

BANK OF ENGLAND MAN GOES

MR MARTIN WALES, a superintendent in the foreign exchange control department of the Bank of England, has been suspended on full pay.

At his new home in Chislehurst yesterday, Mr Wales told reporters: 'I can make no comment about this as I am restricted by the Bank.'

'The Bank is anxious to clear up this matter as quickly as possible, just as I am. My conscience is clear. I am only a pawn on this chess board.'

Mr Wales was interviewed by Treasury officials four months ago. They were brought in to investigate allegations of large-scale evasion of foreign currency regulations.

Two weeks ago the Director of Public Prosecutions asked the Fraud Squad to step into the investigation.

A spokesman for the 'Old Lady of Threadneedle Street' said yesterday that Mr Wales' suspension 'in no way pre-judges the issue'.

'It is fairer to himself and his colleagues if he leaves the Bank until the conclusion is known,' he said.

Great secrecy is surrounding the conduct of the police inquiries. Although Mr Wales was sent home last Friday, the news did not emerge until late yesterday.

'I am only a pawn'

Asked if the Fraud Squad had ever been into the sanctified corridors of the Bank of England on official business before, a Scotland Yard spokesman said: 'No. This is very unusual.'

Seamen's leaders search for pay package

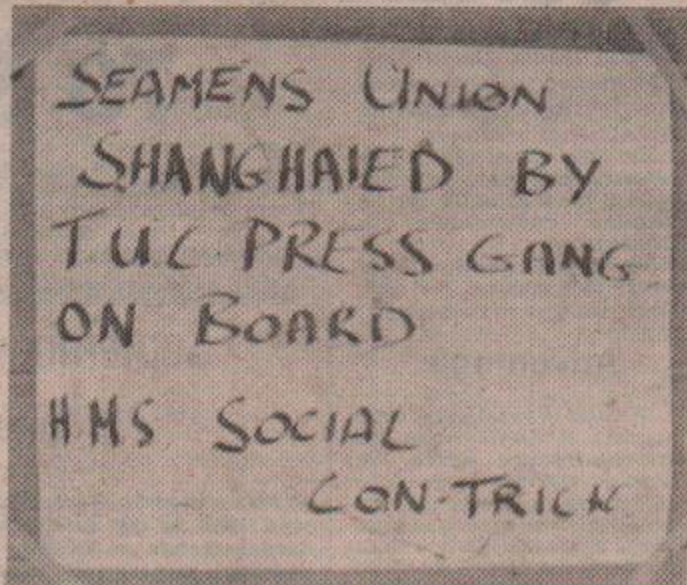

PROBLEMS hit talks between the National Union of Seamen and TUC leaders yesterday.

The two sides are attempting to frame a pay and fringe benefits package which they hope will not breach the social contract. They meet again today.

After last night's session was adjourned NUS general secretary Jim Slater said: 'We are still talking, we still have a bit to discuss. There is something there and we will be discussing it further.'

The difficulty yesterday was the issue of 'captive time' — the unpaid time that seamen spend

on board their ship when it is in port.

TUC leaders were insisting that payment for 'captive time' might breach the social contract. But promises of such payments were part of the TUC formula which got the seamen to postpone for two weeks their all-out strike.

One of the TUC negotiators, miners' general secretary Lawrence Daly, said progress had been made on the issues of

fall-back pay and a new pension scheme. But he admitted that 'captive time' was a sticking point.

If agreement can be reached at TUC headquarters today, the full NUS executive is expected to examine the proposals tomorrow morning with a meeting with the shipowners in the afternoon.

Ship owners have informed the seamen's executive that they are ready to consider any package agreed with the TUC.

ARAFAT TO MEET ASSAD

BEIRUT Press reports said yesterday that talks had been agreed between the Syrians, the Palestinians and Lebanese president-elect Elias Sarkis.

They were scheduled to begin last night or today, and to include Palestine Liberation Organisation chairman Yassir Arafat and the Syrian premier Assad.

The reports also said that talks last weekend involving Syrian Air Force chief Najil Jamil and Fatah second-in-command Abu Iyyad had been a complete failure.

However, little seems likely to come out of these talks — firstly because the Lebanese left wing have expressed reservations about them and the PLO has repeatedly declared its refusal to break its links with the left.

POLAR EXPLORERS PRESUMED DEAD

THE THREE British Climbers who have been missing for more than a week in the Antarctic were yesterday assumed to have died.

The British antarctic survey said conditions on the Polar sub-continent had been 'beyond those of human endurance'.

A statement issued by survey director Dr Richard Laws, on behalf of the National Environment Research Council, said: 'We have been forced to the unhappy conclusion that the Argentine field party has perished.'

The three Britons, all experienced Antarctic climbers, were Graham

Whitfield, a physicist from Rotherham, Geoff Hargreaves, 21, a meteorologist from Preston, and the expedition's cook, Mike Walker, 21, from the Wirral, Cheshire.

They set out from their Argentine island base on September 3 to scale Mount Peary, 15 miles away on the mainland.

Health cuts in Hackney

CLOSURES and 400 sackings will hit the health service in Hackney next month because of spending cuts ordered by the government.

A total of 20 doctors, 140 nurses, 180 auxiliary workers and 60 administrators will all lose their jobs as accident and emergency units are closed in

the London borough.

Unions are planning action against the cuts. District health administrator admitted the cuts were being made under protests.

They had been told to make them by the regional health authority who were under government orders.

What we think

Jones and Scanlon join the bosses

'THE STARK fact is that without the strongest combined efforts, substantial sections of the organisation could still sink into oblivion and thousands of jobs would go.' This employers' talk appears in a special front page article in the 'Leyland Mirror'.

The authors are Jack Jones and Hugh Scanlon. The implications of this statement are clear.

The leaders of the two biggest unions will not fight redundancies at Leyland. On the contrary they are preparing to work with management in imposing them. They are already repeating employers' propaganda which views the slump as some kind of inevitable punishment on workers who strike to defend wages and conditions.

The other side of this argument is that sacrifice by workers will halt the crisis. Trade union bureaucrats who enjoy secure jobs and large wages are very fond of repeating this falsehood.

But after two years of sacrifice, 1.5 million workers are on the dole. In another six months 2 million will be on the dole. A large proportion are school-leavers who never had a job — what extra sacrifice are these poverty-stricken youngsters supposed to make?

Jones and Scanlon deliver their arrogant lectures in employers' papers. They must think they are talking to sheep. Many workers know it was these two men, together with the whole TUC general council, who took workers through the fraud of the social contract, promising no increase in unemployment, no cuts in government spending and a good future for youth. They sold out at the first opportunity in all these pledges.

News Line has another message. Unemployment is not caused by laziness or strikes. It is a world-wide feature of a capitalist system in crisis. Unlike the reformists of the TUC, we say the solution lies with the working class taking power. The car workers have the skills to make cars. Millions of other workers in the world want transport. Only the system of private capital and monopoly prevents prosperity, employment and the fulfillment of needs.

Why do Jones and Scanlon prefer to run with the employers instead of fighting for the socialist solution of nationalisation under workers' control and expansion? Because a mobilisation of workers for these goals would mean the end to the reformist trade union bureaucracy. This is exactly what News Line and the Workers Revolutionary Party stands for.

GLASS WORKERS BACK AFRICAN DISPUTE

SHOP STEWARDS at the Pilkington's glass monopoly have thrown their weight behind a group of black South African workers fighting for union recognition.

The workers have been fired by the Pilkington subsidiary Armour Plate glass near Johannesburg after their union organised a strike over redundancies.

Demanded

At a meeting yesterday, Pilkington stewards demanded that the British management intervene in the dispute, force their subsidiary to recognise the union and start negotiations with the black workers.

They said they would block all attempts to transfer South African work to Britain. They will also refuse to supply Armour Plate's customers.



Vorster

The meeting also decided to call on glass trade unions in other parts of the world where Pilkington's have plants and licensing arrangements to take similar action.

Yesterday's decision will be reported to a meeting called by the TUC with representatives of the South African Congress of unions in London tomorrow.

Rejected

David Warburton, national officer of the General and Municipal Workers' Union, attended yesterday's shop stewards' meeting held at Pilkington's St Helens headquarters.

He rejected management excuses that the South African firm was not a subsidiary because Pilkington's only owned 50 per cent of the shares.

Call to oppose

Vorster

THE Labour party's international committee yesterday urges a seven-point plan on the government aimed at implementing the manifesto commitment 'to disengage from Britain's unhealthy involvement with apartheid'.

A committee resolution reaffirmed Labour's support for liberation movements in Southern Africa and said that as British capitalism had played and still played a vital role in maintaining and profiting from the apartheid regime, a special responsibility lay upon the British labour movement to help end exploitation there.

The resolution said disengagement should include

- A freeze on any new investments to south Africa.
- Withdrawal of all British nationalised industries' investment.
- Withdrawal of all British-controlled banks.
- An initiative at the UN for mandatory economic sanctions against South Africa.
- 1 • Aid for African liberation Movements.
- Prohibiting export to South Africa of any equipment which would enhance that country's military capacity.

He told News Line: 'Pilkingtons do control the company. Most of the plate glass-making technology comes from Pilkington's. We believe it is in their power to intervene.'

Three years ago Pilkington gave the British unions assurances over workers' rights and conditions in their South African subsidiaries. The action of Armour Plate

breaks these undertakings, say the General and Municipal Workers' Union.

In South Africa the apartheid government do not recognise black trade unions.

Trouble began at Armour Plate when the firm attempted to cut the labour force by three men. On September 3 the workers went on strike and management replied by sacking 150.

COALITION WARNING TO STEEL

Liberal leader David Steel was warned yesterday not to entertain the idea of entering a coalition government.

Mr Stephen Attack, Young Liberals chairman, attacked Steel at the start of the party's annual conference in Llandudno.

'We are not critical of David Steel's leadership,' he said, 'There has been no leadership.'

Advantage

'We want to sound a very clear warning to David about his end-of-conference speech. He must not take advantage of the fact that he has picked the very last item on the agenda to score points against the party without the party having any chance to hit back.'

PEKING — Former US Defence Secretary James Schlesinger has begun a tour of provincial China, including visits to regions of Sinkiang and Yining, on the Soviet frontier.

Schlesinger arrived in Peking on September 6, but his travels were postponed after Mao's death. His 12-day tour ends on September 26, when he returns to Peking for talks with premier Hua Kuo-feng.

'If he uses it to plug an intolerable coalition with the Tories, he will pay dearly for it. I hope David will take advantage of the week to consult

the party, particularly on the coalition, because he will find that 75 per cent of the party are against coalition and will not tolerate it.'

Seven typhoid cases

SEVEN CASES of typhoid fever have been confirmed among holidaymakers returning from Spain, the Department of Health said yesterday. Four of the patients are in hospital in London and the others at Bradford, Manchester and Huddersfield. The Department said that all had been on holiday at Salou, a resort near Tarragona, six of them at the Hotel Negresco, during the first week in August.

Factory barricaded

THREE workers barricaded themselves in a Stockport factory yesterday to try to save their jobs. They took in food and refused to unbolt the doors for staff at E N Bray Ltd, switchgear makers. One of the protesting men, Mr Philip Kelly, 21, a fitter, said: 'The management are making redundant nine of the 12 people working here. We claim it's because recently we all joined a trade union.'

Reyrolle profits up

REYROLLE PARSONS, the manufacturers of heavy electrical equipment, has announced profits £1m better than the city had been expecting. For the first half of the current year, its pre-tax total was £5,256,000 against £2,735,000 in the first half of last year. The company said if its operations achieve output planned for the rest of the year, the second half should show a further improvement.

BP in Egypt

BRITISH PETROLEUM is to move into exploration for oil in Egypt, it was announced yesterday. The company has acquired an interest in Petrosweide which has an onshore concession in the Natrun area, midway between Cairo and Alexandria. Egypt is one of the few Arab countries which is desperately short of its oil.

The tender trap

HELSINKI — A persistent, tender-hearted Finnish shoemaker has just patented a painless mousetrap. It took Vaino Huuonen 30 years to develop his idea. A mouse touching the bait in the boxlike device springs a trapdoor which plunges it into a secure cell below. The trap then returns to its original position to await the next victim. The inventor, who made the trap to save mice from suffering, does not say what should be done with them once caught.

Policeman suspended

A THAMES VALLEY police officer has been suspended from duty while Scotland Yard's anti-terrorist branch investigates allegations of suspected IRA involvement of a relative. The officer, a police constable from Maidenhead, was suspended on September 2 and senior officers of Thames Valley police are carrying out disciplinary inquiries. A Thames Valley police spokesman said: 'The officer has been suspended from duty since September 2 under confidential circumstances and no further details can be given.'

Snub for Samoan

WESTERN Samoan leader Malietoa Tamumafili arrived in Britain over the weekend and is said to be 'a little sad'. He was expecting to be greeted by a member of the royal family. Instead he was met by a Baroness-in-Waiting and two government representatives. His son, Captain Laupepa Malietoa, who is also his father's chief aide, said: 'This is a private visit to London, we appreciate, but nevertheless he is a head of state.'

This reception contrasted with the reception given them in China. There the Prime Minister welcomed them, and the Foreign Minister was at the airport for their departure.

Shelter's new director

NEIL MCINTOSH, 29, research director of the Southwark Community Development Project, has been appointed housing director of Shelter, the national campaign for the homeless. He replaces Chris Holmes, who has become executive director of the Society of Co-operative Dwellings. Shelter said that McIntosh will be giving up the chairmanship of Camden Borough Council housing committee.

Withdraw Syrian troops

THE COMMITTEE of the London branch of sheetmetal workers has sent a letter to the Syrian Embassy and to the National Union of Syrian Trade Unions demanding the withdrawal of Syrian troops from the Lebanon. They called for support to the Palestine Liberation Organisation and the Lebanese workers.

BRITAIN'S trade gap was £291m last month.

At this rate of loss, another big international loan will be desperately needed soon.

The Labour government immediately pretended that the August deficit was a 'dramatic improvement' on the July trade gap of £527m.

But the longer-term view shows that British business is being hammered by the slump and the trade war.

In the three months June to August, the visible trade gap was £1,169m. In the March to May three months, it was only £715m.

Erratic

Government sources were last night busy saying the three month comparison is 'distorted' because of 'erratic figures in March and July'.

Even if the slightly reduced August deficit is taken as the sign for the future — and government claims accepted

Nursery care is shameful

PRE-SCHOOL care and education in Britain is 'shamefully inadequate,' according to Mr John Hipkin, until recently director of the Advisory Centre for Education.

Three-quarters of the nation's under-fives are still without any pre-school education and expenditure cuts are going to make it difficult to maintain even the present meagre supply of existing nursery provision, he says today.

Majority

Hipkin says that of 2.5 million children aged between two and four in England and Wales, only 14 per cent receive any kind of full-time pre-school education.

Of these only 4.7 per cent were in nursery schools. The majority attended nursery classes within primary schools.

A further 78,000 under-fives received part-time nursery education in maintained nursery schools and classes.

This, says Hipkin, leaves 2 million children not catered for by the state system.

Places

Part-time places provided by such voluntary organisations as the pre-school playground association were difficult to estimate but it was likely to be under a third of a million.

'This means that more than 75 per cent of the nation's under-fives are still without any kind of pre-schooling,' adds.

ACE, an independent advisory group which publishes the magazine 'Where', urges the government to make a firm commitment to a policy of pre-school education on demand and as needed, and also to prepare for a major expansion as soon as possible.

YAWNING GULF IN TRADE GAP

that a surplus of £160m a month is being earned on 'invisibles' like shipping, banking and tourism, British capitalism's monthly debt with the rest of the world is still nearly £150m.

At this rate, a new loan like the emergency \$5,300m credits arranged a few months ago will be needed every 16 months.

If the average loss over the last three months is taken at face value, a new loan will be needed every 11 months.

The Labour government is already meeting difficulties in persuading the American and other international banks to renew the existing credits.

Further loans are out of the question without severe sanctions being placed on the British economy.

Despite attempts by the Bank of England to use the 'recovery' talk to revive the value of sterling, the pound quickly lost the slight gains it initially made.

After a 'recovery' lasting only a few minutes, which took the rate up from \$1.7380 to \$1.7405, the pound fell back again to \$1.7390.

On the Stock Exchange, shares made no real recovery from the sharp losses of the previous day when the pound lost nearly four cents.

Government stock, knocked

back by the steep increase in interest rates to 13 per cent, also stayed depressed.

There was more speculation yesterday that mortgage rates will soon have to go up to 12 per cent.

The chairman of the Building Societies' Association, Raymond Potter, valid home loan rates would have to be looked at shortly if other interest rates remained high.

Building societies took in only £183m new funds in August, described as 'very sluggish'.

Air traffic frozen

HELSINKI — Finland's 170 air traffic controllers have announced they will go on strike at the end of this month because they are overworked. The civil aviation authority has denied that the controllers' workload is excessive.

Picket in Pall Mall



UNION PICKETS were out in London's exclusive Pall Mall yesterday, and many of the gentry were astonished to find themselves clutching strikers' leaflets before having the chance to say 'No thank you'.

The strikers are patrolmen and mechanics working in the Birmingham area for the Royal Automobile Club (RAC). They are demanding recognition of their union, the T&GWU,

and have been locked out for three weeks. The RAC have their own 'union' and are refusing to recognise any independent union.

The club's administrative headquarters is next to their dining club and both places were picketed during most of yesterday. The patrolmen said that they had been approached by many of the girls inside, who expressed support for the strike and the demand for higher pay.

SCIENTIST FIGHTS UNFAIR SACKING

A TOP aero-dynamics expert claimed at an industrial tribunal hearing yesterday that his company's alleged instructions to remain silent for reasons of commercial security amounted to incitement to treason.

Stephen Thornley, 39, was dismissed from his job as a senior project supervisor at the Aircraft Research Association, Bedford, after writing a letter to 'The Guardian' in which he described the RAF's new Tornado strike aircraft as a 'sitting duck'.

He claimed at the original hearing in August that he was unfairly dismissed after he was accused of breaking the Official Secrets Act and breaching commercial security.

Mr Thornley told the tribunal at the resumed hearing that the Defence Ministry had accepted without query the wording of a report that there was 'severe loss of performance' to the No. 1 European strike aircraft on which he had been making tests.

He wrote to 'The Guardian' about it.

'For the Aircraft Research Association to suggest to an employee that he remains silent concerning a shortcoming in the national defence by reason of commercial security amounts to incitement to treason,' he said.

'It cannot lawfully be required by any loyal citizen that he remains silent.'

He had thought it was common knowledge that the multi-role combat aircraft was expected to form a major element in Britain's future defence system.

'My letter thus constitutes a public warning of a shortcoming in the national defence and, as such, considerations of commercial security are not applicable.'

As to the allegations that he broke the Official Secrets Act, Mr Thornley said this was a matter of law and he had not been charged with any such offence.

POLICE MOVE IN ON SOUTH LONDON SQUAT

SEVEN squatters were arrested in two incidents in Kennington, south London, yesterday.

In the morning, a force of more than 40 police, including the Special Patrol Group and dog-handlers, arrived with electricity board officials to cut off power supplies.

The squatters tried to prevent this operation. Fighting broke out and bricks were thrown. As a result, two men were arrested.

In the afternoon, after an argument between a squatter and a policeman, another large force of police arrived.

They kicked down the doors of three houses and arrested five more people.

Eye-witnesses claim that brutality was used on the squatters as they were taken away.

Lothian busmen fight cuts

EDINBURGH — Busmen voted unanimously yesterday to 'fight all the way' against the Lothian regional council plan to axe services, cut manpower and raise fares.

Following a meeting of the City Busmen's Branch of the T&GWU, union official Terry Weir accused the council of 'playing politics with public transport'.

He said the busmen had gone along with cuts for too long and will accept no more.

Jobs have been cut from 3,000 to 1,700 in recent years mainly through the introduction of single manning. At the same time fares have soared, driving people away from using the buses. The latest round of increases proposed will add

between 1p and 5p to the cost of the journey.

Weir hit out at the accusation that high wages were responsible for the crisis in the transport services which face a deficit of £1.25m in the current financial year.

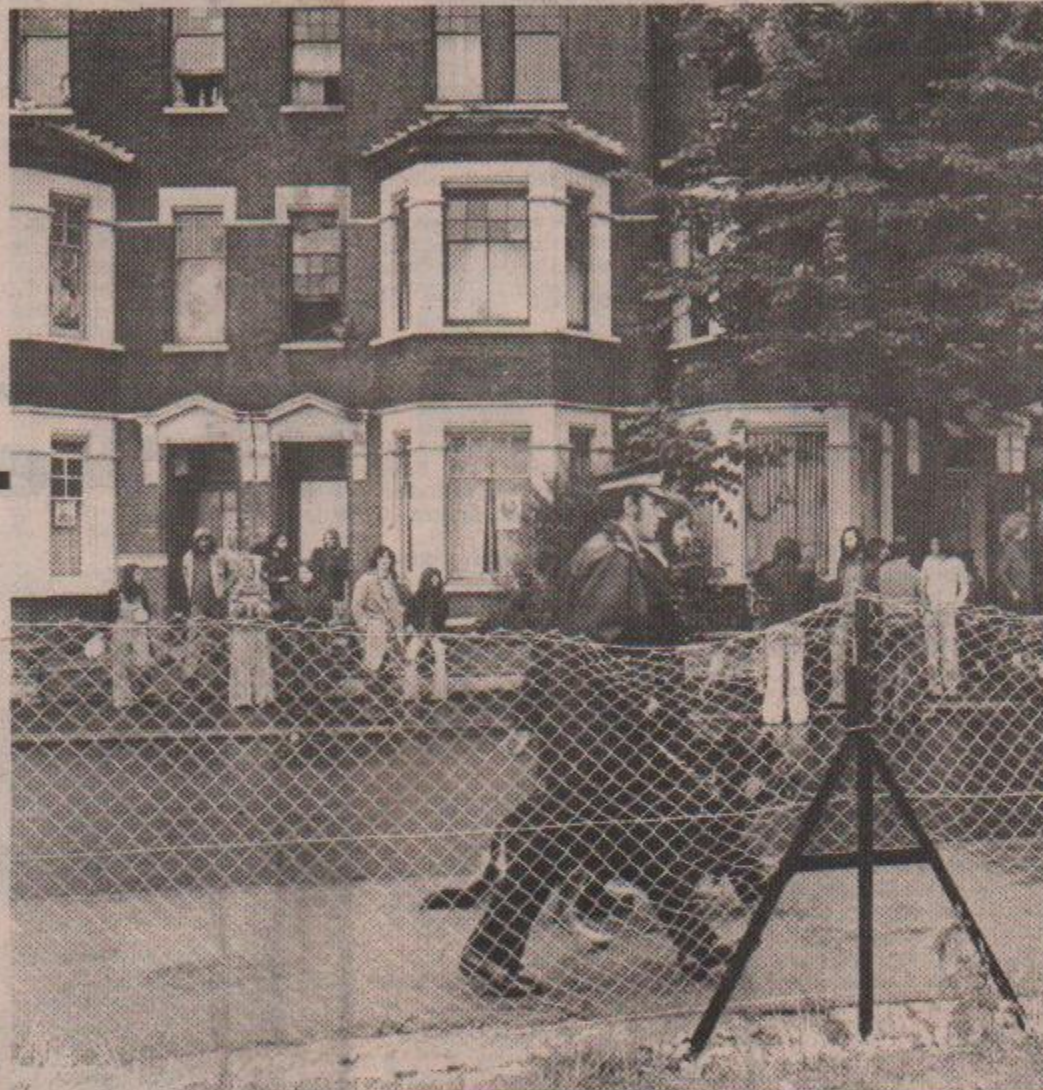
He said that the basic rate for a conductor was £38.24p and for a one-man bus operator £46.71.

Extra earnings come from

productivity agreements without which the deficit would be substantially larger.

The latest economy proposals from the regional council involve slashing services as well as fare increases.

The estimated saving would be £511,000 a year. The union committee meets on Friday to plan a campaign of opposition in detail.



AIR FARES GO UP AGAIN

FURTHER increases in air fares are likely to come into effect on November 1. This would be the fourth in the past two years.

Ten British airlines are seeking fare increases averaging between 10 and 12½ per cent. The Civil Aviation Authority's Licensing Panel began hearing the applications yesterday.

The panel was told that even these increases would not be enough and that applications for a further increase might have to be made next April.

Mr Arnold Heard, British Airways European Route Licensing Manager, said the Super 1-11 division, which operated from Manchester to London, Edinburgh, Glasgow and Belfast, would make a profit this year of £371,000 after payment of interest.

But this was not healthy enough, he added, and a fare increase was required to bring it to a more reasonable profit level this year — £897,000 before interest.

FRINGE BENEFITS WILL NOT BRING SEA PEACE

BELFAST — Determination to fight for a decent pay rise is still running high among seamen, ex-bosun Bill Henderson said here yesterday. 'The seamen remain adamant they want payment from July 2 this year', said Mr Henderson, acting secretary of the Belfast branch of the National Union of Seamen.

Nobody should assume seamen would be willing to accept fringe benefits as an alternative to a straight wage increase, he continued. 'Let's be honest: trade unionists are against fringe benefits by and large.'

'They do not count on the basic rate of pay. They can also be withdrawn at any time in certain circumstances. We prefer to keep off fringe benefits. We want something concrete,' he insisted.

Settlement

A meeting of the Belfast branch will be held to discuss whatever came out of the negotiations between their union and the TUC.

'Very few people would be willing to accept that any settlement cannot be paid before January next year, the date the TUC are telling us.'

'Although people say the majority of 309 in favour of industrial action in the union ballot was small, I believe all 38,000 seamen are behind the campaign now.'

'Seamen coming through Belfast from ports like Liverpool and Felixstowe are all

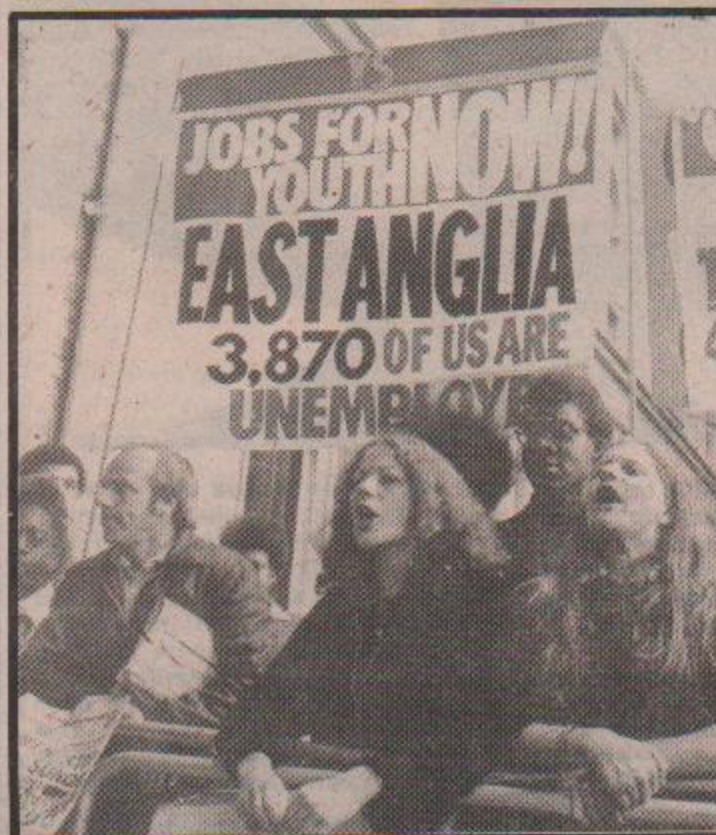
of the same opinion. Fringe benefits are an appeasement from the TUC and will not necessarily be accepted.

'The basic pay rates earned by NUS members are very low. The members feel it is long overdue that they had a decent wage plus decent rates of overtime.'

● SOUTH SHIELDS — Branch secretary A Pomphrey said a well-attended meeting had passed a resolution reaffirming support for the executive council of the union.

'The question was raised by two or three members that many of the fringe benefits being talked about in London have been bones of contention for a number of years and are not something that have just cropped up now,' he said.

'We are awaiting the outcome of the negotiations with the TUC and, subsequently, the shipowners.'

RAIL AXE BEING HONED AGAIN

A LABOUR cabinet commitment not to 'butcher' the railway system has been quietly dropped.

The cynical way it has been done would make even a Tory government proud.

On July 16 this year, Peter Shore, the cabinet minister then responsible for railways told the National Union of Railwaymen's annual conference:

'There will be no butchery while I am secretary of State'.

But when Prime Minister James Callaghan re-shuffled his cabinet last weekend, Shore lost responsibility for railways.

Responsible

A Whitehall spokesman confirmed yesterday: 'As Secretary of State for Environment, Mr Shore will remain responsible for housing, planning and local government — but not for transport.'

Rail policy will now be the province of right-winger William Rodgers, who fills the newly-created post of Secretary of State for Transport with a seat in the cabinet.

The switch is in line with the government's consultative document on transport policy, published last April.

Reductions

The document said the current £400m state aid for British Rail is too high and must be cut.

It also proposed reductions in the level of passenger services. Since rural lines would be hardest hit, the implication is that around 45 per cent of the 9,000 miles now used by passenger trains is in danger.

An official at NUR headquarters in London told News Line yesterday:

'Our union was due to have an important meeting with Mr Shore on September 22. We presume this meeting is now off.'

'We don't yet know what thoughts Mr Rodgers has. But we are worried about British

Rail's statement that fares are to go up again next spring.

'More passengers will be driven off the trains. It will set us and the public up for rail closures'.

The rail unions can expect no sympathy from Rodgers who organised the 'Campaign for Democratic Socialism' in the early 1960s.

Attacks

Among the attacks made by this right-wing campaign was its attempt to get rid of Clause Four of the Labour Party's constitution. This is the clause calling for nationalisation of capitalist industries.

John Horam, a Labour MP who is chairman of the right-wing 'Manifesto' group in the House of Commons, had been appointed as Rodgers' deputy.

Brayley remanded on bail

FORMER Army Minister Lord Brayley was bailed in the sum of £2,500 at Bow Street yesterday accused of conspiracy to defraud.

Both prosecution and defence said they were not in a position to proceed. Mr Christopher Hillyard, defending asked for a four-month adjournment.

Magistrate Mr Kenneth Barraclough said four months was too long. He set the date for November 9.

Lord Brayley is accused in one summons of conspiring to defraud the company he built up — Canning Town Glass.

He also faces four other summonses alleging that he falsified petty cash vouchers to a total of £300.

Mr Hillyard said he was asking for a four-month delay to prepare the case and avoid unnecessary court appearances by Lord Brayley, who was in poor health.

The police had no objection to bail.

FARES RISE 'WILL DESTROY THE RAILWAYS'

FURTHER fare increases will destroy the railways, Labour MP Gwilym Roberts said yesterday.

Roberts called on newly-appointed Transport Secretary William Rodgers to ignore demands for higher rail fares.

On Monday this week, British Rail's new chairman Peter Parker said fresh

increases were planned for next spring.

Roberts warned: 'The prices are already prohibitive and have driven hundreds of thousands of people off the trains.'

'The system is now virtually reduced to a fast inter-city service within the reach only of the gin-swilling brigade.'

Mr Roberts said: 'Any

further move on fares will deal a death blow to British Rail.'

He said British Rail provided virtually no links between small towns, and industrial centres.

'The present subsidy to British Rail is only half that given by the West German government to their railway system — and they are not giving the money away for

nothing.

'They realise that a viable railway system is the key to industrial expansion.'

Roberts said the government and British Rail should now concentrate on providing a network to fulfil social and industrial needs.

'It is very sad to hear the new chairman start the job with this sort of doom-laden no-hope attitude'.

Social Security witch-hunt has a 'left' ally

TORY MP Iain Sproat said yesterday he was preparing a dossier on social security 'scroungers'.

By the time parliament resumes next month he hoped to have a set of constructive proposals to put to the Labour government 'to end this scandal', he stated.

Sproat has made an increasing number of television and radio appearances since he started his campaign.

Making such appearances is one of Sproat's perks for being an MP. The House of Commons Register of Members'

Interests lists TV and radio interviews and newspaper articles as being one of his financial interests. He is also a company director.

An 'old boy' of Winchester public school, he has the help of a volunteer team of right-wingers to prepare his dossier.

Pressure from rich

reactionaries like Sproat led to the Labour government recently appointing former 'left' Stanley Orme to the newly-created cabinet post of Minister for Social Security.

'I am delighted that this minister has said that his first action will be to get down to this question of abuse', said Sproat yesterday.

'No foul play'

POLICE are investigating the death of public school boy, Mark Thomas Ironside.

He was found dead on Monday under a bridge near Charterhouse, Surrey, one of the leading public schools in this country.

A post mortem showed the boy, who only joined the school last Friday, died of a fractured skull.

His parents have flown from their home in Singapore and identified the body.

Guildford detectives have questioned a number of boys at the school. But they have ruled out foul play.

Class vote in Trinidad

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad — Class issues have come to the fore in the politics of Trinidad and Tobago, with yesterday's General Election results.

The conservative People's National Movement led by Prime Minister Eric Williams has won 24 out of 36 seats in the House of Representatives.

It is faced for the first time by a real opposition — the United Labour Front, which, with strong support from the working class and youth, has taken ten of the remaining seats.

Williams' party, which has been in government for the past years, did better than some observers had predicted.

Confusion

However, with eight opposition parties to cause confusion, it is possible some voters turned 'to the devil they know' and put Williams back in.

In any case, the PNM did not need a very big percentage to win a large majority of seats.

West Bank land grab opposed

JERUSALEM — The mayor of the Arab town of El Bireh, in the occupied West Bank, led a sit-down strike outside the Israeli military governor's office yesterday in protest against Zionist land seizures.

Earlier the Israelis had arrested an Arab assisting in an attempt to establish right of way on a 650-acre site which the Israeli army says it requires for military purposes.

What is significant, however, is that parties such as the Democratic Labour Party, which at one time held all 12 opposition seats, have been totally eclipsed by the more militant ULF.

Class-based

Drawing its votes on a largely communal basis from the Indian sugar workers, and offering only mild token opposition to Williams' government, the DLP has been replaced now by a party whose support cuts across racial lines, being class-based.

Supported by the oilworkers and sugarworkers' unions, and advocating nationalisation, the United Labour Front's performance as Opposition remains to be seen.

Undoubtedly its advance marks a step forward by the working class.

£1M FOR NIXON'S PLANE TALK

A FORMER official of the Grumman Corporation testified in Washington on Monday that a White House aide proposed a \$1m contribution to Nixon's re-election campaign in return for government help in selling planes to Japan.

Thomas Cheatham, former chairman of Grumman International, told the Senate subcommittee on multi-national corporations that the issue was raised in



Nixon

April 1972 by Richard Allen, then deputy assistant to President Nixon for international sales and development.

Cheatham said he had approached Allen to urge Nixon to raise the matter of Grumman aircraft during talks scheduled that year between the US President and Mr Kakuei Tanaka, then Prime Minister of Japan, now facing bribery charges in connection with Lockheed aircraft sales.

The ex-Grumman boss claims that Allen told him: 'People for whom the White House made an effort should be grateful.'

Asked what he meant, the Nixon aide replied: 'I think the E-2 plane is worth about \$1m' and added that it would go to Nixon's 1972 election campaign.

Mr Joseph Gavin Jr, president of Grumman Corporation, told the subcommittee his firm paid out \$6m in commissions while trying to sell F-14s to Iran, but he denied the money represented bribes or pay-offs.

Grumman sold 80 F-14 jet fighters to Iran in 1973.

The US Securities and Exchange Commission has announced that the government is considering whether to disclose publicly the names of foreign firms that bribe officials to win contracts against competition from US corporations.

Disclosures of payments by US firms have led to scandals in Japan, the Netherlands, Italy, West Germany and elsewhere.

American big business feels that revelations about the activities of US firms like Lockheed are unfair, because companies from other countries are engaging in similar activities without being exposed.



Tanaka

JOHANNESBURG — Despite mass arrests and intimidation by South African police, workers continued their general strike here yesterday and they may well be joined today by workers in the Cape area.

Strong forces of riot police attacked pickets in Soweto yesterday morning, and guarded those workers wanting to board buses into Johannesburg, but employers still reported more than two-thirds of their workforce absent.

Change of name

PRETORIA — South African Information Minister Connie Mulder has come up with his own contribution to improving the country's racist image.

Dr Mulder suggests that the government's race policy should be given a new official name.

Instead of apartheid — the Afrikaans work meaning 'apart-ness' or segregation — he suggests the phrase 'plural democracy'.

Speaking to the congress here of the ruling National

Party, Mulder explained that apartheid, and 'separate development' (an official euphemism which the government uses to translate it) both have negative connotations abroad.

But a phrase like 'plural democracy' might go down better, he thinks.

The Minister added, to reassure his racist supporters, that the new name would not mean any actual change in the government's race policy — just a 're-appreciation of terminology'.

Overnight, the police had shot a man dead in Soweto and used shotguns and teargas on crowds there.

As many as 1,000 people in Soweto and Alexandra townships were rounded up in 'preventative arrests' aimed at breaking the strike, but clearly without success.

A further 700 arrests have been made of schoolchildren, in Port Elizabeth and Durban, where they staged marches against the racist regime.

Police are standing by in Cape Town for a two-day strike due to start today.

Appeal

They issued an appeal yesterday to workers to travel to work in groups so that the police could escort them more easily.

A leaflet was distributed yesterday saying the two-day strike is being postponed until next week, but it was anonymous, and may be phoney.

Reports are coming in that large-scale militant action may be organised to coincide with the arrival of US Secretary of State Kissinger on Friday.

The US government has been hoping to avoid the South African issue while working with Vorster to get a compromise deal over Rhodesia and Namibia.

Talks

Kissinger's first stop on his African mission is Dar Es-Salaam, Tanzania, before he goes on to Zambia and then South Africa.

Meanwhile South Africa's Vorster is having talks with Rhodesia's Ian Smith.

Noting with apprehension that both Smith and Vorster had welcomed US involvement, a Tanzanian statement yesterday said the racists hoped that eventually the United States would support them, in the name of anti-communism, against the African freedom fighters.

TOKYO — Japan had its first trade deficit for seven months in August, with imports topping exports by \$63m, according to Finance Ministry figures out yesterday.

Trade with the United States and the EEC countries continued to be in surplus and sales to the US were 52 per cent up on the previous year.

SIGNALS TO MARS SCOOP

PASADENA, California — Space scientists sent signals to Mars yesterday in a third attempt to free the jammed soil scoop of Viking II, which is threatening important biological tests.

The scoop jammed early on Sunday after it had delivered Martian soil for the spacecraft's biology experiment and was twisting round to unload gravel into another test chamber.

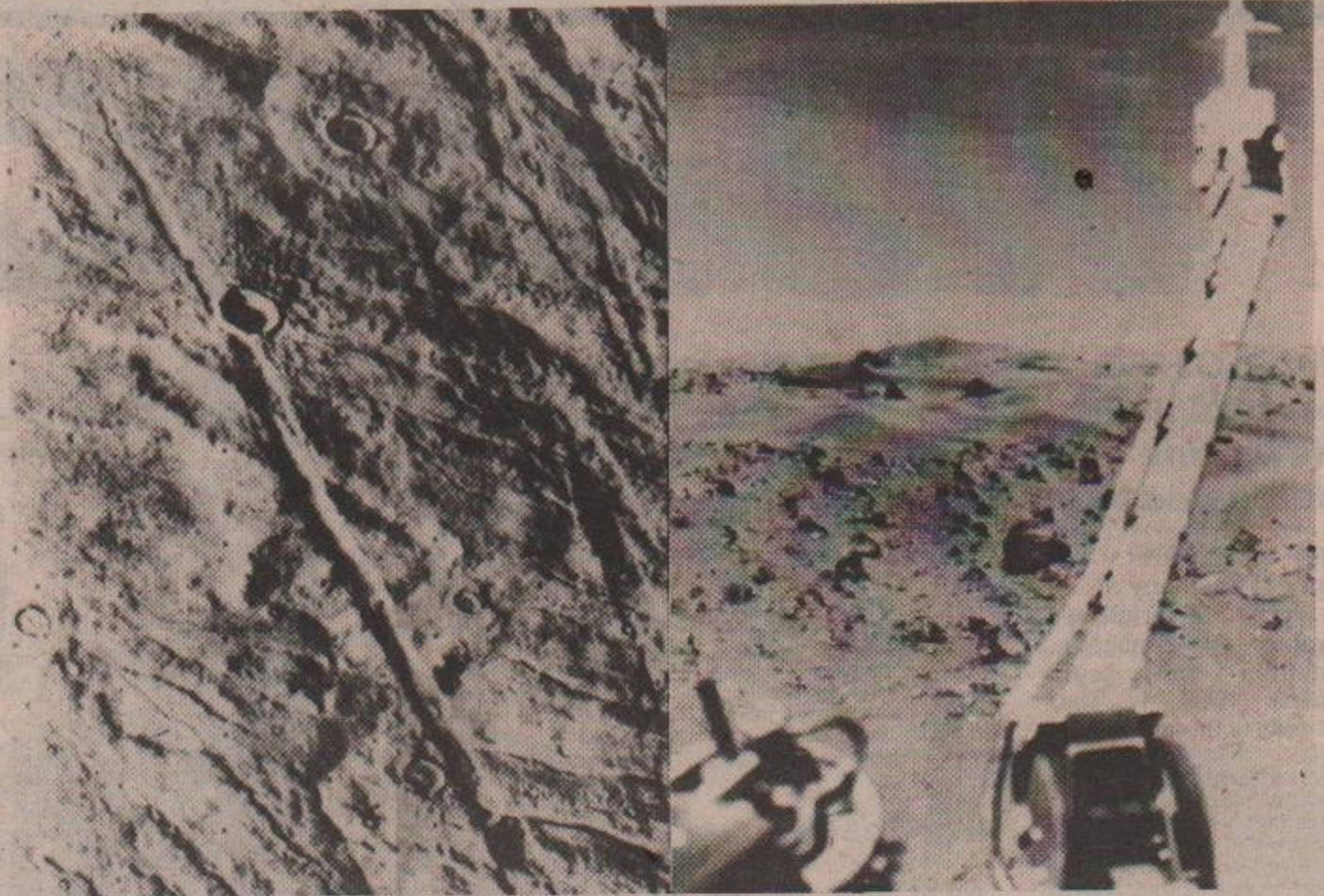
Viking project manager James Martin said the spacecraft would be sent signals to extend its 10 foot scoop arm out 16 inches.

This would bring the scoop head into the range of both Viking cameras where pictures probably would reveal what the trouble was, Martin said.

If the scoop cannot be moved again, Viking II will not be able to gather samples for its soil chemistry and organic compounds tests.

These results are badly wanted here as scientists try to sort out the contradictory signals sent back by Viking I.

The soil scoop jammed twice during eight weeks of experiments with Viking I.

Aussie actors condemn TV censorship New series taken off

SYDNEY — Industrial action has been threatened in the wake of censorship moves by the chairman of the Australian Broadcasting Commission, Sir Henry Bland.

Nationwide controversy has resulted from his decision to cancel the popular 'Alvin Purple' series after only two episodes.

Hero of the 13-part, £350,000 series is actor Graeme Blundell, who has deplored Sir Henry's action as 'a grave act of censorship exercised over an ABC drama programme'.

The chairman had been a willing victim of a concerted campaign by the 'Wowzers', the Australian nickname for conservative moralists.

The series is a romping sex comedy centered around the antics of 'Alvin Purple', whose charm women cannot resist.

The first programme won one of the highest ratings ever achieved by a show on the ABC, which generally offers more

staid fare than the commercial stations with which it competes.

Vigorous public protest has followed the cancellation, and the ABC Staff Association has threatened to boycott any replacement programme, leaving screens blank for half an hour.

Censorship

Federal President of the Staff Association, Mr Ian Wynne, predicted:

'If it does not go to air there will be meetings of staff

members and I would expect they will say that they will not replace it with another programme.'

Tom Molomby, New South Wales branch president described Sir Henry's action as 'absolutely crazy'. Censorship is 'rearing its ugly head' in the ABC, he said.

Other instances of censorship within ABC include the order by General Manager Mr Duckmanton to the 'This Day Tonight' current affairs programme to lay off the story on atrocities committed by Australian troops in Vietnam.

'They did an interview with Air Vice Marshal Jones, who said Australian troops were genetically incapable of committing atrocities and then there was dead silence,' said Molomby.

Cancel

ABC Commissioners have also been under pressure to cancel the series 'Power Without Glory', adapted from the book by Frank Hardy, the well-known Communist Party member.

BRAIN SURGERY THREAT TO REBELLIOUS YOUTH

BRAIN surgery on youth to change their behaviour and make them docile is being planned in the United States.

A US government Commission has said that

such surgery should be administered to minors on the basis of court hearings.

The National Commission for the Protection of Human Subjects of Biochemical and Behavioural Research says that the state should 'conduct and support' psycho-surgery on a research basis.

It could be administered to involuntary mental patients and

children, it added.

This advice released last Friday is the third batch of recommendations released by the Commission in the two years of its existence.

Its first recommendation permitted research on living fetuses. Its second said research should be permitted on prisoners in jails with 'high standards of humane treatment'.

The commission says that the 'common belief' that psycho-surgery is unsafe has been rebutted.

Psycho-surgery began on a large scale in the 1940s with a highly 'mutilating' operation called a 'prefrontal lobotomy'.

Doctors now agree that many patients finished up 'dull and depersonalised' — in other words, like vegetables.

Because of growing criticism,

the number of such operations in the United States declined from thousands a year in the early 1950s to just over 300 last year.

In 1973 the US government's chief psychiatrist, Dr Bertram Brown, head of the National Institute of Mental Health, said he opposed psychosurgery because doctors didn't know enough about the brain.

It was also widely ruled that psycho-surgery could not be

used on mental patients because 'informed consent' could not truly be obtained from such people.

Now the National Commission says consent is acceptable from such patients and that its risks are 'not nearly as great as previously supposed'.

There is no evidence to support this view — indeed, what evidence there is points the other way.

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HURRICANE

John Galo is the African National Congress (ANC) representative in Italy. This week he talked to The News Line about the struggle of the African masses detonated by the Soweto uprising on June 16.

DR KISSINGER has flown to southern Africa to plan imperialism's strategy in Zimbabwe, Namibia and South Africa. What is your attitude to these talks?

We view these talks as further attempts to try to stem the spreading wave of national liberation in southern Africa. They said that the main topic would be dealing with majority rule in Zimbabwe and the independence of Namibia.

Kissinger is meeting with Vorster of South Africa to talk about a solution. But we say to ourselves that Vorster, who is so brutally oppressing the black majority in South Africa, can never be a liberator of the black people of Zimbabwe and Namibia.

The same is the case of Kissinger. He talks of non-violence, but we just have to look a few years back. It was the United States who were using violence in Indo-China against the indigenous people. Now they are preaching the use of non-violence.

In their attempt to stem the national liberation movement in southern Africa they are trying to create certain types of states which will be under their control, both in Zimbabwe and Namibia.

Thus they will attempt to isolate the revolutionary governments in the peoples' republics of Angola and Mozambique, making it difficult for the liberation movement of South Africa to carry out its work.

Against

We are completely against such talks. If Vorster wants to give independence to Namibia, SWAPO have stated he must talk to them. If he is interested in the liberation of the people of Zimbabwe he must withdraw all the support he gives to Smith and let the people of Zimbabwe settle their case themselves.

Do you think the imperialist governments of the world, like the US, Britain, France and West Germany will come militarily to the aid of South Africa to stop the African revolution taking place there?

Well, I can say that they are there already militarily. South Africa's military hardware comes from these same imperialist countries. We only have to remember that right at the beginning of the Soweto uprisings, Alouette helicopters were used to drop teargas among the students. Aeroplanes are being used to transport what they call police reinforcements to Cape Town.

Whether they are going to come in physically themselves I cannot say. But we have got to note this: had it not been that the US was preparing for elections, we believe that the US would have intervened physically in Angola. Now there are 2 months left before the elections take place. We have no doubt they may come in.

Bases

Already reports have come out for example that the Pentagon are greatly interested in the independence of the Transkei. That will be another way, as they say, of 'stopping the advance of communism' to the south. So we have no doubt that they will recognise this state and they may even set up bases there whose main aim will be to block the liberation movement, because they believe that the seizure of power in South Africa by the people of South Africa will be against their interests.

Could you give a report on the situation since the uprisings began in the townships?

We say the time comes in the life of an oppressed people when they decide to say: either do away with the system, or die in the process of doing away with the system.

This is actually what is happening in South Africa today and has been happening for the past 11 weeks. The whole process which started in Soweto on June 16 appears on the surface to be a language question, but in actual fact it was much more than that.

The students clearly stated in their leaflet distributed to workers calling for 3 days stay-away from work that now we have achieved victory in the language question, we must now go ahead to overthrow the oppressor, which means the overthrow of the fascist regime of the country.

In this process we find certain complications coming up. It was reported a week or two ago that the 'Zulus', as they put it, were attacking the organisers of the stay-at-home. Originally it was put down as a racial, tribal war — the Zulus against the other tribes. But then it comes out that the one hostel that was involved had more of the Tswana-speaking than the Zulus.

The Press goes on to explain that the main reason was that the inmates of that hostel who are all coming from outside the town, migrant labour, had been ignored in the preparation of the strike. They were not informed and in their anger they turned against the organisers.

It has also come out that while these migrant workers were at their jobs, the police organised their own collaborators among the blacks to go into the hostels to destroy their property. The

police then brought back the hostel inmates in their cars. They saw them arming themselves and they let them go and do this.

So it was a sort of provocation by the police, trying to divert the attention of the people from the real enemy, and to create a conflict among the blacks. But the people have seen through this and this type of situation has been settled.

A few weeks before some rumours were spread in Durban that Zulus were advancing on the Indian areas. What was the result? The Indians armed themselves and nothing of that type of thing happened. It was again provoked by the South African police.

During the 3-day strike the police are supposed to have given out leaflets countering the strike. Remember there are wide spy-rings among the Africans set up by the police. This can only be explained by the fact that there is a great deal of unemployment in the South African urban areas.

Illegally

There are a lot of people living in Soweto for example illegally. So it is very easy for the police to get such people and say, well, if you work for us you can stay in this area. They then carry out all instructions given by the police.

But the time is coming fast when these people will turn against the South African regime. It is now that the South Africans are training black people in the army at this late stage, but they will reap the fruits of their labour. They forget what happened in the Portuguese colonies. They have no time to laugh.

Could you give an indication of the scale of the uprising?

To give figures offhand is rather difficult. It started in Soweto. The very first manifestations are reported to have been about 20,000 people involved. In Cape Town it has been happening, in townships or in the city, with figures of 300, 700 or on some days 3,000 being given.

But as for spreading right through the country, all the provinces are affected — the Transvaal, Orange Free State, Cape Province and Natal. The main cities have been affected. Even in Bloemfontein it has happened!

What's worse still, it has even happened in the Bantustan itself — which shows a complete rejection of the Bantustan policy by the people themselves. For example in Bophuthatswana the people actually burned down the so-called parliament building. In Soweto it is reported that 80 per cent of people who live there do not recognise the Bantustans at all.

Reports from the

capitalist Press and news agencies say the number killed is 300, and 1,000 arrested. Can we take these seriously?

We definitely can't take them as serious, because the figures are issued by the government, or police. It is very difficult to say how many have been killed or injured. Even mortuaries and hospitals are not allowed to give information.

Buried

We have heard cases of people being buried without relatives being informed. So a relative may be arrested or taken somewhere, but the police will never tell, so it is a man who is lost.

Did events in South Africa happen so rapidly that they took the ANC leadership to some extent by surprise? Could you answer any criticism that the ANC has not been able to give leadership to the students and workers to enable them, on the basis of a programme, to carry forward their initiatives so far in the struggle?

It is possible that the events which began on June 16 may have taken the ANC by surprise. We do not want to commit ourselves. But if that is the case one has to keep in mind that the ANC is an illegal organisation in South Africa. It can only

function in a clandestine, underground manner.

But then it is well known, and reported recently in the 'Guardian' in an interview with four young people who have come out of Soweto. They mentioned the ANC when asked who was involved.

Wild

But because of the manner in which we are forced to work in South Africa it is very difficult to get full control of the situation. When a mob goes wild it is very difficult to control it unless you are there openly and they know you are the real leaders. They cannot come up from the underground and direct it in full, so the whole direction is left to some people with not much experience.

Do you think you will get any favours from the Callaghan government in Britain?

From the Callaghan government we expect no favours. While the NEC of the Labour Party demands the withdrawal of investment and other things, Ted Rowlands, the Foreign Office minister, mentioned he would not boycott South Africa or withdraw investment. He's putting the government line, the Callaghan line. They are still looking forward to getting as much as possible from South Africa while they can.

It is a 'Labour' government, true, but one must remember this Labour government also still maintains relations with the Israeli government. Wilson went there.

The greater part of the world is demanding the rights of the Palestinian people, yet Wilson as leader of the Labour party went there and has all these types of relations with the Israeli government.

From Israel they get almost nothing — but from South Africa there are all the mineral resources, produced cheaply. That is something to think of. They won't shift — be it Labour government or Tory.

Election speeches are very dynamic. They say they will do this and that against South Africa. Workers support this. But immediately they are in office they put this aside and believe workers themselves must put their foot down. — 'is what you said when you were asking us to give you our vote the time has come to implement it.'

They said they were not going to supply weapons to South Africa. It has come out later that weapons have been coming from the Marconi factories and engines for Centurion tanks from elsewhere. The Labour government said they would stop this. It is said to be done secretly, but the Minister of Defence knew about it.

Duty

We say to the workers in Britain it is their duty to support the liberation struggle in South Africa, a struggle which involves the majority, the working people of South Africa be they black or white.

It is always the working people who suffer be they in South Africa, Britain or in any part of the world. If they do not express that solidarity and show it in action in support of the

people in South Africa then one day it will turn against them.

This has happened for example in Italy where I recently addressed a meeting in the Alfa Romeo factory and told them that Alfa Romeo has now opened a factory to manufacture spare parts in South Africa.

I told them that very soon these spare parts would be imported into Italy so that Italian workers would lose their jobs. Today this is exactly what is happening. Alfa Romeo is importing from South Africa where it is cheaper to produce them than in Italy.

Common

This is likely to happen in Britain, for example in British-Leyland. There are lay-offs in Britain, but the factory in South Africa is working normally, because production costs are low. This is why we say the British workers must definitely support the struggle of the working class of South Africa. It is a common struggle, a struggle against exploitation.

To the youth and students of Britain we say their colleagues, be they 7 or 21, are suffering. We are very happy that the NUS has chose Nelson Mandela, leader of the ANC, as their honorary president. This was a great sign of solidarity.

They even attempted to invite him to come and address their meeting, but the fascist regime refused to give a permit for him to go to London. That was solidarity with the people of South Africa. But even more is demanded now when our youth and students are prepared to lay down their lives for the liberation of their country.

We're being made to pay for the privileged few

Gary and Jane Cunliffe have been members of the Huddersfield branch of the Workers Revolutionary Party for several months. Gary works in administration at a construction engineering firm, where he is an ASTMS shop steward, and Jane is a telephonist at a textile mill.

GARY: 'We are told daily by the capitalist Press that only our sacrifices will reverse the crisis we face today. This is a lie. There is nothing mystical about fundamental economics.

If the government, with the collaboration of the TUC bureaucracy, introduces legislation to hold down wages, and nullify the traditional role of trade unions, and if prices are allowed to rise unfettered, then profits will be made.

This obviously means that the rich stay richer and the standard of living of the working class will fall.

Thus we are being made to pay, not for the good of the country, but for a very privileged few.

The Labour government implement this slump where their Tory predecessors failed.

They must be ruthlessly exposed. These measures

simply buy time for this decaying system.

We have seen weekly exposures of bribery and corruption in the multi-national companies who, as world competition intensifies, have to resort more and more to these methods and — as recent examples have shown — no statesman is untouchable.

Capital

This clearly shows the collaboration of our politicians with big finance.

This Labour government allies itself with the most reactionary nations in the world and supplies them with arms to suppress any progressive tendencies — again, all in the interests of their masters, world capital.

It is quite right, then, when the

Workers Revolutionary Party calls for the removal of this Labour government. We must fight complacency and blind faith in our 'leaders'.

Reformism is finished — the gains the working class has made in the health service and education system are being systematically dismantled.

The revolutionary tide is turning, though and the days of capitalism are numbered.

JANE: 'I attended a few summer campaign meetings of the Workers Revolutionary Party and I decided to join the party.

I can see now it's the only future for working people and youth today.

I have always been Labour because I thought they were for the working people, but all they have done is betray and divide the working class.

Trouble

Youth today have no future. They are leaving schools with no jobs to go to, thrown on the dole. This is bound to disillusion young people. They get bored and get into trouble.

This is all due to the capitalist system. People are confused by the media, but we must be concerned because the system affects our lives and standard of living.

We must force the Labour government to resign. Our party is the only party which says this.

FILM REVIEW

NOTHING TO LOSE

JOSEY WALES is an outlaw and a killer because he has nothing to lose.

Before, he was a southern farmer with a wife and young son, working the unyielding muddy earth with a wooden plough. Then they came, a marauding band of rough-necks, who burnt down his house and killed his wife and child.

They left him unconscious with a sabre gash down his right cheek, which, when it healed turned into a thin white scar of hate.

He buries his dead, and then for one moment in this magnificent film, gives way to uncontrollable, wordless pain and loss.

But it is a pain he determines to conquer through action. Literally from the ashes of his home, he pulls a Colt revolver. One bullet after another he fires, deliberately, methodically, until he has perfected his aim and is ready for the fight.

Refuses

He joins the Confederate southern forces and fights in the Civil War against the Unionists, not out of any sense of cause, but because he has nothing else. But when the war is over and the Unionists lay down their terms, Josey Wales refuses to surrender and give up his arms.

His fellow soldiers are duped into surrender by a turn-coat in the pay of the Unionists. Senators of the new government preside over the betrayal.

But when the formalities are over and the new allegiance to the government is being sworn, the Unionists massacre the surrendering Confeds as they speak.

Josey Wales witnesses all and retaliates. Seizing a Gatling gun, he mows down the Unionist troops and escapes.

From then on he is a hunted man with a price on his head, an outlaw. The turn-coat and the very man who murdered Wales' wife have the job of bringing him in.

So the framework for the action of the film is set, and out of it Clint Eastwood — director and star — fashions a completely compelling narrative of a struggle to survive, of the overcoming of fear, of the determination to fight and win by someone who is deprived of everything, who is hunted by the force of the state and every would-be bounty hunter and rogue who find profit in his death.

It is a violent film of violent times, but Wales has no choice but to fight, to consider every move consciously, never to relax, where every minute means his life and every minute can only be won by a fearless

offensive against the enemy.

His allies are the oppressed, those who have lost everything and have nothing. These are the people he meets on his long Odyssey through the southern states in the aftermath of Civil War.

The old Cherokee chief dressed in a black top hat and black frock coat tells Wales:

'They call us civilised because we got easy to sneak up on. They took away our land and sent us here. We dressed ourselves up like Abraham Lincoln. They said "You sure look civilised".

These are the men and women who have been tricked or left like beached flotsam, the remnants of a once boom town now derelict with a saloon bar that has run out of booze and a whore who has no clients. "When the silver ran out, the thriving ran out."

Personified

The enemy is the state, personified in the men who are hunting Wales, led by the men who murdered his wife. In between are those who try to play it both ends, like the ferryman who sings 'Dixie' for the Confederates and 'Marching through Georgia' for the Unionists, as he pulls them over the river.

Everywhere are hucksters and con-men looking for a buck.

Everywhere are the bounty men, looking for the pot of gold.

'Are you a bounty hunter?' asks Wales of a gunman who burst into a bar looking for him.

'Man gotta do something for a living.'

'Dying ain't much of a living, boy,' says Wales.

The exchange is typical of the laconic muscular dialogue of the picture and of the man Wales. It's physical, like the action and like the camerawork, which brings out the raw beauty of the landscapes, the colour and the tactile quality of smoke and dust and heavy weather.

'The Outlaw Josey Wales' places Clint Eastwood in the ranks of the best film-makers.

He has obviously learned a lot from Sergio Leone, who directed him in the early Italian westerns like 'The Good, Bad and the Ugly'.

But he has a greater seriousness. He understands the fight of those who have nothing to lose and everything to gain.

In this, he mirrors the struggles of the oppressed from South Africa, the Lebanon, the working class world-wide.

Whether that is his intention is not the point. But all those who are fighting to overthrow an oppressor will find a great chord resonating in 'The Outlaw Josey Wales'.

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HEALTH IN ITALY



Italian hospital ancillary workers in a strike meeting

THERE IS no proper health service in Italy. Workers in employment belong to one of a number of different health insurance schemes which have been taken over by the state.

The rates are very high but the service provided is one of the worst in Europe.

Needy

They cover the cost of doctors' visits, hospital treatment and medicines. The most needy sections of the population — the unemployed and the single mothers, for instance — are not covered.

They either have to pay or fall back on charitable centres. These are degrading institutions whose main purpose is to cover up the scandal of the poor having no free health service.

Last year the whole health system nearly broke down.

The hospitals were already

staggering under an accumulated debt burden of £3,000m. Then the cuts in expenditure by the regions were the last straw.

Money literally ran out. Hospital staff weren't paid. Medical suppliers refused to deliver bandages and patients were sent home in their thousands.

Barricades

When Sardinia's two main hospitals were closed, old people barricaded themselves in their wards shouting: 'You can't throw us out to die in the street.'

The government was forced to step in and cover some of the debts. But nothing has been solved. There are only 8.7 beds per 1,000 inhabitants compared

with 12 per 1,000 recommended by the World Health Organisation.

In Sardinia, the figure is a horrifying 2.93 per thousand.

People still have to wait months or years to have an

operation.

The administration of the hospitals is invariably right wing and linked with the Christian Democrats' power structure.

They make decisions on

purchases not on the basis of what the hospital needs, but on what profits can be made.

It is common to find pieces of very expensive equipment lying around in hospitals still in their packing cases. The administration buy them because of their relations with certain suppliers and then refuse to recruit the specialist staff to run the equipment.

Medicines

The pharmaceutical industry is entirely in private hands, either multi-national companies or in many cases companies owned by the Vatican.

They produce 22,000 different types of medicine compared to 7,000 in Britain. There are

literally dozens of identical remedies each boosted by expensive advertising campaigns.

The doctor will choose a brand according to what money the manufacturer has given to the hospital (or him). The prices, of course, are enormously inflated — up to ten times the cost of manufacture.

Queues

At the family doctor level things are not much better. There are always long queues at the surgeries and when you finally see the doctor he only gives you a few seconds' time — just enough to ask what medicine you need.

The doctors are highly paid — from £12,000 to £15,000 a year. The vast bureaucracy which runs the hospitals is generally highly paid as well, but ancillary workers have to do compulsory overtime to compensate for cuts in staff.

The predictable result of the appalling state of the health service is that the poor, the old and the children suffer most.

Italy has the highest infant mortality rate in Europe. In Naples in 1974 it was 68 deaths per 1,000 births which puts it on a level with Haiti and Zaire.

36 YEARS SINCE TROTSKY'S DEATH

Successful meetings held in Greece

SALONIKA — 170 workers and youth attended a successful meeting in this northern Greece town on September 6 to commemorate the 36th anniversary of Trotsky's death.

The meeting followed a two-day rally in Athens to commemorate the anniversary, which was attended by 1,000 people.

This was the first such meeting ever held in Salonika, and attacks on it by fascists, police, Stalinists and Maoists were unsuccessful.

Squads of police stood outside the hall equipped with riot shields, helmets and truncheons. Gangs of fascists, under the command of a plain clothes police officer, tore down posters advertising the meeting.

Also outside the hall were members of the Central Committee of the Communist Party of the Interior, and also members of the National Committee of the pro-Moscow Communist Youth of Greece — checking to see if any of their members attended the meeting. Organised Maoist groups tried

unsuccessfully to organise a provocation — they were pushed back.

The whole meeting had a tremendous impact, not least on the Stalinist youth movement. Many of its branches have held discussions on Stalinism and Trotskyism as a direct result of the campaign for the meeting.

Many members of the Stalinist youth attended the meeting, which voted for an international committee of inquiry into the circumstances surrounding Trotsky's murder.

The meeting was addressed by Babis Orinos, secretary of the Workers' Internationalist League, and by Central Committee members A. Liakos and S. Michail. A Young Socialists National Committee member also spoke.

After the meeting an old worker, a former officer of the Stalinist Liberation Movement, ELAS, who had been condemned to death after the civil war, said:

'This is the party I'm looking for. I left the Communist Party three months ago. The Stalinists have committed many crimes. I will join your party.'

Another old worker said: 'I came to find out about the differences between Trotskyism and the CP. I am very glad I came.'

The meeting was attended by many older Trotskyists, and leaders of the heroic general strike of 1936.

ATHENS — A 500-strong meeting here of workers and youth commemorating the 36th Anniversary of Trotsky's death voted unanimously for a resolution calling for an International Commission of Inquiry on the conditions surrounding the murder of leading Trotskyists and Trotsky himself by Stalin's secret service, the GPU.

The meeting, called by the Workers Internationalist

League, Greek section of the International Committee of the Fourth International, was held at Zografou basketball stadium and was part of a two-day series of events organised for the Anniversary.

The meeting was a landmark in the history of Trotskyism in Greece. Speakers including WIL Secretary Babis Orinos and Central Committee member S. Michail stressed the

importance of the campaign carried out by the International Committee of the Fourth International to form the Commission of Inquiry and expose the GPU murderers and their revisionist accomplices.

'The issues', said Michail, 'come to the surface today in a period of a new, revolutionary upsurge when the working class prepares to give the final blow to the bourgeoisie and its agents in

the working-class movement, Stalinists and revisionists'.

The film 'Trotsky' was shown for the first time in Greece and was received with great enthusiasm.

During the weekend, August 28-29, more than 1,000 workers, trade unionists and youth visited the stadium which has been transformed by the WIL and the YS into an exhibition and bazaar.

Ali's words are brave, even by his own standards. In their two earlier bouts, he failed even to put Norton on the canvas. He came away the first time with a

broken jaw, having lost the bout.

'Besides having my jaw broken in two places early in the fight, my hands hurt something awful every time I landed a punch.'

'For me this is the perfect combination of people. The whole thing is tremendously exciting and a great challenge.

We're a new team taking on the establishment.'

'Walter is a self-made man with a tremendous will to succeed in Grand Prix racing. He has the money that puts us on the same financial footing as other leading teams.'

'Peter Warr really knows what putting a team together to win races is all about. He was

with Lotus for 15 years and managed them through three world championships.'

'I believe Harvey is one of the great designers in motor racing. He's capable of building a car that can win the championship,' he said.

Scheckter said he had been offered a contract for 1977 by

Half a million plea by Wednesday

AS MONEY starts to roll in after Portsmouth's plea for survival, another club with a proud history has launched a £500,000 campaign to return to the top.

Sheffield Wednesday are issuing new shares worth £400,000 and inviting offers of up to £100,000 of unsecured loans.

In a letter circulated yesterday, club chairman Bert McGhee says: 'Our aim is simple and crystal clear — to put Sheffield Wednesday back into Division One, living up to its history of being one of the top eight teams in the country.'

In the last financial year Wednesday were £358,141 in the red. The club, which is 109 years old and the third oldest in the Football League, dropped from Division One in 1970 and last season narrowly escaped relegation to the Fourth Division.

Meanwhile, Portsmouth's appeal for £25,000 to save the club from extinction is receiving an enthusiastic response from supporters, but has led to controversy on the board.

Inundated

Commercial manager Bill Davis was inundated with offers of help when he opened his mail yesterday morning. 'The response has been fantastic. The way things are going we could raise £100,000 by Christmas,' he said.

Offers have included free shows, snooker matches — everything. No offer will be refused. One man even offered to bring all his brass and copper to the ground to sell.

But a former chairman of the club claims that the campaign will not save the club from bankruptcy, and he has called on the present chairman, John Deacon, to resign.

Dennis Collett, who is still a member of the five-man board, says the £25,000 appeal will only 'postpone the inevitable'.

Collett will put his own plans for saving the former League and Cup winners to the board tomorrow. 'I have people who are willing to put money up — but it involves a change of control,' he said yesterday.

He added: 'I am very glad that Mr Deacon has come into the open to a degree at last, but it is only half the story. Much more has to be put before the people of Portsmouth so that they know the full financial position.'

'Twenty-five thousand pounds will only buy a short time. I can arrange for the club to survive,' he claimed.

EUROPE OR BUST FOR THE SAINTS

SOUTHAMPTON were riding the crest of a wave four months ago after their shock win over Manchester United in the Cup Final. They play in Europe for the first time tonight without a single win under their belts since that Wembley triumph.

Lawrie McMenemy, the Saints manager, knows that something extra is needed against French Cupholders Olympique Marseille at The Dell to prove the club is worthy of a place in the European soccer show.

He admitted last night: 'This is a tough one, a really tough one, make no mistake about that. We know what is expected of us — it's the Cup winners of England against the Cup winners of France. A lot is at stake.'

Hero

McMenemy makes two changes. Goalkeeper Ian Turner, injured in the opening game of the season, ousts on-loan and ineligible Colin Boulton and Bobby Stokes, goalscoring hero at Wembley, replaces UEFA suspended Jim McCalliog.

Marseille — nine times French cup winners — bring their new recruit from Argentina, Norberto Alonso, extravagantly called 'the wizard of the ball', and his goalscoring compatriot, Hector Yazalde, to probe the Saints' defence.

Manchester United return to European soccer after seven lean years. Only Alex Stepney remains of the 1968 team which crushed Benfica 4-1 at Wembley to win the Champions' Cup.

Armfield changes mind

JIMMY Armfield, the Leeds manager, has changed his mind and fined striker David McNiven who kicked Spurs defender Keith Osgood during last Saturday's First Division match.

Armfield, who missed the incident, at first said he would take no action after talking to McNiven. But after a board meeting at Elland Road, he announced yesterday that a 'heavy fine' would be imposed.

He said: 'It is important to protect the image of the game and the club. McNiven is a young player and he has to learn that sort of thing cannot be tolerated.'

McNiven would undoubtedly have been sent off if referee John Hunting had been in a position to see the incident.

The FA may step in and take the matter further, although no complaints have been sent in to Lancaster Gate.

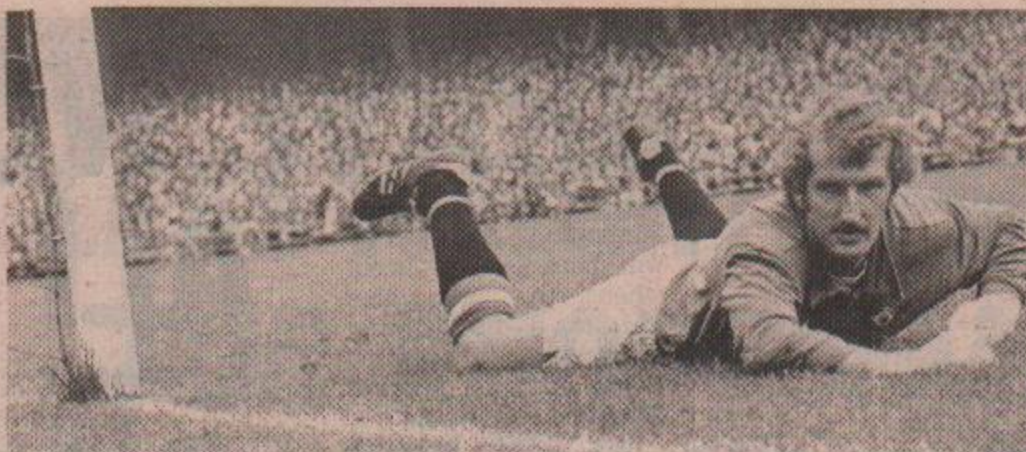
