The New York Workers School

The central school of the Commu-nist Party, located in New York

City, which leads this movement has had tremendous growth since its founding. From five or six classes in the 1924-5 term having about 60 registered students, the School leaped to over 100 classes School leaped to over 100 classes having a total registration of 2,080, in the 1929-30 term. Equally great growth is shown in the improvement of the faculty but growth is shown in the improve of the faculty both as regar member and Leninist stature. greatest growth of all howev regards greatest growth of all however, is the clarification of the program of the School and the contents of the courses. In this respect the sharpest break took plac hetween terms 1928-9 and 1929-30

"Its (Workers School) curricu-lum is based on the assumption that Marx, Engels, and Lenin, in their works and deeds have given the proletariat a science of understanding, organizing and action which directs it along its march towards power and emancipation."
