Verwoerd's Republic Won't Last

SELDOM has the Parliamentary opposition been in such sad disarray as over the Bill to change South Africa into a republic. Both United and Progressive Parties have been completely at sixes and sevens, twisting and turning as they tried to avoid swallowing the unpalatable fare that Verwoerd was dishing un to them

Behind the confusion of the Steytlers, Mitchells, Smits and others who have made mysterious and sometimes threatening pronouncements during the debate lies one hard fact-that the opposition are prisoners of the restricted franchise in terms of which the majority of our people are denied the vote,

They don't like the Broederbond republic which is being foisted on them, but so long as they confine their attentions to the Parliamentary sphere there is absolutely nothing they can do about it. They have been beaten fairly and squarely by a vote of Europeans only, and they will continue to be beaten so long as the vote is confined to Europeans only.

Mr. Mitchell complains he is being ruled by force today. But so are the 80 per cent of our people who do not have white kins —yet Mr. Mitchell would be the last to concede them the tight to vote. All we can say to Mr. Mitchell is that until he is prepared to share power with the Non-Europeans, he had better get used to being ruled by force, deputy leader of a permanent and impotent opposition. His one-man Natal rebellion is doomed to failure from the start.

As for the Progressives, their "acceptance" of the outcome of the referendum makes it clear that they still regard practical politics as being the preserve of Europeans only. After all, even if their franchise proposals were to be implemented, only a handful of Non-Whites would get on the voters' roll and effective power would remain with the Whites, Though they disagree with the republic, they accept it as the verdict of the European voters. Had they thought at all in terms of the reaction of the Non-Whites, they could never have made such a blunder. The Non-Whites, who were not consulted, can never accept the republic, and can only regard the Progressives' submission to it as a betraval.

Yet all the heart-searching in Parliament has not been entirely without benefit. Through the multitude of words and confusion some few ravs of light are slowly penetrating. It was Dr. Smit who asked "how long this farce is going to be continued of denving to the Non-Europeans their fundamental rights as citizens." And it was Mr. Waterson who suggested that the next step on the road of constitutional development should be the calling of a new national convention, Pressed by Mr. Schoeman whether he wanted Non-Europeans there too, he said: "I wish

to make no conditions. I am merely making a suggestion."

Maybe the United Party would not officially endorse this suggestion, but in our opinion it is a good one. There SHOULD be a new national convention, fully representative of all sections of our people, of all races. Then there might be some hope of thrashing out a new constitution which would indeed be based on the broad will of all the people and have some hope of surviving.

The Mayor told the Advisory Board earlier in the week that he could not meet them to find a solu-tion as the matter was now subject to litigation following the issuing of summonses against the 194 men. However, he suggested that the Ad-visory Board should, on its own initiative, arrange to set up media-tion machinery to solve the dispute.

POLICE INTERVENTION

On Tuesday a women's deputa-tion went to the Mayor to present a memorandum in which they com-plained of police interference. The memorandum stated that the police had taken it upon themselves to be provocative. They ordered people who were given lifts to get out of the cars; they ordered scores of drivers to the Korsten police station where they were made to pay admissions of guilt for one reason or another. At one time I personally counted more than 40 vehicles at the station

From the middle of the week the police have been stopping every car that enters or leaves New Brighton on the Grahamstown or Uitenhage or in the Granamstown or Ultenhage roads. At peak hours in the morning or in the evenings these two police check points look like a car assem-bly yard.

On the way to work the police stop workers and demand passes and poll tax receipts. The entire weight of the police is being thrown into the dispute on the side of the management in an effort to break the bus howest!

ADVISORY BOARD

At its special meeting on Thurs-day evening some members of the Advisory Board argued strongly that there was no point in seeking to provide mediation machinery it to provide mediation machinery if the summonses were not withdrawn. Others pressed that owing to the gravity of the situation efforts should still be made to arrive at an amicable settlement. Finally the Advisory Board accepted the advice of the presiding City Councillor that the resultion celline for the settles. the resolution calling for the setting up of a mediation committee be held over pending legal advice.

Mr. B. J. Mnyanda pointed out that the Labour Inspector had failed to call the members of the Regional Committee when the dispute occurred

In the meanwhile the workers and people of New Brighton and Zakele have not relaxed in their determination to beyord the buses. Of the fleet of 91 buses most have been standing at the depot ever since the dispute started. A few are run by scabs, but most of the time they only carry the drivers and conduc-

FAKE PASSENGERS

During the course of the day a number of scabs are put in one bus which drives between the township and the terminus. Sometimes some of the scabs are dropped at certain stops along the route and are picked stops along the route and are picked up on the return journey, thus try-ing to give the impression that some people are boarding the buses. The company claims that about 300 people are boarding the buses per day, but the people of New Brigh-ton are convinced that they are fake passengers. passengers.

One morning two inspectors of One morning two inspectors of the bus company stood at the rail-way bridge watching the thousands of people crowding the New Brighton station. The Railways have spared no efforts to put on additional trains to cope with the unprecedented flood of people who have now taken to the trains.

INTIMIDATION

Last week Vuyisile Mini was arrested by the police while he was walking home. He spent the night in the cells which were so full that there was scarcely room to move. Scores of men are spending nights in jail for failure to produce passes Scores of men are sper in jail for failure to pro or failure to pay taxes.

At the New Age offices last week the Special Branch took names and the Special Branch took names and addresses of some people who were found there. Mr. Piet Vogel, who had just come in at the time, was taken by the Special Branch as well as Mountain Ngugungwana, an employee of New Age. The Special Branch took samples of type from a preventier they found on the rable.

LATER!

Over the week-end the Bay Bus Company took away its entire flect of buses from New Brighton to the company's depot in town, showing that the company is prepared for a long period of deadlock. As the long convoy of orange coloured buses were driven from their depot where they have been standing for a month, people who saw them shouted amidst scenes of excite-ment: "Let them go to hell."


The banned ANC issued leaflets on Sunday night explaining the company's new tactics and called upon the people to ignore the buses even if they were put on other

On Monday morning stray buses were on the New Brighton route and a few on the Veeplaats routes but no people boarded them.

Meanwhile the police stopped all cars at the bottleneck entries into New Brighton.

In a statement issued on Monday morning the manager said arrange-ments had been made by the com-pany to look after the scabs even pany to look after the scabs even though the company was not earn-ing anything from the service.

So far all efforts by statutory bodies have failed to persuade the management to enter into negotiations with the workers.

the law, plus the Cato Manor disturbances and the events leading up to last year's State of Emergency, eventually wrung from the Prime dinister the announcement in May 1960 that the Government intended bringing flout certain changes to remove the necessity for liquor raids, and a Bill to amend the Liquor Act has been announced for the present session of Parliament.

Concession?

The Commissioner of Police announced on August 13, 1960, that "The police have stopped making any organised liquor raids. The only occasion when a raid involving liquor occurs now is when the existence of illicit liquor dens is dis-covered or reported to be causing crimes of violence—and then the primary object is to stop the vio-lence rather than stop the drinking." Is this a case, as in Windermere,

of police raids ceasing, only to be replaced by "routine inspections" which have very much the same re-sult? Only the figures will show, and it may be years before we have

chance to examine them.

Meanwhile, the inequitable and criminatory laws remain on th statute book, a source of potential disturbance however leniently they are enforced,

White Domination

He said that it was a great misfortame that many Whites were standing by and seeing things done standing by and seeing things done they there were the country of the control of the contro

100.000 Flee Tyranny Each Year

FREEDOM fighters in the Portuguese colony of Angola have gone over to direct action—and have fired the first major salvoes in their campaign to free Angola. The target date for freedom—June 1962 at the latest

The exact nature of the battle last week-end in Angola is not clear for the Portuguese authori-ties suppress truth as ruthlessly as they kill men. But what is clear is they kill men. The latest issue of the S.A. Nursing Journal reports that all registration fees to the S.A. Nursing Association will go up from April 1. Registration fees for full members of the Association will be £2.10.0 (R5.00) instead of £1.10.0.
