THE Minister of Justice, Mr. Vorster, has announced in a press statement that he is prepared to consider "representations" from named and banned people before publishing their names in the infamous blacklist he is preparing.

A moment's thought will expose the outrageous unfairness and injustice of this procedure.

The listed and banned people have never been given the benefit of any trial in any Court. In fact the Act, like the original penent or any trial in any Court. In fact the Act, like the original suppression of Community Act, is specifically designed to en-able the Minister and his Special Branch to punish people with-out trial or charge, for actions which were perfectly legal at the time they were done, such as joining or supporting the former Communist Party before 1950, or vigorously opposing aparthelid time them the super s since then

The Minister's new move is simply meant to give an appearance of legality and civilised procedures to actions by the State against private individuals which are flagrantly defiant of against private individuals which are applicable to a second and the accepted lead and civilised procedures. And what does this "concession" amount to? Merely that one is graciously permitted to appeal to Vorster against Vorster, to appeal to the Special Branch. Branch against the Special Branch. Anyone who falls for this transparent and arrogant device will

merely be helping Vorster to impose this fraud.

No Mercy

More, what "mercy" can those who make such "representa-tions" expect from a Minister who could introduce such a savage hazi law as the General Laws Amendment Act, who can declare that he is "satisfied" Lutuli and Duncan are "Communists?" And what sort of "representations" can they make? People who may have in mind making some sort of dignified and reasoned protest which would not compromise their political reputations and consciences should bear in mind that nothing they say to Vorster will be able to be published. Any announcement that they have "made representations" can only be made by the Minister himself. He can twist it any way he likes without any right or opportunity of reply.

It would be naive to expect that the Special Branch will actually remove any names from their list-even if the proposed victims have been quiescent politically for the past twelve years and more-without demanding and expecting, at least, some guarantees of "good behaviour" in the future. and perhaps also some measure of "co-operation" and information.

No Guarantee

And even if they do remove some names-there is no guarantee whatsoever that they cannot be put back on the list as soon as the persons concerned show the least signs of participating in political activity of any sort, however timid and respectable. Those who make successful representations will be in an even worse position than the others: they will voluntarily abdicate their rights as citizens and live out their political lives in fear and intimidation.

And the worst of it will not be that they forfeit the respect of their former companions in struggle—if they cared for that they would never make "representations" in the first place—but that they will have to continue living with themselves. No, this is not a "legal" question, to be decided by consulting

with one's legal representative. It is a political and moral question, which can only be decided by consulting one's own conscience

Looked at in this light, Vorster's "magnanimous officr" turns out to be a ridiculous suggestion, whereby he proposes to his victims that they co-operate in pretending to the world that they have been guilty of crimes which they never committed. No one of any political maturity or moral integrity will participate in this crazy farce. The suggestion should be rejected with the contempt it deserves,

ARE THE POLICE YOUR FRIENDS?

ONCE again a newly-inducted Commissioner of Police, this time Major-Gen. John Keevy, has proclaimed that the South African Police are to "continue and intensify their policy of courtesy to all races, irrespective of colour."

Gen. Keevy said last week: "Every policeman throughout the country now knows that all races must be accorded the same courtesy and respect. Summary and unnecessary arrests are being avoided wherever possible. As long as we are satisfied that a suspect will appear in court to face the charge, we will not lock him un

Whatever the policy may be at the top, precious little of it seems to filter down to the bottom. The policeman on the beat or in the pick-up van is still widely regarded by the mass of the neople, not as a friend and protector, but as an enemy to be feared and avoided.

Partly this is due to the fact, of course, that the police are responsible for the enforcement of unjust laws, designed to bolster and maintain the system of White domination. The police are merely the instrument for law-enforcement, the protectors of the White supremacists and their property and privileges. With t'

best will in the world it would be impossible for a policema. given this main duty, to transform himself into a friend of the people

But it is also a fact that White subremacy attitudes are deeply entrenched in the police force, and Gen. Keevy's fine words will make precious little impression on the ingrained prejudices of the ordinary policeman unless they are backed by action.

On-The-Spot Inquiry By New Age

THE statement about lack of consultation of the Swazi nation about mineral deals in their country, published in New Age two issues ago and contested by a press statement from the office of Swaziland's Resident Commissioner, did come from the Ingwenyama Sobhuza II, but an argument has grown up around the statement in Swaziland because officials close to him did not fully observe protocol before handing the statement over to us.

In his statement, the Resident Commissioner, Mr. Marwick, said:

'I have consulted the Ngwenya-(Paramount Chief) with the who states ma (Paramount Chief) who states that no interview on the iron ore agreement has been granted by him to a representative of New Age. The Ngwenyama repudiates the statement ascribed to him by New Age in its issue of July 5.

"The only correspondence tween New Ase and the Swazi Na tween New Age and the Swart Na-bonal Council has been a request from New Age for comment on a story it published several weeks ago which atleged that the Swaziand Administration was granting wide-spread mineral rights to the Angio-mentoria Commercion without cost spread mineral rights to the Anglo-American Corporation without con-sulting the Ngwenyama in Libandla (Council). This request was ad-dressed to the Secretary to the Swazi nation who was instructed by the Ngwenyama to refer the matter the Ngwenyama to refer the matter to the Swari National Council to determine whether a reply should be offered to the newspaper. No re-commendation on the form of a reply has yet been received by the "'gwenyama from the Council.

"The only mineral rights held in Swaziland by the Angio-American Corporation are those in respect of the iron ore deposits at Bomvu Ridge.

"The agreement concluded with the agreement concluded with the Corporation for the mining of the iron ore deposits was reached with the full approval of the Ngw-enyama in Libandla, Consultations with the Swazi National Council in connection with the agreement began in 1957.

"No mining right has been granted without the consent of the Ngwenyama in Libandla since the Secretary of State replied in 1959 to the Swazi petition on land and minerals."

Our Inquiry

The Ingwenyama said through his private secretary that he could not see New Age. Investigations in circles round the King show:

1. The Ingwenyama had the statement prepared,

2. He handed it over to a public relations officer to "dot the i's and cross the t's."

The Ingwenyama apparently instructed that the statement be re-turned to him for a final okay and had also undertaken to submit it for information to the Resident Com-missioner, Mr. Marwick.

The slip-up by officials of the Ingwenyama occurred because it reached New Age—it was person-ally handed to us by an official close

It appears further that the final two paragraphs in the statement of the Revident Commissioner-which was drafted by his information offi-cer-were not comments by the Ingwenyama but by the Revident Commissioner.
