

Pound fall becomes avalanche

THE FALL in the pound became an avalanche yesterday as sterling crashed down to its lowest level ever.

A full 2½ cents was knocked off during another day's relentless selling and the pound ended up at \$1.6810.

Chancellor Denis Healey's reluctance to start an import-tariff war against Japanese goods; Labour Party conference criticism of the government; and fears that seamen's fringe

benefits will go to other workers, — all were blamed.

One dealer commented: 'Today the business was virtually all one way. Unless the authorities take some action, this looks like going on.'

'I cannot see what they can do. But unless something is done, sterling could go down to \$1.65.'

The fall we have had

already is worrying enough for our inflation and balance of payments.'

The pound has fallen nearly 10 cents since the seamen's strike threat. Devaluation since 1971 has reached a record 43.6 per cent.

Sterling dropped to its lowest ever in Germany yesterday, DM4.165. In New York, it fell below the \$1.68 level at one point.

REBEL AGAINST CUTS

BLACKPOOL — A series of Clay Cross-style rebellions against government spending cuts was urged yesterday by the Labour Party conference.

The vote for resistance by local authorities against the government's latest economic measures came at the end of a key debate on unemployment, investment and public spending.

The delegates, supported by several big unions, including the engineers, called on all Labour councils to refuse to follow government orders to axe housing, health and education programmes.

The resolution, moved by the National Union of Public Employees, demanded the government carry out its manifesto pledge, and improve the social services.

Refused

It backed those Labour councils which have refused to implement the cuts, and it called on 'other Labour groups to follow suit'.

The resolution went on to urge the Labour Party to 'conduct an active campaign against cuts in public expenditure' and it called on the national executive to support trade unions who oppose the cuts.

The Labour leadership were embarrassed by the vote and significantly chairman Tom Bradley did not call for a card count of delegates.

But lefts won't fight for decision

As one leading Labour Party national executive member said afterwards:

'In a card vote the unions would have had to stand up and be counted. Not many wanted to do this.'

Quite frankly the issue is this. We did not support Clay Cross. What real chance is there of the movement supporting scores of other councils who go against government policy?

This warning is certainly correct. The Callaghan leadership will ignore the resolution as it has all attacks by the Party on its policies.

On the general issue of the spending cuts, conference was left looking both ways.

While it supported a campaign at local authority level, it rejected another resolution which demanded an immediate halt to any further reductions in public expenditure.

This confusion will undoubtedly allow the leadership to argue that no clear mandate has been given and thus avoid any real fight against Callaghan and the Cabinet.

Apart from this upset Callaghan, who observed the

debates from the platform, got overwhelming support for his policies and consolidated his right-wing hold.

This was due to the deal made between the union leaders and the government before the conference.

One of the most cynical moments came when Anthony Wedgwood Benn made a militant-sounding speech aimed at rallying an increasingly demoralised and hostile constituency party section behind the government.

He claimed that the national executive's new programme of

reforms was the answer to the world capitalist crisis.

But Benn made absolutely no reference to his own open support for the Callaghan administration which has stated it will not carry out any of the changes demanded like the nationalisation of the banking and financial system.

Criticism was levelled against Chancellor of the Exchequer Denis Healey for his failure to be present during the crucial economic debate.

Union chiefs Hugh Scanlon and Clive Jenkins made a strident nationalist call for import controls which are opposed by Healey.

But all the union leaders refused to call for any consistent struggle against the anti-working class policies of the Labour government.

Teachers' injunction move is rejected

THE High Court yesterday rejected an application by six teachers from William Tyndale School for an injunction against the Inner London Education Authority.

The six had sought to restrain ILEA from going ahead with a disciplinary tribunal to which they have been summoned and which starts tomorrow.

They claimed that the Tribunal chairman, Barrister Michael Howard was 'in too close proximity' to the report on which the charges against them are based, because he came from the same

chambers as Robin Auld QC, who wrote the report.

They also claimed that Mr Howard was a member of the Bow Group of the Conservative Party and that this would colour his views on educational method.

They objected to the triple role of the Inner London Education Office in setting up the inquiry, nominating two of its members (out of five) and presenting the complaints.

RIGHT TO WORK MARCHER APPEALS AGAINST JAIL

A 'RIGHT to Work' marcher was jailed for six months by Hendon, London, magistrates yesterday.

There were shouts of 'shame' from the public gallery as the sentence was meted out to 23-year-old Michael Lynch of Dunfermline.

Lynch was found guilty of assaulting the police during clashes outside West Hendon police station in March during a 'Right to Work' march organised by the International Socialism group.

Four other marchers were found guilty of assaulting or obstructing the police. David Hayes, 24, of Newcastle, Lloyd Rogall, 25, of Kilburn, and Michael Alderson, 22, of Bristol were each given prison

sentences of three months suspended for two years and fined £25 on each of the charges.

Patrick Cronshaw, 39, of Salford, was found guilty of obstructing the police and given a conditional discharge for a year.

Two men — Peter Fysh and Marcus Luck — had police assault charges against them dismissed. After the hearing Lynch said he would be appealing against his sentence and was later granted bail totalling £2,100.

Blackpool's deliberate air of unreality

THE assembled delegates at the Labour Party conference yesterday endorsed overwhelmingly the government's pay policy and accepted its cynical programme of a 6 per cent economic growth rate and creation of one million jobs.

Meanwhile outside the hall, the reality of slump and depression was asserting itself with a thousand times greater authority.

The pound fell almost 2 cents to \$1.68. Not a mention of this in the conference. Not a word about this being the reason for Chancellor Healey's absence from the platform.

The platform of Cabinet ministers and NEC members blandly ignore this crisis. But they know very well that the world bankers through the IMF will tell Prime Minister Callaghan in two weeks' time to stop borrowing to pay interest on past loans and instead launch the biggest-ever attacks on the working class.

Their promises are the cynicism of accomplished liars and betrayers. The only claim they could consistently make was that they were the only ones who could have reduced the strike rate, the only guardians of national discipline to preserve capitalist order in the crisis.

They lied themselves blue in the face saying they had been sustained in office by an alliance of Labour Party, trade unions and government. Everybody knows it is the Tories and nationalists who have sustained them. But not one man dared say so.

The so-called lefts made an impassioned declaration of their own bankruptcy. Hugh Scanlon, Clive Jenkins and their friends called for import controls, lending themselves in this way to the national unity and discipline campaign that is being used to whip the movement into line.

These men have become the main protagonists of the capitalist trade war, in which the workers and capitalists of each imperialist country unite against those of other nations. They are exactly what Lenin called them: social imperialists.

Jenkins even called on Callaghan to take a lesson from France where the big bankers are actually in government slashing wages. Scanlon's demagoguery against 'the scourge of unemployment' was understood by the platform for the hypocrisy it was — and his resolution was accepted by them.

Fisher, Scanlon and others warned that the government might lose credibility and thus lose the next election. This is not the point. This government is preparing to sink the pound and destroy the standards of living of the working class.

But they cannot control the situation. To avoid the catastrophe, the government must be brought down by the working class. That is the real issue before the conference and not Judith Hart's plea to 'Jim' and 'Denis' to please do something.

A massive conference majority for Callaghan and the platform creates the greatest illusions. Its essence is that the government is about to operate the greatest attacks of all. The trade union bureaucrats who vote for Callaghan are commemorating the betrayal of 1926 by going all the way with Callaghan and the bankers.

There must be no illusions. That is their role and they are playing it out to the end. The necessary polarisation between them and the working class is now being forced at breakneck speed by the crisis — that is the reality behind this Blackpool conference.

THE director of music of the band of the grenadier guards was accused at a London court-martial yesterday of stealing the proceeds of 12 unauthorised performances by members of the band.

Major Peter Parkes was also accused of improperly and to his personal financial benefit permitting 68 unauthorised performances by members of the band, and negligently failing to maintain adequate control and accounting of proceeds from the sale of records, causing a loss to the public of £3,745.

The total involved in the 12 theft charges was £2,202. Maj. Parkes denied all charges.

Peterborough firm sacks a third

AN engineering firm in Peterborough is to slash its workforce by over a third because of a drop in orders.

About 500 workers at Peter Brotherhood Ltd are to lose their jobs. There will also be the possibility of some short-time working, company chairman Mr Bill Gardner said.

The company specialises in turbo-generators, nylon spinning equipment and other specialised machinery which it exports all over the world.

The announcement by the company came at the weekend

only two days after the company announced a record £1.5m profits.

A group of shareholders have approached Peterborough MP Mr Michael Ward to take immediate action at government level to save the jobs.

Talks are starting between union officials and management in a bid to find out which departments are affected and how soon redundancies start.

'Unnecessary' deaths says doctor

PATIENTS have died in a west London hospital from pressure sores simply for want of a few water-beds and adequate equipment, a consultant geriatrician has claimed.

The deaths are revealed in a letter to 'The Lancet' from Dr James Andrews, consultant geriatrician at the West Middlesex hospital.

'In my view this is quite unnecessary, but nobody seems to care any more,' he said yesterday.

Two patients have died from pressure sores in his unit in recent months, Dr Andrews

said. Yet he was told there was not the money available to buy or hire water-beds to prevent the sores developing.

The sores develop when patients lie unmoved for long periods.

Dr Andrews added that denying resources and staff to geriatric patients in this way was like saying 'Sorry, there is no more penicillin this month'.

Those nurses available were 'very conscientious' at turning patients, Dr Andrews said, but there were not enough of them.

He said he was sure the situation in his unit was not

unique. Apart from the risk of complications with the sores leading to death, bed sores cause unnecessary suffering and wasted valuable resources as patients had to stay in hospital weeks, sometimes months, while the sores healed.

Water beds cost £300 to £400 each, Dr Andrews said. But when he asked for money 'one is told there is none'.

'All the lip-service being paid to increasing resources for the elderly has a somewhat hollow ring. People are dying and nothing is happening,' Dr Andrews added.



WAITING GAME AT LUXURY SQUAT

IT WAS a waiting game yesterday at the luxury former home of Tory MP Michael Heseltine for squatter Michael Stewart, seven other adults and four children. A High Court judge has given them until 10 o'clock this morning to quit.

If not, an army of bailiffs will be sent in to reclaim the £200,000 house in Chepstow Villas, Kensington, now owned by Sheika Noora Bin Sultan al Qasimi, widow of King Faisal, as a 'summer house'.

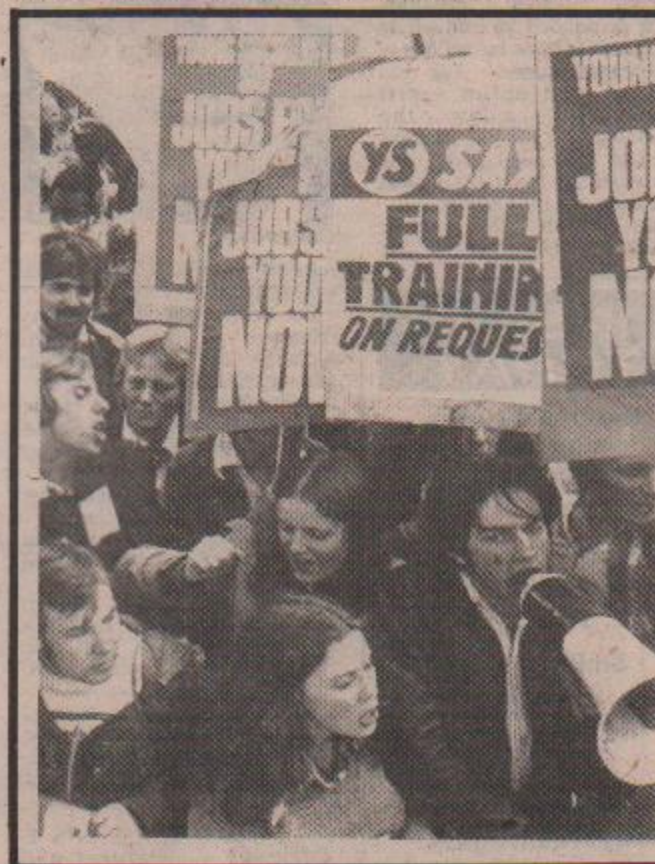
No drought relief

THE WEEKEND'S torrential rain brought floods, but little change in the drought situation, according to the National Water Council. 'It is going to take some time before the reservoirs fill up,' a spokesman said yesterday.

The Anglian Water Authority, covering one of the worst

drought-hit areas, said the rain since Friday probably only represented one day's water supply for a town like Northampton.

The Environment Department said the downpours might delay the introduction of standpipes. Heavy flows of water could contaminate existing supplies.



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NATIONAL FRONT MAN VETS IMMIGRANTS

AN ACTIVE National Front member has been found in charge of vetting immigrants.

Mr Joseph Deakins, an immigration official at Heathrow airport, has been an NF member for six months.

Deakins's exposure follows a check throughout the Civil Service after the leaking earlier this year of the Hawley report on immigration.

The Home Office has launched an investigation into his case and is considering whether he should remain in the immigration service or not.

Denying that his political views have any bearing on his job, Deakins said: 'I am opposed to further immigration.'

Deakins, who works at the airport's Terminal 3 dealing with intercontinental arrivals, was not available for

comment yesterday.

The editor of the National Front's newspaper 'Spearhead', Richard Verrall, said:

'I think it is a little bit silly to single out one of our members when the great majority of immigration officials at Heathrow are positively

against this continuing flow of immigrants.

'At least 12 of them have written to us this year expressing their horror about it.'

'One of their concerns is the number of Asian immigration officers working at the airport, who could presumably

be expected to be biased the other way.'

'If this man is going to be victimised because he is a member of a certain political party, then that is a disgrace,' he said.

Verrall confirmed that Deakins joined the National Front in March this year.

Steelfixers win support

A mass meeting of T&GWU labourers and scaffolders voted yesterday morning to come out in support of 40 steelfixers on strike at the Ince B power station building site at Ellesmere Port, Cheshire.

The steelfixers, McAlpine employees, have been on strike since last Friday in a dispute over bonus pay.

McAlpine joiners (UCATT) were on strike for several weeks over the same issue and returned to work two weeks ago after winning the bonus claim.

The steelfixers who were laid off during this period, returned to work assuming they would get £1.20 bonus.

After working two weeks, including a week in hand, they received bonus pay of 85p.

They took immediate strike action and mounted a 24 hour picket.

Today's meeting was called after painters including stewards crossed the weekend

picket line, breaking a site agreement, to impose a 40 hr week.

Pickets yesterday morning stopped all McAlpine workers in both T&GWU and UCATT.

After a preliminary meeting, at which the painters' stewards were severely reprimanded, UCATT members were allowed to return to work, after a 'no overtime' pledge from painters' stewards.

Several hundred labourers and scaffolders then met with steelfixers, and the vote of support was taken.

Slater shares slip

SHARES in Slater Walker slipped to another record low yesterday hours before Jim Slater was due to appear on television. Once worth more than £3 a time, they dropped from 9½p, on Friday night to 7½p. This is just 1½p below their previous record low reached immediately after publication of the accountants' report on the company showing multi-million pound write-offs and big loans to directors.

Drunk juror fined

AN OLD BAILEY judge yesterday fined a juror £25 under an ancient law for being drunk and unfit for jury service. Judge Campbell, QC, also banned him from sitting on a jury again. George Harris, 48, of Tottenham, admitted arriving drunk at the Old Bailey on Friday after attending an all-night party. The judge told Harris: 'Anyone who behaves as irresponsibly as you have is not fit to sit in judgement on fellow men.'

Charities' tax plea

A new plea for tax concessions to help charities was made yesterday by Mr James Loring, director of the Spastics Society. Loring, speaking at the opening of a home for handicapped children at Eastbourne, Sussex, pointed out that his appeal came as 'the level of social services for the handicapped in many local authority areas is likely to be reduced because of the economic crisis'.

Fire inquest today

AN INQUEST will open today on the eight Swan Hunter shipyard workers who died in a blaze on 'HMS Glasgow', the £23m guided missile destroyer being built at Wallsend. The hearing, at Newcastle, will be adjourned after evidence of identification.

Costello to quit

THE IRISH REPUBLIC'S attorney-general, Declan Costello, is to quit parliamentary politics. He said in a letter to premier Liam Cosgrave that he would not stand for re-election to the Dail, the Dublin parliament for 'personal and family reasons'.

Costello, 60, headed the Irish legal team at the European Commission of Human Rights investigation into allegations against Britain of torture in Northern Ireland. Next week, he is due to present his government's case when the supreme court in Dublin examines the new anti-terrorist law on constitutional grounds.

Skipper questioned

THE SKIPPER of a Russian trawler is still being questioned by Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries officials over allegations that he broke Britain's 12-mile fishing limit. The 2,200-ton 'Dzukiya' was stopped on Saturday night off the Isles of Scilly by the fishery patrol ship 'HMS Soberton'.

She escorted the trawler into Plymouth yesterday after hours of negotiations between a boarding party from the warship, the Soviet skipper and the chief of Russia's Atlantic fishing fleet.

New orders down

CONTRACTORS received new orders to the total value of £666m for construction work in Great Britain in July, according to provisional statistics obtained by the Department of the Environment. Expressed in constant (1970) prices and adjusted to exclude normal seasonal variations, total new orders for three months from May to July, 1976, were 13 per cent down on the previous three months but 5 per cent up on the period May to July 1975.

New orders in the public housing sector in the May to July 1976 period were down 15 per cent on the previous three months.

Delivery men throw deal out

COVENTRY — Car delivery drivers at Silcock and Colling on strike against redundancies yesterday rejected unanimously a formula for a return to work put by union officials.

The drivers threw out a proposal put by Transport & General Workers' Union official John Joynson which would have meant one in five drivers going on the dole every fifth week.

Joynson told the men that the company would reinstate the 17 drivers made redundant for a six-month period only. But ten out of the 48 men would be on 'permanent stand-down' each week.

His appeal fell on deaf ears, however, and the drivers voted solidly to stay out.

A steward told News Line: 'The dispute is hardening and our next move is to call a national stewards' meeting. We hope this can take place this week.'

FUEL PRICES RISE FRIDAY

FURTHER big increases in the price of fuel come into effect on Friday.

Gas will go up by an average of 12 per cent, electricity by just under 1 per cent and domestic

coal by 10.5 per cent.

There are sufficient fuel cost increases in the pipe-line to push up electricity charges a further 1.5 per cent. The National Coal Board is expected to be seeking big increases next year.

More oil companies will soon

follow Shell's lead by putting a further 2p per gallon on all oil products.

The world's major oil producers are to end their present freeze and raise prices by around 10 per cent from January 1.

Busmen's contempt for board

TWO BUSMEN are to sit in at London Transport board meetings for a two-year trial period.

Larry Smith, national bus officer of the Transport and General Workers' Union, told about 50 Inside Staff delegates from London garages they would sit in on decisions about buying new buses, repair of existing stock, conditions of work, amenities for workers, planning of routes etc.

Smith was asked why this participation scheme was being introduced at this particular time and what was the point of 'participation' when the Greater London Council controls all the money for transport.

Smith claimed workers could now have an influence on how the funds were spent.

Garage engineers pointed out they had been asking nearly a year for floor cleaning machines to replace obsolete and broken down machines. But because of the tight budget control, nothing has been done.

Smith got angry when challenged about the overall economic situation, being asked what was the use of participation in a slump.

He attacked the bus workers, trying to blame them for the

mass unemployment and living standard cuts imposed by the Labour government with TUC help.

The 'participation' scheme will go ahead, but most bus workers know it will change nothing.

WAGES AND SOCIAL CONTRACT

Union chiefs still behind wage-cutting

A PLEDGE that there would be no attack on the 'social contract' along the lines of the seamen's fringe benefits settlement was delivered yesterday by Harry Urwin, transport workers' union deputy secretary.

Urwin opened the debate on wages policy which ended with an overwhelming vote from the big unions in favour of the government-TUC attack on living standards.

'We deny absolutely that the recent agreement made by the National Union of Seamen will open the door to a flood of fringe of benefit settlements outside the social contract,' said Urwin.

Not a single trade union leader got to the rostrum to challenge this complete backing for the government policy.

Urwin went on to call for a gradual move away from strict wage limits starting next year. But he emphasised that TUC-government collaboration against free collective bargaining would go on.

'We need collective bargaining, but we need co-operation with the government. Therefore the TUC and the government must keep all incomes under review,' said Urwin.

David Basnett, general secretary of the General and Municipal Workers' Union, also threw his weight behind the social contract. He said it had guaranteed an advance of 'democratic socialism'.

'But this achievement, bright as it is, is dimmed by the effect of unemployment.'

The solution to unemployment must be the first

minimum £50 wage, and a 35-hour week.

He said that people who had warned that the capitalist system had not changed had been classed as unrealistic.

'But the reality is here now, the reality is in 1.5 million unemployed,' he said, to strong applause. He added that the government had brought the working class to the brink of the 1930s and praised the seamen for their fight.

To more applause he said: 'It is an irony of history that 50 years ago in the general strike the seamen blacklegged against our movement and refused to support that strike.'

What an irony that 50 years later we are using the strength of the trade union movement against the seamen to cut an increase that had already been agreed on.

Gerry Lerner, of Salford East constituency party, also attacked the agreement between the union leaderships and the government. He said what was now being proposed for next year was the social contract stage three.

Lerner, however, claimed that the capitalist slump was over.

'The crisis we are in now is not a temporary crisis, it's a world crisis we have been through. This slump that we have been through is now over. We are now in a boom,' said Lerner.

But Lerner warned that there would be more slumps.

None of the mild warnings about unemployment embarrassed Brian Stanley who wound up the debate for the national executive. The POEW leader said that only the Labour Party could 'unify the nation' in this period of economic crisis.

He boasted that the benefits of this collaboration had resulted in the fewest number of strikes this year for two decades.

He said the objectives of the government were to bring down inflation, restore full employment, restore rising living standards and revise the social fabric.

Frank Chapple, general secretary of the electricians' union, said attacks made on the policy assumed that the alternative presented would solve Britain's problems.

'But they present a socialist easy life. There is no such life and no such socialism.'

Joe Jacob, parliamentary candidate for Beeston, said the City had no confidence in the

Labour government because it believed the government was attacking it.

'It follows that it might be useful if we stop trying to appease them because they do not need appeasing. If they believe already why not do it?'

A delegate from Liverpool, Walton, Ted Mooney, blamed the social contract for a fall in living standards without eliminating inflation and unemployment.

'We are reaching the situation where the British workers will be the coolie of western Europe,' he said.

Mooney called for an immediate £50 minimum wage for a 35-hour week.

Callaghan's chauvinism

FORMER Social Services Secretary Barbara Castle was 'coldly angry' with premier Callaghan after being sacked from the Ministry when Callaghan took office earlier this year.

She describes Callaghan as 'a bit of a male chauvinist' in an account of her sacking in the magazine 'Woman'. Callaghan had said: 'I'm sorry, but I need your job.'

Callaghan told her that he wanted to reduce the age of the cabinet. She adds: 'I

longed to say, "Well, in that case, why not start with yourself?", for after all, he was 65, about the same age as I was.'

Castle, who was 'shattered', had already told former Prime Minister Wilson that she wanted to make way for someone younger in a short time. 'But first I wanted to see certain things that I'd started go through parliament', she said.

'Jim has this blind spot about women politicians', she says. Callaghan has halved the number of women in the cabinet. She was surprised to learn that 'he hadn't used his reshuffle to give Shirley Williams a bigger ministerial job immediately'.

'He is not one to give women opportunities', says Mrs Castle, who, on the night of her sacking 'had a little blub' at a party at the ministry.

Two men and dog in phone demo

TWO men and a dog yesterday staged a protest demo outside the Labour Party conference at Blackpool against a Post Office proposal to charge 12p for directory inquiry calls.

George Nash, with his Alsatian dog Kiska, and Francis Lord, both officials of the National Federation of the Blind, received an assurance from Preston North MP Ron Atkins that he would take up their cases.

Nash said the blind should be exempt from the charges as they could not look up telephone numbers themselves and feared that the charges would lead to a loss of jobs for blind telephoneists.

SPENDING CUTS

RAP FOR GOVERNMENT SPENDING CUTS

A TRADE union attack on the Labour government's spending cuts was supported by delegates to the Labour Party conference yesterday afternoon.

By a three-to-two majority, delegates defied a plea from the party's national executive committee (NEC) to reject the attack contained in a resolution from the National Union of Public Employees.

'Left' NEC member Judith Hart was put up by the Labour leadership to make the appeal for rejection. She asked NUPE to agree to remit to the executive the strongly-worded resolution.

Alan Fisher, NUPE general secretary, shouted his refusal from the back of the hall.

Party chairman Tom Bradley then called on delegates to vote down the resolution — but without success.

Speaking during the debate, Fisher said: 'Unless conference passes this resolution, it may as well pack up and go home tonight. Because otherwise, the whole of the other resolutions on the agenda on housing, health, pensions, unemployment and wages, will not be worth the paper on which they are written.'

Incredible

Fisher said it was incredible that anyone on the NEC or the platform could oppose his union's stand against the cuts.

He said that on one hand the government was introducing 'jobs creation' and other schemes, while on the other hand it was forcing through spending cuts which were forcing local authorities and other employers in the public sector to sack workers to save money.

Disillusionment caused by reducing the social services would lead to the destruction of the Labour Party at the next General Election, warned Fisher.



Fisher

Seconding the NUPE resolution, Cardiff North-West delegate, Jeff Cuthbert, rebuked Callaghan for saying nationalisation was an albatross around the neck of the party.

'The real albatross is these horrific spending cuts,' he said. John Kotz, from Hackney Central, also spoke in support. 'If people cannot see the difference between us and the Tories, who can blame them for looking elsewhere?'

'The government must listen to the rank and file and not to the City,' added Kotz.

The debate on the cuts was part of a general debate also taking in unemployment and calls for a 35-hour week.

The overall debate was opened on behalf of the NEC by Energy Secretary Anthony Wedgwood Benn.

Benn said: 'We utterly reject the campaign waged day in and day out by business, the Tory Press and media that presents

our present crisis as due to a failing of the working people of Britain.

'For too long they have been set up as scapegoats for the true failing, which is a failing of British capitalism.'

High unemployment was the product of the continuing failure of capital to invest in industry, leaving many of the country's finest manufacturing firms to bleed to death and denying to the people the tools they needed to work.

Price

Benn said bad industrial relations were a direct result of trying to run industry without giving the workers at least an equal say in how their industry should be run.

He added: 'In addition to the economic price we are paying conference must face the fact that as a party we are also

paying a heavy political price for 20 years in which as a party we have played down our criticism of capitalism and soft-pedalled our advocacy of socialism.'

Benn said a political vacuum in the Labour Party had been filled by many different voices competing for attention.

'Monetarists, nationalists and racists were seeking to divide the working people and to breed despair so that they might be driven to lose faith in themselves and their capacity to control their destiny.'

'Unless we speak more clearly, we shall be fighting the next election deep inside our own political territory instead of being on the offensive on behalf of our own people.'

A separate resolution opposing the public spending cuts was heavily defeated by the conference. This rejection was on the advice of Judith Hart.

Moved by Richmond CLP this



Scanlon

resolution said the government must 'stop any further cuts in public spending in order to prevent any further decline in the standards of social, educational and community services.'

Richmond delegate Bob Marshall-Andrews said no further cuts could be tolerated by the labour movement.

Horror

In return for the £6 limit the employers had failed to give anything. Many Labour voters, he said, who felt the social contract had been a step towards socialism were now watching in horror at the attacks on the sick, disabled and the unemployed.

Seconding, British Leyland worker Joe Ward from Bromsgrove and Redditch said that the cuts would result 'in our

biggest electoral defeat we have seen this century.'

Among those who voted against the Richmond motion was Hugh Scanlon, president of the AUEW.

In a 'left' speech which won him loud and long cheers from delegates, he made it clear that government policies to reduce unemployment and to stop cheap imports were not enough.

Scourge

And he urged the Prime Minister: 'Jim be bold — grasp the nettle.'

Scanlon added that if the government adopted firmer policies, it could conquer 'this scourge of unemployment'.

Another defeated resolution, moved by Tottenham CLP, called for a 35-hour week without loss of pay; public works schemes; and nationalisation of firms which sacked workers.

Reject

The NEC asked delegates to reject this policy.

Tottenham delegate Martin Upham said a mass army of unemployed was being created and no jobs had been saved as a result of the £6 pay limit.

Discussion on MPs is blocked

ANGRY protests were made over a decision to block all discussion of rank-and-file control of Labour MPs. Delegates protested that more than 40 resolutions on the issue had not appeared on the conference agenda.

Terry Hunt, from Basingstoke CLP, pointed out that Labour MPs regularly ignored conference policy. He said to loud applause that the only way to bring them in line was to make them accountable to their constituents.

He was supported by Bernard

Dix of the National Union of Public Employees, who said that his union had sent in an emergency resolution asking for a discussion of MP's selection at the conference. But this had been refused.

The chairman of the committee which arranges

conference business, Derek Gladwin, said a discussion of the accountability of MPs was out of order because it had been aired in 1974.

The national executive could have recommended a

discussion, but they had failed to do so.

The NEC now oppose more power at the grass roots to remove right-wing MPs and ministers like Reg Prentice, who was sacked by Labour members in Newham North East.

Running battle over Press freedom

WASHINGTON — US Secretary of State Henry Kissinger and ex-President Richard Nixon are among top figures being sued for alleged harassment by Washington journalist Jack Anderson.

Les Whitten, co-author of Anderson's nationally-syndicated Washington column says Anderson will probably file his suit in Federal Court later this week.

The journalist is suing the top Nixon officials for \$22m, alleging they initiated undercover operations intended to harass him and his reporting team, or to learn their sources.

The Anderson case is the latest in a series of legal and verbal skirmishes now developing into a running battle between journalists and the state powers.

Sources

In California, four newsmen from the 'Fresno Bee' were freed from prison last week after spending two weeks of an indefinite sentence inside for refusing to disclose their sources.

The case arose from a 1975 story in the paper about corruption in local government.

At the Superior Court hearing last Friday, Anderson testified for the 'Fresno Four' that the practice of concealing names of confidential sources was a fundamental ethical principle for journalists.

Jack Nelson, Washington bureau chief for the 'Los Angeles Times', cited Press exposures of Watergate as having been vital in bringing about prosecutions of the conspirators.

Destroy

'Fresno Bee' managing editor George Gruener, one of the jailed four, said that identifying a confidential news source 'would destroy me and my profession'.

After hearing the arguments, Judge Hollis Best declared that he was

persuaded the issue was a 'moral principle'.

He ruled that it would be 'pointless' to hold the four any longer since they had made it clear that no matter how long they were held in jail they would continue to defy the order to reveal sources.

The issue of naming sources also came up last week in the case of CBS television reporter Daniel Schorr, hauled before the House of Representatives Ethics Committee over the leaking of the Otis Pike papers on the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA).

Secret

The papers, resulting from a year-long probe of FBI and CIA activity by a House of Representatives committee, were to be kept secret on the insistence of President Ford.

They ended up being published in the New York 'Village Voice' and Schorr admitted he had passed them on.

Anxious to prove themselves to the executive, the Congress resolved to pursue the leak.

More than 400 witnesses were questioned, including congressmen who had helped draft the report. Then Schorr was subpoenaed to testify in person.

Although proposals were made to charge him with contempt, take him to court and to deprive him of Press credentials, the Committee finally decided — by a close vote — to back down.

Schorr and his lawyer hailed the result as 'a great victory for freedom of the Press'.

But it remains to be seen

whether he'll be working for CBS again — they took him off the air last February.

The Committee stressed that Schorr's case should not be taken as a precedent: the rights of journalists, especially in reporting congressional affairs, remain in question.

Attacked

Edward Tulley, a top FBI official responsible for training new agents in 'behavioural sciences', gave a lecture last month before a conference of Louisiana sheriffs in which he attacked the Press and what he called 'the new intelligentsia'.

Tulley claimed that the intelligentsia's 'continued assault on constitutional matters has given them more and more freedom to practise life-styles which make Sodom and Gomorrah pale by comparison'.

Rout

Declaring that law-enforcement officers must 'rout out from all levels of government' these intellectuals whom they disapproved of, Tulley said, 'we are the ones who must make proper attitudes dominate'.

The FBI's top ideologist — which is what Mr Tulley is — proclaimed that what he called 'the warrior class' of law-enforcement officers must 'cry the battle alarm' against the 'new intelligentsia'.

If this is not quite the voice of fascism, it is close enough to it to deserve attention.

Police chiefs on torture charges

ATHENS — Five high-ranking officers of the Greek police force, two of them still in active service, appeared before a civil court yesterday charged with torturing political prisoners during the military regime which ended in July 1974.

The trial, which is expected to last several days, is the last of a series in which army and police officers have answered charges of torture during the military regime.

The five officers, including retired police force Lieutenant General Constantine Karabatsos and Xenofon Tzavaras, are charged with causing serious bodily harm to a number of people detained for their activities against the seven-year military regime.

Accused of insulting and threatening their prisoners and abuse of power against the detainees, as well as torture, the defendants face up to five years' imprisonment on each charge.

Doubt on Barre's austerity programme

PARIS — Prime Minister Raymond Barre's anti-inflation plan, which includes a price freeze and a recommended 6.5 per cent wage ceiling, has been received unfavourably by most people in France.

According to a poll conducted for the newspaper Le Figaro 51 per cent of those questioned were pessimistic about the plan's chances of success, while only 32 per cent were optimistic. As for Barre's personal popularity, the ratio was 58-20 per cent in his favour.

'Obscene Emperor' man gets 14 months

TOKYO — An ex-convict was sentenced yesterday to 14 months' hard labour for distributing obscene pictures representing Emperor Hirohito and other members of the imperial family.

A Tokyo court found Kenzo Okuzaki, 56, guilty of passing out 3,600 of the pictures in the capital last April.

He had previously served 18 months in prison for throwing a pinball which missed the Emperor when the imperial family was receiving new year greetings from citizens in the grounds of their palace in 1969.

ZIONIST 'PIRATE' RAID ON JUMBLATT

LIMASSOL — Israeli naval units patrolling off Lebanon have staged a sensational piratical attack on a ship carrying Lebanese Socialist leader Kemal Jumblatt to Cyprus.

Passengers disembarking here from the Lebanese-owned 'Phoenicia', said two Israeli warships approached, one on each side, and rammed the passenger-ship. They opened five holes in the 'Phoenicia's' hull, which began to take water.

The Israelis also exploded mines near the ship's propeller, damaging the motor and forcing it to a halt.

They then fired machine-gun bursts over the passengers' heads.

Threatened

Over a loud-hailer, the Zionists then threatened the passengers, and said they would destroy the Cyprus-based ship if it tried to sail to left-held Lebanese ports in future.

The attack began late on Sunday night, 13 miles off the Lebanese coast, 1½ hours after the 'Phoenicia' began its journey. At midnight, an Israeli helicopter flew over ship, dropping flares.

The 'Phoenicia' managed to reach Limassol by 8.30 yesterday morning.

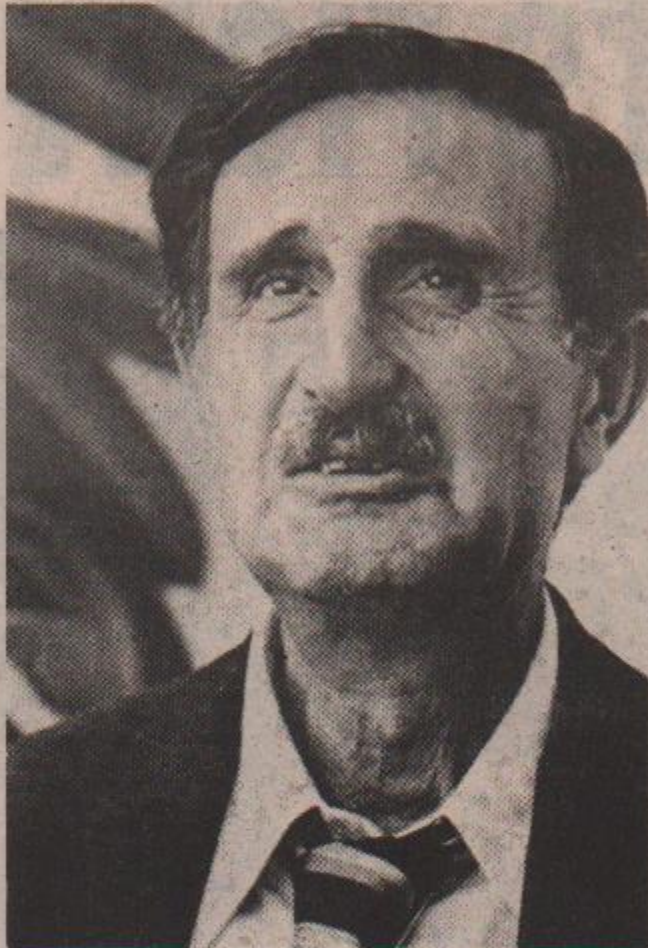
After being received there by the Egyptian ambassador, the Palestinian Liberation Organisation representative in Cyprus and the Cypriot Foreign Minister, Jumblatt later flew from Nicosia to Cairo for talks with Egyptian leaders.

Accompanying him on the mission is Dr Fathi Arafat, brother of Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat.

Left-wing

Arriving in Cairo yesterday, the Lebanese left-wing leader told newsmen, 'In southern Lebanon there is co-ordination between Syrian and Israeli actions.'

He said the United States and the Zionists had found the Syrian

regime a tool for their 'dirty conspiracy'.

Commenting on his talks with new Lebanese president Sarkis, and the latter's chances of settling the civil war, Jumblatt pointed out the head of state

was powerless.

'He has no state, no government, no police, no troops ... he is like Mahatma Ghandi'.

He said Sarkis would need more Arab troops to be able to move.

General Strike in Basque and Tenerife

BILBAO — Steel plants and shipyards here were halted yesterday as thousands of workers in the Basque country came out on strike.

They were commemorating the first anniversary of the execution of five guerrillas by the Franco regime and demanding an amnesty for political prisoners.

Closed

Many schools were closed for the day, and strike pickets called on shops and offices to tell them to close too.

Bakeries opened briefly in the morning to allow people to buy their daily bread, then pulled

down their shutters.

The provincial governor had denounced the strike organisers as 'subversives and terrorists', and riot police were reinforced to break up any demonstrations.

The Basque strike call aroused support among workers in other parts of Spain. There were hour-long stoppages at many plants in Madrid.

SANTA CRUZ de TENERIFE, Canary Islands — Spanish army jeeps patrolled areas of the holiday island of Tenerife yesterday, as workers staged a one-day general strike over police violence.

The strike was called because of the shooting of a local boy by

the Guardia Civil, who said they'd mistaken him for a wanted criminal.

There were clashes in the street at the weekend, after the boy died from his wounds on Saturday. Demonstrators threw up barricades of overturned cars and buses.

Army

Yesterday's strike closed all public services in Santa Cruz, except the hospitals. Staff at the island's dozens of hotels also backed the action.

The army sealed off working-class districts around the city to stop any demonstrations.

Fatah not part of hotel siege

BEIRUT — The three surviving guerrillas from the Damascus hotel siege were hanged at dawn yesterday, outside the Semiramis Hotel where Sunday's gun-battle took place.

The death sentences on the three were pinned to their bodies, which were left hanging in the street for several hours.

Damascus Radio said the sentences had been passed by the State Higher Security Court in a special late night session and confirmed by President Assad.

The three had been in a four-man group that held the hotel, and 90 hostages, until captured by Syrian troops, who stormed the hotel using machine guns and grenades. One of the guerrillas and four hotel guests were killed and 34 guests wounded.

Television

Brought before Damascus television cameras that night, and looking injured, the three — two Iraqis and a Jordanian — said they had come to bring the battle from Lebanon to Syria. They claimed to belong to a

group called 'Black June', which was part of Fatah. (It was in June that Syrian troops invaded Lebanon.)

The Syrian media dropped mention of Fatah in later reports.

The Palestine Liberation Organisation had denied having anything to do with the raid and a Fatah spokesman quoted on the Voice of Palestine radio yesterday said:

'Fatah has nothing to do at all with this deplored operation ... Fatah has always denounced such operations ...'

The spokesman promised a 'detailed statement later

explaining the role of certain Arab intelligence services in this operation'.

There is concern that the Syrian regime will try to use the incident as a pretext for further attacks on the Palestinians and the left in Lebanon.

Meanwhile, an official Fatah spokesman made the following statement:

'Damascus Radio has reported that those responsible for the Semiramis operation are affiliated to Fatah, and that the latter is behind this operation.'

'We affirm that Fatah has no connection whatsoever with this operation and that Fatah has always condemned acts of this kind. On this occasion, Fatah asks that the responsible authorities in Damascus confine themselves to the facts in anything published or broadcast about the Semiramis operation, until all inquiries are completed.'

Relations

'Fatah finally affirms that such contemptible operations aim at harming relations with the heroic Syrian people, regarding which Fatah is as concerned as it is for itself.'

Doubts over Slater fair trial—Goldsmith

SIR James Goldsmith, who took over as Slater Walker Securities chairman after Jim Slater quit, yesterday accused the Singapore authorities of misleading him when he was negotiating what he thought was a settlement of the controversial 'Spydar' affair.

He said he was 'very surprised' at the requests from Singapore for extradition of Mr Slater

and his colleagues.

He understood the decision to seek extradition had been made a week before he reached his 'settlement'.

'This was a most material fact which was not disclosed.' He said it would have been 'absurd' to have reached the settlement if he had known extradition was to be demanded.

Sir James also raised doubts over whether Slater would have a fair trial in Singapore.

On the subject of

whether Slater would be extradited, he commented: 'In Britain we have a system of justice that is based on judge and jury.'

'I cannot say how a man can get a fair trial without both, particularly when the atmosphere is emotional and political.'

'Unfortunately, Singapore has eliminated the jury system and having been there I can assure you that the atmosphere concerning Mr Slater is both highly emotional and political.'

GRANADA TV open 'Action' series last survey on unemployment

It was consciously designed as the opening day of the Labour Blackpool.

It asked the question: if unemployment has been highest for 30 years, why hasn't it been solved in the best sociological way? It interviewed 2,000 people and asked them to estimate the level of unemployment.

Not surprisingly they found out of work. Workers interviewed said that 50 per cent of the working population was in the impossibility of getting work.

Frank Lacey, an unemployed man from Skelmersdale, Liverpool, Scotland, who has no job but the answer was the same: 'I've accepted yet,' he said.

But the interviews were part of a series. The first was an interview in a social club where the names of workers were described by — no names, no distinguishing features.

The programme lacked an element of the neutrality of bogus sociology.

About as bogus as Ken Gillingham's movement had said from the beginning, unemployment, things might have been different.

Seamen stay on board to demand wages

MANCHESTER — Seamen occupying the 'Frendo Spirit' and the 'Frendo Star' in the port of Manchester are facing new hardships.

The ships were occupied soon after arrival in the port last week. The 'Star's' cargo has been removed but the hatches on the 'Spirit' have been battened down.

The Secretary of Manchester National Union of Seamen explained why they have occupied the ships.

'We had a vigilance on these

ships resulting from reports coming from all over Europe of the financial difficulties the company is alleged to be in.

'Previously the "Frendo Pride" slipped out of Manchester after paying off its crew without notifying the unions.'

It is claimed Frendo management owe wages to both officers and men. The total for both ships is estimated at about £30,000.

It is believed that profits from the ships have been hived off into its parent company, Ogfelds. Representatives from Frendo and former owners Weston are meeting to see if they can

make an offer to the men.

The seamen are absolutely determined to defend their rights. 'It's the job that's the thing', said Mick Flemming, bosun of the 'Star', 'and we're staying on until we get our money.'

The men so far have not been given any of the wages due to them and maintenance cheques to their families ashore are not being honoured.

On board the 'Spirit' Seaman Jim Brennan learnt last Friday that his bank has refused to cash three pay cheques sent to his wife. 'She's seeing the bank manager today to see what can be done,

otherwise we've nothing,' he said.

Another seaman Roger Studden said: 'We're going to sit tight here until we get our money and we won't touch the hatches.'

The men agreed that now is the time to open the books. 'They are always trying to blame the workers', Jim continued, 'but wages are nothing compared with the profits. Last time we got a wage rise the ship I was on, cut its crew from eleven to eight.'

'Seamen are always £20 to £30 behind other workers', added Archie McMurtry who has been a seaman for 30

years.

'When we went for our last rise the TUC called us pigs', said Roger.

The seamen are very anxious that they do not become isolated in a dispute which is allowed to drag on or peter out.

Messages of support should be sent to the crews on 'Frendo Spirit' and 'Frendo Star' at Number 5 shed, 8 Dock, Port of Manchester.

THE SMITH DEAL IS A FRAUD

THE Kissinger-Vorster-Callaghan formula for a Rhodesian 'settlement' is a complete fraud.

The working class and the oppressed peoples of the world must give complete, unconditional support to the African liberation movements in rejecting the deal and in fighting on.

Racist ruler Ian Smith accepted the Kissinger scheme because it involved him in losing little except 'face'. Naturally, he opted for that rather than lose his neck.

Bribed

White Rhodesia and its imperialist friends have given themselves two years in which to prepare the 'peaceful' transition to so-called 'majority rule'.

Two years in which, with massive US and British financial aid, they can seek suitable African 'Uncle Toms' to be bribed and corrupted with government posts and trained to administer the continued exploitation of the African masses.

The constitution and electoral system for the proposed new state is to be drawn up by an appointed Council of State, in which the whites — less than 5 per cent of the population — will have 50 per cent of the seats.

This will mean, in practice, Smith's ruling Rhodesia Front holding those seats.

The settler regime will meet with African leaders to set up this interim government, and 'the African side' will nominate African members for the Council of State.

But which African leaders, representing who, selected by who? Presumably it is left up to Smith, since the deal does not specify

A Council of Ministers with an African majority is to be set up. But, as ZANU leader the Rev. Sithole has observed, the white members of the Council of State will also take part in selecting the black ministers, so that 'most of the Africans in this body will therefore sing to the tune of their masters'.

The key posts of Defence Minister and Law and Order Minister are to be reserved for whites in the interim government.

Nothing is said about the withdrawal of South African troops, which are assisting the Smith regime in its war against the liberation movements, nor is the Rhodesian Army being disbanded.

In his speech announcing acceptance of the package, Smith warned his followers that 'terrorism' and the war against it were unlikely to end immediately. In other words, while picking suitable Africans as ministers, he will step up the war of repression against others.

It is true that Smith and his followers have had to climb down from their one-time arrogant boast that majority rule would not come 'for 1,000 years'.

This is due to the strength of the African revolution and the weakness of imperialism and not to any 'brilliant diplomacy' or 'pressure' from Kissinger

and Vorster. They have not suddenly become the friends of the colonial people as the capitalist media would have us believe.

As Tanzania's 'Sunday News' said last weekend:

Only after the war communique began to announce the death of Smith's soldiers were the captains of international capital shaken to a realisation of the impending African victory in Zimbabwe.

Seen from Pretoria, the Anglo-American scheme was, according to the 'Cape Times', essentially one 'to save Rhodesia for the West, and to check the Soviet-led penetration

of the sub-continent.

The uppermost consideration for US and British imperialism has been how to safeguard their massive investments in southern Africa against the threat of revolutionary action by the African working class.

The immediate purpose of Kissinger's diplomatic mission, backed by the Labour government, was threefold.

First, to attempt an abortion of the growing armed liberation struggle in Rhodesia, before it is too late. To seek a tame African puppet government which can look after imperialist investments. (Enter Joshua Nkomo.)

Secondly, to forestall

international action over Namibia, in support of the SWAPO guerrillas there.

The UN has been able to postpone an impending decision on sanctions against South Africa and an arms embargo, while Kissinger makes his behind-the-scenes deal.

Big American and British business interests are involved — not only private interests, like Rio Tinto Zinc, but also the Labour government.

Thirdly, the urgent necessity of separating the armed struggle in Zimbabwe (Rhodesia) and Namibia from the growing revolutionary situation in South Africa itself.

If Vorster had to warn Smith he could no longer guarantee

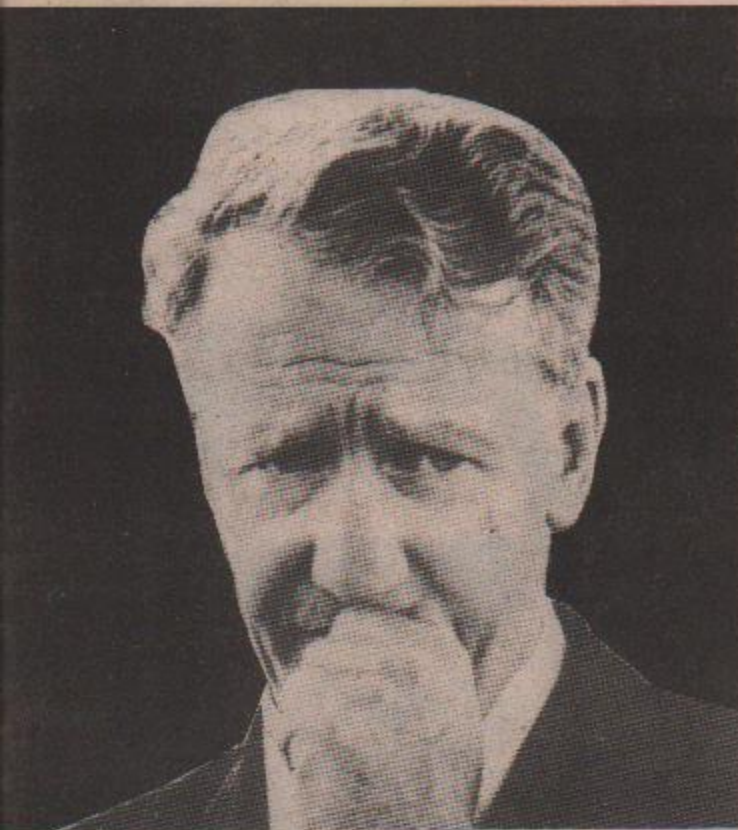

help, it was because the South African racists now need all their strength at home.

On the same night that Smith announced acceptance of the Kissinger-Vorster scheme, South African Minister of the Interior Connie Mulder

promised supporters that tougher action was going to be taken against opponents of the racist regime, and said the army would be used against the youth.

Overseas countries think that we cannot control our internal

affairs', Mulder told a National Party rally, 'and this is affecting our trade and investments.'

Up to 2,000 people, many of them young schoolchildren, have been shot dead by the racists' police force.

Since June more than 5,000 people have been arrested in secret police swoops. Mulder, who says Vorster should get a Nobel Peace Prize for the Rhodesia deal, told his supporters:

'At present the police have only used a soft hand in dealing with the riots.'

So after the 'peace deal', watch out for the massacres.

Compromise

The combination is not new. Both supporters and opponents of Kissinger's mission have compared it to his efforts in the Middle East.

After the US Rogers Plan followed the 'Black September' massacre in Jordan and later the CIA-backed butchery in Lebanon.

The Callaghan and Ford governments have pledged Smith to end 'sanctions' (which British and American companies were busting anyway!) and this week will discuss giving \$2 billion in aid to the interim government.

This is cash for the racists and nothing else.

It will go to the dregs of British society who have ended up in Rhodesia with no other reason than to suppress the African workers and exploit them.

Butchery

In times gone by the transition to 'independence' has been achieved with relative tranquility — a few bribes, some guns and a royal ceremony with one flag going up and the Union Jack fluttering down.

Such a compromise isn't possible today.

What has interfered with the imperialists' plan is the outbreak of the African revolution, signalled by the developments in Mozambique and Angola.

They know it won't be forthcoming from Vorster, Kissinger and Callaghan.

Their main danger now is the actions of their 'friends' Kenneth Kaunda of Zambia and Julius Nyerere of Tanzania.

As a ZPA spokesman in London told News Line:

'The Palestinians thought that their best friend in the Arab world was President Assad. It has turned out differently.'

FILM REVIEW

Too many unanswered questions in Mattei affair

THE powerful and controversial head of a national energy corporation disappears in a mysterious plane crash.

The reporter investigating the last few days of his life disappears.

As evidence of intrigue and conspiracy begins to mount, the state prosecutor resists all demands for an inquiry.

This is not the plot of some mystery thriller, but is the fabric of a point-blank film investigation made by one of Italy's most accomplished film directors, Francesco Rosi.

Intrigues

The film, appearing at the Gate Cinema, Notting Hill Gate, London, is called the 'Mattei Affair'.

It investigates the political intrigues that eventually culminated in the death of Italy's National Energy Corporation President, Enrico Mattei in 1961.

It is a challenging and superbly-made film that traces Mattei's rise to power after World War II, and draws together all the evidence of sabotage and conspiracy that still surrounds the case.

Who were the unknown men who suddenly started work at the Sicilian airport from which Mattei took off?

Who were the two mechanics and a police officer who visited the plane shortly before Mattei's arrival at the airport?

Planted

Why was a French Secret Service agent planted at the airport during Mattei's visit to Sicily?

Who was the alleged French agent who worked close to Mattei and reported on his movements?

Why were all security and police removed from the airport by the authorities on the day of Mattei's departure?

Why did the crash investigation deliberately ignore evidence of an in-flight explosion?

What are the connections between the case and the known activities of the Mafia and CIA in Italy?

All of these questions remain unanswered by the film. As one reporter says: 'Every turn we take, there is something blocking us.'

But the film does give us a great deal of insight into the

dangerous battle Mattei waged against the American oil monopolies and the bitter enemies he created, internationally and at home.

His policy of replacing Italy's colonial heritage with a policy of economic co-operation with the 'third world' certainly didn't win him many friends.

Collaboration with Algeria, Tunisia and other Arab states on oil development, with no strings attached, won him the undying hatred of the American corporations.

From the discovery of methane gas just after the war, to international refineries and off-shore exploration platforms, this was Mattei's success story.

But behind the scenes, there was a constant political conspiracy and cover up.

Mattei himself is portrayed brilliantly by Gian Maria Volonte as an enlightened bourgeois nationalist, an ex-partisan who is determined to see Italy independent of multi-national monopolies.

In his words: 'I'll fight to break this absurd monopoly and if I don't make it, the people with oil under their feet will.'

As the charred remains of Mattei are taken from the mangled wreckage of his executive jet, these words are repeated by Rosi, an epitaph and a prophecy that makes a fitting end to an important film.

It'll have to be the young people, it's their future

There's a few reasons for joining the Party. The Labour government — they're not doing anything, not helping the old age pensioners or anything like that. If we don't help ourselves, we won't get anything. All the 'toffs' get all the money — we get nothing.

Look at all the promises Labour made. They were going to find more jobs — where are the jobs? What about all these school-leavers? They can't get anything.

They're just cutting down the working class's money through the pay laws. A week later, they all got a pay rise. If they can have one, they could give my husband a pay rise.

We had to wait five months to get this flat. When we got married we had to live apart for 15 months.

The council offered us a place in a big house — you had to go

Esther McCarthy is a 19-year old south London housewife. Her husband works in the building trade. They have a baby son. The estate where the McCarthys live, in Vauxhall, is just across the river from the Houses of Parliament. Local people feel it's two different worlds. Esther says she supported Labour at the last elections, but would never do so again. She and her husband were introduced to the Workers Revolutionary Party when they were sold a News Line in the shopping precinct.

up six flights of stairs to get to it, another flight of stairs to the living room and kitchen.

It was in a right state, as well. All the light switches were out of their sockets.

A lot of people are going through these sort of experiences. I met people with four or five kids, having to live in bed-and-breakfast places. The council just says, 'We'll let

you know'.

I blame the government. If they cut down council spending, how can the council build places?

My younger sister left school with all her 'O'-levels. She had to wait six months for a job. She says if they come round at election time, she'll give them the boot! People are getting sick of this government.

They're not holding down prices. I went out this evening, and spent £8 on shopping which a year ago would have cost me £4. It cost me £20 last year for the little boy's birthday — the same things this year would cost £45.

A small tin of corned beef was 40p last year, now it's 54p.

Look how much profit they must be making. My mother makes her own bread, and it works out at 10p a loaf. Yet if I buy a loaf in the shop it costs 19p.

I don't know how the old age pensioners manage. Surely the government can afford to give the pensioners a few quid more? If I was in the government they're the people I'd help. It's them that built these flats. That made the cars. Everything. What do they get?

We need a great big take-over. But they've probably got something waiting in the background ready for us — a secret army, or something.

big names, they're going bankrupt, but they can still slip a few thousand to someone in backhanders so they get helped.

It makes me wild to think they're spending our money on their things. Take Concorde. I don't think I'll ever travel in it — the MPs will.

The seamen were right — they should have just gone on strike.

I reckon something will happen in the next six months. It might be the miners, or the electricity workers; it could even be the seamen again. They've been waiting since June for a pay rise, they haven't seen it yet...

There will be a crisis. I can see it coming. Inflation is going up so much that people are not going to put up with it. People are going to speak out. Everywhere any of the MPs go. You can see it already. They'll say 'How come you can afford a Rolls Royce, when we're getting nothing?'

I don't think it'll be too long before the government starts cracking up, anyway. But I wouldn't like to see Margaret Thatcher getting in.

This generation can see more than the last generation. My mother gets up 4 o'clock in the morning to go out doing a cleaning job for £23 a week. I

wouldn't do it for that money. I'd like those on top to have to come down to us — to do all the jobs that we have to do.

If you don't fight for yourself, you might as well just lie down and let them walk over you. That's what we have got to do — we've got to go out and fight for what we want!

Troops

The government is going to have its troops, all prepared and waiting. They'll use the army, if the army will co-operate. Their generals will tell the officers, the officers will tell the soldiers; but if the soldiers do go against the working class, it's against their own people, their own mothers and fathers.

There's more working-class people than there is of the upper class.

You've got to fight. I was taught to believe in 'an eye for an eye'. If someone pokes me — I poke back. It's the same with the government. You've got to fight them.

It'll have to be the young people, because it's their future. It's their future and their children's future.

Leaders

Some people will fight for their rights. Others won't. We do need leaders. But not the type of leaders that are in the government now.

You have to build up your own force. We have to go in there. We have to work fast. As time goes by, you've got to move. You've got to make the right move — like in chess — it has to be checkmate!

I wrote a letter once, about the old age pensioners, and about the cuts. I said I was disgusted that they should cut our National Health Service while my husband pays more for his stamp. I never got a reply. They probably just tear letters like that up. It's always us who give, them that take. We want to do the taking for a change!

The health service is being cut, and the doctors are low paid. So you have to wait two or three hours before you get seen. When I had pneumonia I waited for hours at St Thomas' hospital. When they saw me, they didn't have any beds. So they just sent me home again.

When the service is cut, or there's a shortage of doctors, we lose out — not them. They go down to Harley Street.

MUHAMMAD ALI was clowning when he forecast that Ken Norton could defeat him in their world heavyweight title clash at the Yankee Stadium in New York tonight.

Even Norton was taken in. But behind his bragging, Ali is justifiably concerned that his 55th professional fight will be no pushover and knows that this one is for real.

The 34-year-old Ali is a far cry from the Louisville Lip of 1964 in style. 'Float like a butterfly, sting like a bee' is no longer the method.

His amazing footwork and jabbing are still there, but the speed has gone. In its place there is a new Ali, a man with a solid punch, as Joe Frazier and Richard Dunn found out to their cost.

Psychologically, the advantage is still with Norton, however. He did break Ali's jaw and fought out a disputed points decision in the second fight. Tonight the title is at stake and Norton has nothing to lose — but nor have many of Ali's opponents and they have all fallen.

NO PUSHOVER

Showdown

The title showdown will be the first major heavyweight bout staged outdoors in New York since Floyd Patterson stopped Sweden's Ingemar Johansson to regain the championship in 1960.

And the last one in the Yankee Stadium was in 1959, when Johansson demolished Patterson to take the title.

Outdoor fights went out of style when closed-circuit television became the main

producer of boxing revenue. Promoters were satisfied with smaller crowds in indoor arenas where inclement weather posed no threat of postponement.

So Ali comes back to one of the homes of boxing for perhaps the last fight of his career. It will provide a dramatic backdrop to Ali's equally dramatic history which has made him the favourite of millions round the world.

The 64,000-capacity Yankee Stadium is unlikely to be full, hardly surprising with some seats selling at \$200, but record gate receipts of over \$3m are expected and every country with television will show the fight.

A year ago Ali stopped Frazier in Manila in one of the most brutal and fiercely-fought bouts in boxing history. This one could be just as hard.

Ali is a man of surprises, however. All the world would like to see him come out on top and then quit. His demise at the hands of Norton would deprive us of one of the great characters of modern times.

Ali is at the top, but the road has stopped climbing. If he is to be remembered as the greatest heavyweight of all time, then Ali has to quit before someone beats him.

Ross picks Scotland



Trevor Ross chooses Scotland and not England

TREVOR ROSS, Arsenal's 19-year-old midfielder player, has opted to try and make his international career with Scotland and not England. Manchester-born Ross has dual qualification because his parents are Scottish. He is included in Scotland's squad for their under-21 international against Czechoslovakia next month. He thought long and hard about the decision but finally decided his future lay north of the border and not with Don Revie.

DON REVIE'S search for goals in the World Cup qualifier against Finland in two weeks has taken him back to Dennis Tueart, who has scored five for Manchester City this season.

But there is still no room for Stan Bowles, who showed once again on Saturday that on his day he is too good for the best defence.

Revie says he has already decided on '85 or 90 per cent' of his World Cup squad, and this is shown in his squad of 24.

Only Tueart is added to the squad from which the side that drew with the Republic of Ireland earlier this month was chosen.

Charlie George is retained, and is likely to be in the final 11. But in view of Revie's remarks yesterday, Gordon Hill of Manchester United and Ray Wilkins of Chelsea are likely to be on the side lines, despite the flair they have shown for their clubs this season.

Delighted

Tueart, who has played for England twice, was delighted with his recall. He didn't make a great impression on either occasion, but has been in sparkling form for his club.

The arrival of Brian Kidd at Maine Road has allowed him to play wider and to move from one side of the pitch to another. 'I feel it has given me more chance for the goals. I've certainly been knocking them in lately and I suppose this is what has caught Don Revie's eye,' said Tueart.

Revie was equally enthusiastic in explaining Tueart's inclusion. 'Tueart is playing really well at the moment,' he said. 'He is bubbling with confidence and getting goals. He is so eager that he threatens a goal whenever he is near the area.'

Revie also made clear that he plans to give George another chance. George was substituted in the Ireland match, his first international.

'He didn't do well against Ireland, but it would be unfair to cast him aside after just one chance. I know he can do better and so does he,' said Revie.

The squad are confident about the Finland match on October 13. They know that they can improve on the 4-1 beating they gave them in Helsinki, though the Finns are no pushover.

But they are well aware that their big rivals are Italy, and apart from preparing for the

matches against them, the more goals they can score against Finland and Luxembourg the better their chances of qualifying for Argentina if the verdict in the group comes down to goal difference.

Italy have run into form even though their season hasn't opened yet. On Saturday night they fired a warning shot across Revie's bows by slamming European Nations Cup finalists Yugoslavia 3-0 in Rome.

The squad will be together for a week before the Finland match. Under a new agreement

with the Football League and the clubs, all the fixtures on October 9 which involve internationals from England, Scotland and Northern Ireland — who all have World Cup matches the following week — will be rearranged.

The only First Division matches likely to be played on the 9th are Middlesbrough v Norwich and Newcastle v West Bromwich. Second Division games likely to be off include Fulham v Carlisle, Bristol Rovers v Chelsea, and Wolves v Southampton.

CRYSTAL PALACE striker David Kemp was put on the transfer list yesterday at his own request. The club granted his request after manager Terry Venables told Kemp he could not guarantee him a first-team place.

LOTUS have put back the launching date of their new Formula One car so that rival Grand Prix teams cannot copy radical changes in design in time for the start of next year's world championship.

The new Lotus 78 was ready to make its debut in the Italian Grand Prix at Monza on September 12, but after successful secret testing by No. 1 driver Mario Andretti, the Norfolk-based team decided not to announce the car until December 20, only weeks before the Argentine GP which starts the 1977 season.

A company official said that fundamental improvements in weight distribution and modifications to the frontal area makes the car too easy to copy. That is why it will not be competitively tested over the remaining three rounds of this year's championship.

Other teams, he added, will not now be able to use the winter months to use Lotus ideas for their own benefit. Andretti has turned down lucrative offers from other teams in order to drive the new car. 'I am ready to sacrifice cash in order to stay with Lotus next year,' he said.

CRUSADERS ARE SO CONFIDENT

CRUSADERS, champions of Northern Ireland, think they can cause a major upset this afternoon by putting Liverpool out of the European Cup in Belfast.

They surprised everyone at Anfield two weeks ago with a spirited defence and only went down 2-0. Crusaders hope they can surprise the League champions at home.

No one is more confident than chairman Derek Wade, a shipyard worker. He says: 'We aim to beat Liverpool at their own game — attacking football.'

'We honestly believe we can pull back the deficit. This is the best team Crusaders have ever had and if we can score early on there is no telling what might happen.'

Liverpool's squad of 16 includes England defender Phil Thompson, absent for three weeks with a leg injury. Manager Bob Paisley confirmed he is fit enough to play today.

But striker John Toshack is still troubled by a calf strain and misses the trip while Crusaders field the side which saw them through the first leg.

Crusaders spent £15,000 on their pitch during the summer and that is one of the reasons the club refused to switch the tie to Windsor Park.

Wade says: 'Our ground holds only 12,000 and although there will be several thousand fans disappointed at not having a ticket, we decided not to change the venue.'

Manchester United are likely to be without two key players for tomorrow's return UEFA Cup

clash with Ajax at Old Trafford. Stuart Pearson (pulled hamstring) and Steve Coppell (calf strain) are both doubtful.

Manchester City take a party of 16 players to Turin this morning for their UEFA cup second leg tie with Juventus. But after naming the squad, Saturday's 12 plus Keith MacRae, Gary Owen, Ken Clements, and Mike Lester, manager Tony Book said:

'We are very optimistic about the outcome of the game. Although a 1-0 lead is not as much as we would have liked to take to Italy, a goal start is still in our favour.'

'Our defence is as good as anything in football and I wouldn't fancy any team in the world giving us a 1-0 start.'

Scottish giants Celtic and Rangers both face elimination at the first hurdle. Scottish champions Rangers, held 1-1 at Ibrox, include fit-again midfielder man Alex MacDonald away to F.C. Zurich.

Celtic expect to be strengthened by the return of Icelandic international Johannes Edvaldsson, against Wisla Krakow, in Poland. The clubs drew 2-2 in the first meeting.

PETER LORIMER, Leeds United's Scottish International, is to have talks about his future with manager Jimmy Armfield, later this week.

Lorimer, transfer-listed at

present, said that he wanted to discuss his long-term future including a testimonial. 'I'm not coming off the list purely as a short-term measure to give the manager time to find some new players,' he said yesterday
