead of Bread  
Mr. Roosevelt had state troops, beat and arrest unemployed workers, and deny them any help for relief. It is this different than the policy of Mr. Hoover.

Vote For These Demands

1. Unemployment and social insurance at the expense of the state and employers.
2. Against Hoover's wage-cutting policy.
3. Emergency relief for the impoverished farmers without restrictions by the government and banks; exemption of impoverished farmers from taxes, and no forced collection of rents or debts.
4. Equal rights for the Negroes and self-determination for the Black Belt.
5. Against capitalist terror against all forms of suppression of the political rights of the workers.
6. Against imperialist war; for the defense of the Chinese people and of the Soviet Union.

Besides the above main demands the Young Communist League fights for the following additional youth demands.

1. For the right of all over 18 years of age to vote, including soldiers and sailors.
2. No discrimination against young workers, Negro or white, in unemployment relief or insurance.
3. Abolition of child labor under 14; government support for all children now working and for all children of unemployed workers.
4. Equal pay for equal work for all young and adult workers.
5. Against all forms of bosses militarism.

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### Hunger March Plans Done, Increase in Local Struggles

Plans for the National Hunger March to Washington have been completed. Three thousand delegates marching in eight columns from every corner of the starvation-stricken U. S. will proceed to Washington to demand Fifty Dollars immediate winter relief to supplement local relief and unemployment insurance at the expense of the bosses and government.

In last year's march there were about 1,500 delegates and only four lines of march. The marchers will sweep the city, neighborhood groups, Unemployed Councils, A. P. of L. unions and all organizations ready to participate in struggle with the masses.

In preparation for the march local struggles have begun to sweep the country. In Chicago on Oct. 30 a huge united front march was held with the participation of about 10,000 workers. In London the march is expected to participate in the Youth Struggle for Washington are part of the huge waves of unemployed struggles.

Vienna, Oct. 31.—Following the attacks made on Jewish students at the University here, by fascists, a force of police has been stationed to keep the peace. This step was taken to protect rich American students who protested to the Consul that they were beaten in the general battle.

### British Mill Workers Strike

Manchester, England.—Over seventy thousand British textile workers have struck refusing to sign a new wage agreement. The union officials had put into a contract with the bosses that workers starting in July and had gone back on the promise that their leaders would fix the matter up.

A National Children's Hunger Delegation is being organized to place demands before Hoover on Nov. 24, Thanksgiving Day and to expose the meanness of his appeal for the children to give relief.

Y.M.C.A. Trains Youth To Smash Strikes

Coming into a Y.M.C.A. in Christ Church, a New Zealand worker saw about fifty young fellows going through physical drill. They received an order from the instructor to form into two lines facing each other each fellow picking up a baton. They then proceeded to go through the motions of hitting each other first in the jaw and then in the knees with these batons. This training continued for several months. These same fellows were later used to work with the police in beating down unemployed workers and tramway strikers in the same city.

860 Workers Win Demands After Four Day Strike

Trenton, N. J.—After a strike lasting four days, 860 workers of the Regal Doll Co. won a smash victory. The result of the concentration work carried out by the Y.C.L. Given correct evidence by the Young Communist League the young workers in the shop were able to better organized and struck solidly against the rotten conditions.

Unemployed youth came in masses uniting with the strikers on the picket line. An average of 5,000 workers participated in the picketing. Police dared not interfere. Once they made an attempt and the workers answered by tearing up the pavement and breaking windows. Fifteen cars carrying scabs were wrecked and the scabs scattered. Many of the youth in the shop are joining the Young Communist League, determined to defend their gains and prepare for unemployed struggles this winter when the shop closes down.

FORCE LAWRENCE MAYOR TO STAY AT HUNGER MEET

Lawrence, Mass., October 21.—"Sit down Mayor White and for us to get to the truth!" This was the cry of the 350 workers of the Springfield, Mass., Textile Co. who gathered on Oak St., Friday evening at the Springfield Youth Hunger Hearing held under the auspices of the Youth Committee of the Springfield Textile Co. Mayor White attempted to leave in the middle of the hearing but was greeted by his effort to excuse his responsibility for the starvation of the children of Lawrence. At the Mayor sat down and listened.

The hearing opened with the hall jammed for a half hour before the proceedings began. Joe Adams, Council member of the Young Communist League opened the meeting and introduced Martin Ruskak. Ruskak, speaking in the name of the Unemployed Council of Lawrence charged Mayor White with direct responsibility for the starvation of the children and young workers of Lawrence. He proved that "White had given the owners of the American Woolen Co. \$285,000 in tax rebates at the same time that 800 relief cases had been cut off during the last month."

Following the completion of the demands of the children for Free food, clothing, shoes and medical attention. Buller Mendes questioned the first child who testified and brought out the fact that out of the 85 children in his class only 3 could afford to buy a bill of milk for four cents, also that he ate only tea and bread for breakfast, lunch and supper. Following the testimony of the children, the Mayor got up and pleaded that he was not responsible for the condition of the children. He stated that he was the back to Alderman Burke, in charge of the Public Department who was also present.

With the ending of the Mayor's speech, Mass. Labor also of the Youth Committee of the Unemployed Council raised the report of Dr. Abrahamson who had been examining a number of children in the meantime. This report showed that all children were underweight, emaciated, denourished and suffering from lack of food and medical attention. Forty workers joined the Unemployed Council including ten young workers. An action committee was elected.

YOUTH FORCED TO STEAL BY HUNGER GETS PRISON TERM

Normal, Conn. — Ed was a Frank of Murray St., this city, was given thirty days in the County Jail at Bridgeport for "stealing." It is a case of a young boy from an open field owned by Philip Saviano of Westport. Frank is a young worker of 22 in the building trades and has been unemployed for eight months. Being single, without friends and a citizen of New York, he was not considered eligible for the new meagre relief of the town of Norwalk according to "law" unemployed.

The fact that he did not touch valuable lumber in a house under construction only a few feet away confirms the fact that Frank "steal" only to survive hunger. Although the owner of the field did not press the case, Deputy Judge Jago, a Republican, informed the conference, members of the conference, considered "the most severe in this country" an effort to "intimidate the unemployed."

STARVING CHILD TRIES TO COMMIT SUICIDE IN CLASS

Detroit, Mich. — George Terban, 15 years old, 1933 Fleming St., attempted suicide in his classroom on the 21st of October at Nolan Intermediate School because of hunger. The boy tried to cut his throat but only wounded himself. "I haven't been able to get enough food. My folks haven't any money," said George. The story was verified. Mr. and Mrs. Terban said, "We have been eating stuff we found in garbage pails. We have not been able to get relief from the welfare. Neighbors occasionally give us food, but there is some too well off themselves," the boy's parents said.

The father said that his son has repeatedly threatened to end his life. "I might as well kill myself, you can not feed me," were the words George used before he was moved to Virginia in hopes of getting work in mines. To the disappointment of his parents, he returned to Detroit, unsuccessful. His residence in Detroit is not continuous for the past year so they are unable to get help. 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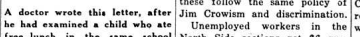

**Expose Bad Conditions in Two RCA Plants**

**Girls Kept Like Prisoners In New York Charity Outfit**

The Girl's Service League called the girls the Girl's Nervous System. The employment agency gives you a long intelligence test, they tell you what work you are suited for, as if it makes any difference. Then they tell you to come next day, and then they tell you the next day to come the next day, just to pretend they have something worthwhile.

Jobs they give rarely pay more than 9 dollars a week. Anyone who wants cheap labor calls them Housework jobs they have are terrible. The hours of labor are about 14 hours a day, and you are treated like a dog, because you know you come from the girls service league. Then they have opportunity homes where the girls get about 2 dollars a week and their board and have to work about 6 hours a day.

**PLACE LIKE JAIL**  
 Some people say the place must be very nice to keep you. Girls are not allowed to look for their own jobs, in the mornings you are taken to stay a great while, a girl is allowed to look for her own job, but this, they have to get a special permit for, and it is greatly discouraging. Their jobs are usually temporary rarely lasting more than a couple of weeks. The girls have to give half their pay to Miss Nelson, "Salvation Nel, Nellie. They are told that their pay goes for food and the expenses of the place and so salaries for the social workers. The truth is that they get their food free and the special workers are paid by the City like all social work-ers. The money really goes to Miss Wilson for her side of the house and Miss Nelson for hers. The girls who work pay half of their little salary to Nellie. As a result they are unable to save because of having to pay for their lunch and care and clothing with what's left.

It is practically impossible to get out of the place once you are in. A first they treat you nice to encourage you to stay. Nellie does no work around the place, and while she preaches to the girls about morals she brings men. Many poor girls have been thrown into the streets and made to protest themselves because of this "Charity Organization" actually a jail for poor defenseless girls.

**FORCED TO PROSTITUTE**  
 The girls are encouraged to go down to the Soldiers and S-lors home on 34 St. on Saturday night. By refusing money to the girls which they need for stockings, by refusing to allow them to go out and look for jobs, these girls are encouraged to go out and pick up men.

**WORK 96 HOURS WEEKLY IN BALTIMORE PAPER FACTORY**

(By a Young Worker Correspondent)

BALTIMORE, Md. The Chesapeake Paperboard Co., which is located in Locust Point, is a free prison camp. The workers are free 15 hours out of every 168 hours. The workers do not work as human beings but as machines. They work in slop and water all over their feet. In some places, the foremen throw trucks and materials to the shipping room.

Working time is 13 hours straight, they have lunch period, they eat in between hours. Wages are as low as 2 1/2 cents an hour. The conditions are so bad and unsanitary that the machines they will burst and injure many. The Health Department doesn't do anything about the place. The foremen drive the workers as slaves, one man does the work two. The greed of Mr. Smith sways drives the workers to slow death.

**Pay Different Wages For Same Work To Divide Girls**

NEWARK, N. J.—I am writing about conditions in Harrison because I happen to know what's going on there.

Most of the workers are young girls, working at a back breaking speed. Because the girls are made to work so fast, the work is put out ahead of time, and the girls find themselves getting vacations without pay. Not only did this happen, but the whole factory was put on a seven hour day, four day week because the production was made in fast time, and then there wasn't enough work. This meant a big cut in the girls pay. Another way of making the girls pay up, is by putting them on piece work, at the same time giving them low prices for the work.

**Three Days Pay In 3 Weeks at Cleveland RCA**

(By a Young Worker Correspondent)

CLEVELAND, Ohio.—How are the girls going to live for 3 weeks on a 3 day pay! We have just had a 10 day lay off for Thanksgiving, and no sooner we got back on the job we get on a 2 week lay off for Christmas. Some of us may not even be taken back after the Christmas lay-off.

The losses will tell us to have a "Merry Christmas" and "Happy New Year", but they will be the ones to enjoy these things and us. How will we enjoy our Christmas holidays without decent food in our stomachs, let alone gifts for our families.

**ARREST 4 CHARLOTTE JOBLESS FIGHTERS**

CHARLOTTE, N. C., November 24, 1932.—Four young workers were arrested here on Wednesday, the day before Thanksgiving for demanding Thanksgiving baskets for Charlotte unemployed. They were speaking to several hundred young and adult workers before the Salvation Army gates at the time the Salvation Army announced it would give out the baskets. Thousands of Charlotte workers are denied all relief and are terrorized by the Salvation Army henchmen and police. Young workers get no relief at all.

Allen Morrow, young Negro worker began speaking to the crowd, and when arrested Edith Boyd, another young Negro worker, began speaking. The police attacked and dragged Elizabeth Caldwell, District Organizer of the Young Communist League and Lydia Frank, member of the crowd. All four spoke to the workers from the police car. They have not been given a trial yet and a prohibitive bond of \$200 has been set upon each one of the young workers.

Unemployed workers have announced a demonstration of protest against the terroristic practices employed by the Salvation Army to force workers to take their starvation handouts quietly.

**Wages for Full Week \$3.50 in Shoe Plant**

(By a Young Worker Correspondent)

Editor Young Worker:

The shoe factory is known all over Brooklyn as the black sheep of the factories. Workers apply for a job there as a last resort. We work piece-work which of course is speed-up. So that if you go and take a drink it is "on your own time." We're supposed to work from 7:45 to 5:30 but very often we stay as late as 7 o'clock and even later to finish the amount we're expected to do. Many of us work part of the half hour we have for lunch for fear of being too slow. On Saturdays we work until 3 or 4 o'clock without a lunch hour.

With all the cases we get back to do over and the many things for which we get charged we can't make enough to live. My last week's pay was \$3.50.

**FARM RELIEF PARLEY OPENS AT WASHINGTON**

WASHINGTON, D. C. — With delegates here from 24 states already the National Farm Relief Conference set to work on Dec. 7. Although many groups have not yet arrived about 70 young farmers have registered. At the first session Maki from Massachusetts spoke on the necessity of winning young farmers in the fight for relief.

The farm conference, largest of its kind ever held, as called by a united front committee of representatives from various organizations. Only the United Farmers League however, has officially endorsed it.

For real farm relief. Thousands of farmers have been dispossessed and millions more face foreclosures this winter with prices of their products set to the bone. Not the workers in the cities have not benefited from these low prices but the profiteers who handle the goods before they get to the cities.

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**First Communist Mayor Elected**

WINNEAPOLIS, Minn. — Emil Mygard, young metal miner of Crosby, Minn., has been elected the first Communist mayor in the United States in municipal elections held there last week. Mygard was a candidate for railroad and warehouse commissioner on the Communist state ticket in the November elections receiving nearly ten thousand votes in the state.

Two other candidates on the workers' ticket, not Communist Party members were also elected. These are Frank Plut for trustee and Fred Richter for assessor.

The election of Mygard is an indication of the reaction of workers to defend the Soviet Union, for all during the campaign the capitalist press carried on a furious campaign against alleged Soviet dumping of manganese ore in this country. This is the product produced in Crosby.

**1200 Miles With A Marcher**

Elected at a united front conference in Kansas City, Mo. red haired Ellen Allen, daughter of a former farmer, traveled 1200 miles in a battered 1925 model Willys Knight to Washington along with five other delegates.

"We made St. Louis twenty four hours later and its only 266 miles. We pushed and pulled and pounded away at the rickety buggy to get her going. There was no food, we slept on the floor.

"As Vincennes, Ind" continued Ellen Allen "we tried to hold a meeting to do it everywhere else we stopped. Four cops came over and tried to overturn the speaker car. The speaker warned them: "If you don't get out of here you'll be in trouble." Hearing this and seeing the determined crowd of marchers standing about the cops changed their minds.

"I noticed especially in the little farming towns, that when the people saw us coming they were just overwhelmed with joy. They threw up their arms, and begged to greet us. Old farmers with beards six inches long included. In every city we were received with enthusiasm. When we were going through St. Louis workers threw cans of food into our cars.

"Every place we went people wanted to join our march. But we didn't have cars to carry them."

"The column was taken to the camp." Here there was no water. Twice a day a truck was allowed through with some water. There were no toilet facilities. The men with hills surrounding. Up on top they paraded with tear gas bombs. At the opening in the road they stood four deep. They swore at all night long the young fellows marched up and down singing and cheering. Every once in a while the Red Front Band would strike up a tune. "It was a real fighting army of workers with the youth, who made up the majority of the delegates the backbone. One Negro fellow, Alvin Johnson, from the poorest section of Kansas City expressed the spirit of the Marchers when he said: "If I don't get unemployment insurance we're just going to keep on camping until we get it! Never before have I seen from home Johnson had it seemed as if there would be no truck."

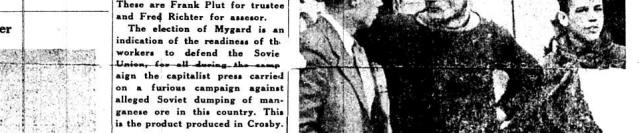

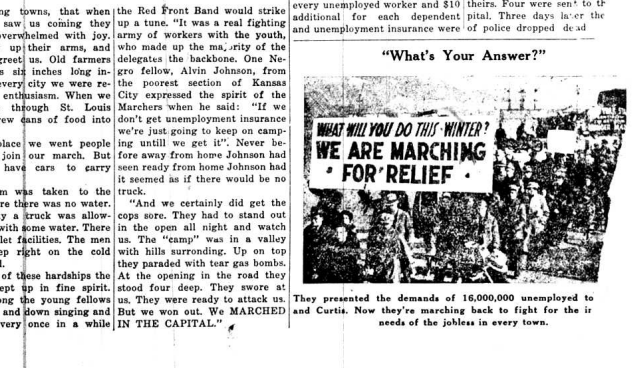

Farm and Factory Youth Suffer Alike

As Low As Two Dollars A Week In Missouri Bag Co.

(By a Young Worker Correspondent)

ST. LOUIS, Mo. — We girls of Missouri Bag Company in St. Louis must work from 9 to 14 hours a day. Some of us (only about 2 or 3) make at the most seven dollars a week, working 7 days. Some of us make 36 cents or less a day. On the average we make about 4 or 5 dollars a week.

If we are found eating before 9 or after lunch we are fined 50 cents which is taken out of our weekly pay. We get only 30 minutes for lunch which is not enough even to reach the lunch room.

If we come in later than 23 minutes after seven we are fined 15 cents. We start at 7:30.

When Mr. Goretzky comes to see if we are working hard enough

for him we cannot stop or speak one word.

We workers in Missouri Bag factory must organize into a shop committee and fight to better these terrible conditions.

(Editorial Note.)—The writer of this letter is correct when he sees organization of a shop committee as a method to fight for better conditions. It can be done by getting several fellow-workers in one department together and form a department committee. In this department, if a fight is to be waged against some bad conditions, other workers will be convinced that organization helps. The first group should get connections in other departments with the same thing in view. Always attempting to draw in the most important department in the shop, the organization will gradually spread all over the shop.

WHITE EARTH, N. Dak. — I am writing this letter so that the industrial workers will not have the idea that we tillers of the soil are satisfied.

Our parents came here about 25 years ago with flaming hopes and high prices. On the land which was donated to them by the government they worked from dawn to dusk, to clear the land, to remove the stones and build a home. They thought that in their old age they would be rewarded with a home and that their children would not have to work hard.

Ninety percent did not make it except for the bankers and machine companies. Here and there we can find exception who came early and got the best land. These the capitalist press dangles before the country as proof of how good farmers have it.

Now there remains just the roughest and stoniest land of these picked over rock infested tracts. Around us we have plenty examples of others who failed under conditions seven times. In working out there's only one way out.

Contrary to the teaching in school, the average farm boy today has no more chance to become rich than a lone rabbit has to beat up on a palace of mount-ain lions.

But he has a chance to start doing a man's job in the field at the age of 12 and perhaps soon may have a chance to defend "his" country on foreign soil.

When wheat was a dollar a bushel, flax \$3.00, barley 75 cents, cream a dollar a gallon the farmers didn't make expenses but were steadily going into debt. Now the market 35 cents for No. 1 wheat, flax at 86 cents, oats 5 cents, barley 2 cents.

Four years ago farm laborers were paid from \$50 to \$80 a month sometimes for eight or ten months. This summer many farmers hired none at all and a few for 2 months at wages from 15 to \$20 per month.

The farmers are making very little improvements now. Buying no more than they absolutely need and barb wire is playing a more and more important role in farm life.

This forced scimping is not helping the workers in the cities any.

"Hoover the farmer" promised that there would be farm relief when he was elected in 1928. We have been relieved of anything that has been profitable. Now we can only be relieved of debts and high taxes.

Negro Croppers Murdered; Lynch Terror Sharpens

DEATH TOLL MOUNTS IN ALABAMA; MASS PROTEST RISING

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (CNA).—The number of dead resulting from the attack of southern landlords on the Negro share-croppers of Reelton, Alabama on December 19, is mounting rapidly. Three share-croppers are definitely known to be dead. Unofficial reports put the number dead as high as seven.

Two of the murdered Negro share-croppers died as a result of the refusal of all medical attention when they were taken, seriously wounded by gun-shot, to the Montgomery County jail. They are Clifford James, leader of the Share-Croppers' Union, and Milo Bentley. John McMillen, Negro share-cropper, died in the first attack.

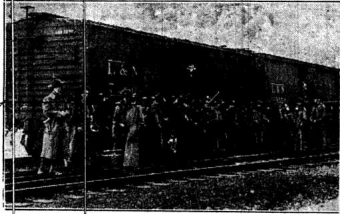
The bloody attack and reign of terror of the landlords has not smothered the determination of the Negro and white share-croppers in their fight against eviction from the land and confiscation of their work animals and farm implements.

The lynch-terror is spreading. Sheriffs are searching the cabins of white share-croppers because it is known that they are hiding fugitive Negro croppers and are in sympathy with the aims of the Share-Croppers Union.

The Congress adopted resolutions pointing out that the basic causes of war are to be found in the capitalist system. The Congress called for the recognition of the Soviet Union by the USA and for support of the colonized peoples in their fight for national liberation. It was resolved that the Congress develop constant struggles in the schools for the abolition of military training.

The Congress extended its fraternal greetings to the students of other countries "who are struggling against their respective governments, shoulder to shoulder with their comrades, the revolutionary workers and peasants."

A committee of fifteen representing all shades of opinion was elected to carry on the work of the Congress after it adjourned.

Child Dies Of Hunger

HILLSIDE, N. J. — Another baby victim has been added to the horrible and growing list of death from starvation. Lillian, 9 year old girl died on Christmas Eve in the Elizabeth Hospital.

Her parents, unemployed, were unable to give her even so much as a glass of milk per day. There are 4 other children in the family

breaking these months she's been slipping away. She'd cry for things for heat, for food—Mamma can't I have this; Mamma can't I have that; she couldn't understand I had no money.

I begged on the streets, begged for pennies to buy the things she needed. The policeman came down here and told me to 'cut it out!' They'd arrest me, I was afraid.

We had no heat. I'd got out on the dumps to pick up stuff to burn and get up at night when she cried from the cold and make a fire for her. But I couldn't keep her alive. She's gone now.

The Unemployed Councils and the Young Pioneers are organizing a fight for relief for this families and others in this city.

The death of this baby from hunger and want came at the same time that the State Children's "Forced Labor" Starvation. The father of this family has been out of work for two years, the only relief this family got was through the "forced-labor" system—a small amount of groceries for work for the city.

In speaking about the tragic death of little Lillian the mother says: "My heart is breaking; it's been



Lenin, Liebknecht and Luxemburg

COMRADE LENIN, leader of the first victorious workers struggle to overthrow capitalism, was born April 10, 1870 at Simbirsk. KARL LIEBKNECHT was born in Germany August, 1871 while his father, a famous workingclass leader was in prison, for revolutionary activities. He studied law in Kazan, but did not practice law as early in life he devoted his time to organizing the workers in the struggle for freedom from boss rule.

In the early '90s he joined the

Social Democratic Party. He organized and led the Bolshevik (majority) section of the Party; later he led the spitting of this group of revolutionaries away from the corrupt and betraying organization of the Socialists, the Mensheviks.

Exiled from Russia in 1903 did not stop his tireless leadership in the struggle against the Czar. After the first (February) revolution in 1917 he returned.

He was the main leader of the successful revolution of the workers and peasants in October, 1917, which established the Soviet Government.

Under his leadership the Communist International, the world revolutionary leadership of the workingclass, was founded in 1919.

Comrade Lenin always paid special attention to the development of the revolutionary youth

movement, pointing out that the young Communist International must be a school of Communism. Lenin died on January 21, 1924. ROSA LUXEMBURG was born in Poland in 1870. She was forced to leave school because of her youthful revolutionary activities. At the age of 18 she was forced to flee to Switzerland to escape exile to Siberia.

He led the unsuccessful revolt of the German workers against the Kaiser's military system.

He served in many government offices as the representative of the German workingclass. He never betrayed the trust of the workers in him.

In 1907 he organized the first International of Youth in Stuttgart.

Because of his special interest

in the young workers he is known throughout the world as the champion of the rights of the youth.

He fought valiantly against the World War; was the only Socialist who voted against the war credits. Because of his courageous anti-militarist activities he was imprisoned again for four years.

The German revolution released him from his cell. He led the successful

revolution of the German workers against the Socialist betrayers who got into power and sold out the workers to the boss class, in 1919.

He was murdered by the Socialist Party leaders on January 15, 1919.

He led the unsuccessful revolt of the German workers against the Kaiser's military system.

She was the leader of the left-wing of the Polish Socialist Party and carried on a struggle against the opportunist betrayers in that Party.

She had many wrong ideas and theories. For instance she took an incorrect position on the national question (she opposed the slogan of national independence of Poland which was then a part of the Russian Empire).

At the outbreak of the World War she bitterly opposed it and fought and exposed the Socialist Party betrayers. She, too, was a leader of the Spartacus group in Germany and was murdered with Liebknecht by agents of the Socialist Party on January 15, 1919.

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10,000 AUTO WORKERS ON STRIKE

Shackled, Tortured on Southern Chain Gang

N. J. BOY, 14, TELLS OF BOSS BRUTALITY IN S. C. PRISON CAMP

NEWARK, N. J.—David Kraft, 14-year-old Newark boy, has been home, fortunate in escaping the life of horror in a South Carolina chain-gang.

His story of brutality and torture, chains and the bloody lash, was told to a Newark YOUNG WORKER reporter.

Confined at his parents' home, still hearing the scars and pines of the terrible experiences of the southern bosses chain gang system, he said:

"I ran away from home on Christmas Day, intending to hitch hike down to Florida. The first day I got out was as Philadelphia. From there I went down to Baltimore, stopping over there in a boy house.

"The next two nights I stayed home and sold out the workers to the boss class, in 1919.

"It was in Greenville, South Carolina, that I got arrested. It happened like this: I asked a fellow on the street for a cigarette. He asked me if I wanted a job, and when I said yes, he told me to 'come along.'

"This guy turned out to be a plain-clothes dick. He took me down to the police station; there I was booked for 'vagrancy.'

"Although I didn't have a lawyer or anything, I got sentenced to a \$10 fine. Monday morning they sent me off to the chain gang.

"The very first day I got a terrible beating with a big strap with holes cut into it because I talked to another kid from Paterson, N. J. They treated all of us terrible.

"Finally I snatched a letter to send to my father. I told him about the awful situation I was in and asked him to send me the money to pay my fines.

"I'm sure glad he did. The guard we had threatened to kill me, because I told him I was sick and couldn't work. At night I was chained on my back. I saw the movie about the chain gangs and everything in it sure is true."

News Notes

DRESDEN, Germany.—Ninety Communists were murdered in total blood by the police of this city. This atrocious crime occurred when the police attempted to smash an Anti-Fascist rally called by the Communist Party. Eleven other workers were injured.

Despite all reactionary measures of the government the Communist Party is leading the masses of workers in the struggle against the bloody fascist terror.

PARIS, France.—The International Committee Against War, which was established by the Amsterdam World Congress Against War, has just decided to issue a bulletin calling for a World Anti-War Youth Congress this fall. The date has not been set.

SANTIAGO, Chile.—One hundred school teachers have been listed as "dangerous Communist agitators."

Editors throughout the country recommend drastic measures to end the work of the road, which is especially evident in the public schools.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Neil Anderson, instructor in sociology at Columbia, reported to a Congressional Committee that the number of homeless girls in increasing even faster than the number of boys.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Miss Grace Abbott, Chief of the Children's Bureau, sent the Congressional Committee a report from officials of the Southern Pacific showing that 68,457 persons riding the freights were ejected from their trains in 1932 as compared to 79,215 in 1929. 75 per cent of these "free passengers" were of color.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—World High Explosives, Inc. of Washington has paid \$2,800,890 for 40 high speed Martin bombing planes.

This new type of plane is said to be able to carry 2000 pounds of high explosives in excess of 200 miles per hour.

The military budget this year will include millions of dollars increase over last year. All signs point to a speedy preparation for imperialist war.

Win All Demands in Two Shops; Struggle Spreads

Young Workers Take Active Part; Solid With Adult Strikers

DETROIT, Mich., Jan. 26.—With electrifying speed the strike of auto workers in six units of the two key plants of Briggs Auto Body and Motor Products Co. is spreading until at the present writing it embraces fully ten thousand workers. Many young workers are on strike.

The auto workers Union is leading the strikers through broad elected rank and file strike committees.

Already the two strikes in the Bridge (Vernon Highway) and Motor Products have been successful. For the former, after two weeks of a half days of mass picketing, was successful in forcing the bosses to take back a 20 per cent wage cut and a guarantee that none of the strikers would be fired. Those workers have gone back almost 100 per cent organized.

The Motor Products strike of 1,800 workers employed in making accessories for the huge Ford plant also won an amazing victory after two days of mass picketing under the leadership of the Auto Workers Union.

The workers of this plant, 20 per cent of whom are young workers, mostly girls, went on strike for a 15 per cent increase in wages to offset the 15 per cent they got the first of the year.

In addition to winning the 15 per cent increase, the strikers won the following demands: 90 cents an hour minimum for all girls, 40 cents an hour minimum for all piece workers, recognition of the shop committee, full pay for waiting time, strikers to be paid for time out on strike, and several other demands.

The strikers won by their militant struggle and mass picketing. Fully 20 per cent of the workers in this plant are now organized, including all of the young.

WORK TO SPREAD STRIKE. With definite proof that strikers can be won during the "depression" of labor, most of the industry, the strike movement in the auto industry is spreading. A special leaflet has been issued by the Auto Workers Union to the Ford plant, calling upon them to join in the struggle against wage cuts.

Leaders of the American Federation of Labor, most of whom and the Socialist leaders are trying to born in and split the ranks of the strikers. The ranks of the strikers are solid under the leadership of the militant Auto Workers Union.

Herndon Verdict Is Part Of Boss Hunger Drive

YOUNG WORKERS RALLY TO SMASH CHAIN GANG DEATH SENTENCE!

ATLANTA, Ga.—Torture and death on the Georgia chain-gang was the verdict of the Atlanta boss-court in the trial of Angelo Herndon, 19 year old Negro young Communist organizer last week.

Herndon was charged with "inciting to insurrection" for his militant work of organizing southern Negro and white workers for a struggle against starvation and lynch terror.

Angelo Herndon was first arrested following a raid upon his home during which copies of the YOUNG WORKER, Daily Worker, and other workingclass papers and magazines were found in his possession.

Herndon was tried under an old Georgia law dating back to slave times and was sentenced to 18 to 20 years in the most brutal chain-gang. THIS SENTENCE MEANS DEATH!

Herndon was defended by two Negro lawyers of Atlanta engaged by the International Labor Defense. The I.L.D. is taking steps to appeal the case to a higher court.

“YOUTH ON THE HUNGER TRAIL” Life Among the Million Homeless Youth of America

Editor's Note: This is the first installment of YOUTH ON THE HUNGER TRAIL, which will be serialized in THE YOUNG WORKER. It is being written by Henry Bell, a young homeless worker. These articles are being sent in as he beats his way to the Coast. They expose the frightful conditions of the million homeless youth of this wonder in north of bread and shelter.

OFF TO THE COAST—DRIVEN BY HUNGER

A truck comes rushing by and grinds to a stop beside the toll box. We hesitate as the cop has seen us. He guesses correctly why we are waiting. We grab onto the tailboard of the truck. We have left New York City behind. We're off on the Hunger Trail, me and my buddy, Jim.
