

Forward to the FARMERS NATIONAL RELIEF CONFERENCE

NATIONAL ORGANIZATION FORMED

State and National Committees are being formed to arrange for delegations to the Washington conference on December 7. The National Call committee to date consists of: Harry Lux, Lincoln, Nebr.; A. O. Rosenberg, Newman Grove, Nebr.; Lew Bentzley, Perkasia, Pa.; and H. Springer, Vineland, N. J. These men are also serving as conference organizers in their respective states.

The National Call Committee will be enlarged and more state organizers appointed, as the movement spreads to other states. Wherever possible, local Conference secretaries will be elected or appointed.

Delegates, each representing 25 or more, are to be elected by farmers' meetings. They must be farmers whose income is primarily derived from farming. Farmers who wish to be at the Conference, and are not elected as delegates, may come as fraternal delegates. It is estimated that expenses for the trip will be \$10 per delegate. The executive secretary of the conference, Lem Harris, requests that all news and inquiries about the conference be sent him, Box 3584, Georgetown Sta., Washington, D. C.

The Massachusetts Farmers League with headquarters in Worcester county has endorsed the Farmers National Relief Conference to be held in Washington on December 7. Steps are being taken to organize a Massachusetts delegation.

William M. Hobby of Templeton, member of the executive committee of the Massachusetts Farmers League, has agreed to serve on the National Conference Call Committee.

Richlandtown, Pa., Sept. 19.—The Executive Committee of the Pennsylvania Farmers Protective Association, representing locals in ten different townships unanimously endorsed the call to the Farmers National Relief Conference. The Conference call will be brought before the membership at local meetings.

Vineland, N. J.—The executive committee of the New Jersey farmers Protective Association endorses the Farmers Conference at Washington.

FHA LEADERS IN WILLISTON, N.D. BREAK STRIKE

Discourage Mass Picketing; Refuse to Call Meeting on Organization

ATTACK MILITANT

Communist Farmers Lead In Picketing Highways Near Williston

(BY LEIF DAHL)

Williston, N. D., Oct. 1.—As soon as the strike was officially declared in North Dakota on Sept. 21 several men approached Joe Wegley, chairman of the Williams County Holiday Association and asked him to call a meeting to determine the will of Williams county farmers regarding picketing.

Mr. Wegley twice refused to call such a meeting saying there would be a joint meeting of McKenzie and Williams county farmers whenever Burdick, the state chairman, could come here.

In the meantime between 4,000 and 5,000 bushels of wheat were coming into Williston alone each day, livestock and potatoes were being shipped in large quantities. Also, the feeding yards of the Great Northern here were full (about 2000 head) of livestock 3 or 4 times a week. This was common knowledge to many farmers, despite the declaration of grain dealers that the strike was effective.

250-300 ATTEND MEETING

After a canvass of farm opinion which clearly showed that the majority were in favor of picketing a rank and file meeting was called by five farmers. Between 250 and 300 farmers attended this meeting.

Officers of the Holiday Association tried to monopolize the meeting and did for the first hour with recommendations that picketing wasn't necessary, that force and violence never accomplished anything, that the widespread "moral support" behind this strike would prove effective in the end, etc.

However, the farmers got the floor after awhile and after considerable discussion it was voted to picket with only two dissenting votes. Unfortunately, at this point, the chairman allowed the meeting to break up without making plans for the picketing.

FARMERS LEARN WHO MISLEADERS AMONG THEM ARE

Sioux City, Iowa, Sept. 28.—Through the combined efforts of Milo Reno, Wallace Short, Republican candidate for Congress, in whom the farmers have confidence, the press, the radio, local businessmen and commission men the strike in around Sioux City has been halted.

The farmers, especially the impoverished farmers are very much dissatisfied with the course the strike has taken and many are now clear on who the misleaders are.

Others are not able to understand how or why, but they are sure that they were sold out. Picketing has started up and may develop into a real struggle again soon.

BANKERS DRIVE TO 'AID' FARMER

Hoover Bankers' Committee Refuses to Consider Moratorium

Representatives of the banks, insurance companies, joint stock land banks, and of the Hoover administration, meeting in Chicago, on Sept. 30 have stated that no moratorium on debts of the impoverished farmers can be "seriously considered." This is the conclusion of the meeting which was called by Hoover to meet the foreclosure problem facing the farm masses.

EMPTY PHRASE

Instead of giving the farmers any real relief the conference of forty bankers and government officials issued a statement of empty phrases. They "pledged" that the "whole power of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation is to be thrown back of the agencies who lend money and receive farm mortgages." The federal government is to put its strength behind the bankers and not behind the farmers.

MORE POPPYCOCK

These robbers promised to help the farmers who "make an honest effort to make payments" but cannot do so.

Paul Bestor, of the Federal Farm Loan Board, said that the Land Banks only evict farmers when the banks "feel compelled to act in self protection."

Representatives of the insurance companies and joint stock land banks said that their outfits don't wish to acquire farm lands. They said nothing however about granting the farmers the right to stay on the land. They said nothing about the thousands of farmers they have already chased off of their farms to protect the rich capitalists.

DEMOCRATS READY TO SUPPORT MINN. FARMER-LABORITES

That there is no difference in the Farmer-Labor party in Minnesota and the Democratic party was admitted in a letter to L. J. Flesher, chairman of the Volunteer Democratic State Central committee, to Farmer-Labor committees thruout the state. Flesher proposed that the Farmer-Laborites support Roosevelt, Garner and three Democratic candidates for Congress, in return for which the "progressive" Democrats would support the rest of the Farmer-Labor ticket.

ROOSEVELT STATE ADMINISTRATION IN NEW FARM FAKERY

In order to stem the rising will to struggle of the dairy farmers the Roosevelt administration in New York state has established a "consumers information service" in the Department of Agriculture and Markets. The excuse for the "service" is to advertise milk and to tell the working class how to use it most economically.

MONT. FARMERS UNITE TO SAVE CROP AND FARM

Mass Meeting In Plentywood Decides to Demand Cash at Elevators

WILLING TO FIGHT

Farmers Call Meeting for October 8 to Elect Local Committees

Between 400 and 450 farmers of Sheridan county gathered in the Farmer-Labor Temple at Plentywood last Saturday, October 1, in answer to a strike call issued by Emil Moe of Archer and four other farmers of the county.

Emil Moe opened the meeting and he was unanimously chosen chairman with Nels Sunsted as secretary. Mr. Moe explained that the sponsors of the meeting had no program to offer except that of saving their homes and trying to make a living out of the farms, which is now well nigh impossible. He called for speakers from the floor to give their ideas as to what the farmers should do in this unbearable situation and called on all farmers, whether Republicans, Democrats, Communists or Liberty party members, to unite in this issue.

FEDERAL BANK ROBBERS

The first speaker, K. O. Brendahl, showed that the Federal Land Bank was trying to take over the homes of the farmers in order to sell them to other farmers at ridiculously high prices. He said: "We must be ready with pitch forks to defend our homes."

Art Wankel, a member of the Communist party and well known as a staunch fighter thruout the county called on the rank and file of all parties to unite on the issue that stare all the farmers in the county in the face. He said that even if we got \$1 a bushel for our wheat we couldn't pay all that we owe. He advocated a plan that found favor in his home community, Raymond, whereby a marketing day should be held at stated intervals thruout the county when wheat should be sold, and only then, and the farmers should be organized to demand cash for the wheat. Applause greeted this idea.

Anton Jorgensen, a member of the Liberty party, said that farmers had signed on the dotted line for the bankers, had signed on the dotted line for the machine companies and now the govern-

Farmers Eager to Know About UFL Which Forces Board to Oil Road

San Jose, Calif., Sept. 24.—The farmers of the San Jose section and of Santa Clara county, who have been robbed over and over again are now making inquiries about the United Farmers League. They are really beginning to organize in a serious manner.

The hot dust from the road was spoiling the berry crop of a farmer here. He asked Supervisor Cooley to have the road oiled. Cooley refused.

A group of farmers in the United Farmers League and the UFL organizer went to the Board of Supervisors where they demanded that the road be oiled.

The road was oiled the next day so the farmers are asking and learning why. They are learning about the UFL and its program. So, I will say the outlook for the UFL is bright.

PEASANTS IN POLAND FIGHT LAND ROBBERY

Fighting Between Peasants and Police

Warsaw, Sept. 14.—The Lodz newspaper "Glos Poganny" reports that bloody collisions have taken place between the police and desperate peasants near the village of Naremnice in the Lodz district. The collisions occurred as government surveyors arrived to distribute land according to government plans which favor the rich peasants at the expense of the poor. The peasants prevented the surveyors from carrying out their work, whereupon a large force of police arrived and fierce collisions occurred. Bayonets, revolvers and tear gas bombs were used against the peasants.

ORGANIZATION OF FARMERS FOR STRUGGLE CONTINUES; MUST RAISE NEW DEMANDS

Dakota Farmers In Fight on Evictions

Frederick, South Dakota, Sept. 26.—A meeting of 100 farmers was held at Savo hall, Sunday night, Sept. 25, to discuss the threatened eviction and forced sale of grain on Oscar A. Kotilla's farm. Kotilla is an ex-serviceman. He served nine months in France, has a wife and one small son.

The company gave him nine days notice of eviction and also told him to get his grain ready for hauling.

Kotilla has refused and the meeting last night backed him up in his refusal and pledged itself to fight the forced sale and to rouse all the farmers in the country for this fight. The following resolution was passed:

"Whereas, farm debts, rents, taxes and mortgages were contracted when prices were high and the farmer cannot pay any of these until debts and prices get back to the same level, and the farmers' cash income is now too small to give a decent living for his family:

Whereas, Oscar A. Kotilla, an honest and deserving farmer, an ex-serviceman, finds himself in the same position as many other farmers—willing to pay his debts but unable to do so at the present prices for farm produce; and

"Whereas, the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company is attempting a forced collection of rent through the seizure of the grain on Oscar A. Kotilla's farm, even though the price for grain will not meet the total indebtedness;

"Therefore, be it resolved, that we, farmers at Savo hall, Brown county (South Dakota), on Sept. 25, protest against this proposed forced collection and demand that Oscar A. Kotilla have the right to hold his grain until prices afford him a decent living; and

Be it resolved, that we declare our readiness to support this resolution by united action if necessary; and

"Be it further resolved: That copies of this resolution be sent to the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance company and to the press.

The meeting was called by the UFL to which all farmers, members of farm organizations or not, were invited.

N. Y. MILK PRICE INCREASE WON

Threat of Strike Forces Milk Trust to Grant Raise

Threatened with a milk strike of upstate New York dairymen, the United Milk Products company agreed to try to urge its distributors to pay \$2.36 per 40-quart can of milk. This price had already been granted farmers by the Dairymen's League Cooperative, and by Borden Company, and other New York distributors on Sept. 20. The agreement of the leaders of the Dairymen's League with large-scale distributors came as a direct result of the strike talk by rank and file farmers at a stormy League convention earlier in the month.

FARM BUREAU IS TO BE VOTED ON IN IOWA COUNTY

Due to the mass pressure of the farmers, the county commissioners of Thurston county have decided to put the question of the farm bureau to a vote in the November elections. Petitions have been circulated by the farmers against the county agent, and others by businessmen for him. The county commissioners met in a special session on Friday, Sept. 30 to decide the question. All day masses of farmers crowded the streets of Pender, Iowa, the county seat, arguing the question. The bureau has cost the county \$3,200 annually.

ed by an "Emergency Committee of the New York Milk Shed," organized last spring to secure higher prices. The committee is composed of large-scale farmers and works in cooperation with the Dairymen's League. The committee did not secure higher prices until after the threat of a strike, yet the committeemen are opposed to any strike action. George N. Allen, secretary of the committee, declares, "I am not in sympathy with the methods that western farmers have been using, but I don't know how long we can keep farmers in line if dealers continue to cut prices." Mr. Allen owns a dairy of 90 cows in Washington county.

The committee has cooperated with large-scale dealers in trying to force independent concerns to raise consumers prices. The reason given is that the competition of small-scale dealers prevents the big companies from giving the farmers higher prices. On the other hand the New York Consumers' League charges that the committee represents, not the farmers, but the big companies.

CO-OP. TRAITORS

Twin City Milk Producers Association Meets With Milk Trust Agents

Ever larger numbers of farmers are organizing for struggle according to reports from the middle and northwest. The Farmers' Holiday Association leaders are using all their power in order to confine the struggle to a "peaceful" waiting at home for higher prices.

The rank and file farmers, however, are learning that it is mass struggle that is needed, not only for higher prices, but for action against evictions and foreclosures. The struggle that the FHA leaders are trying to stifle must be broadened to include an attack on the entire front of exploitation of the farmers.

More than 500 farmers met at the Clay county courthouse in Spencer, Iowa to organize against evictions and against collecting penalties on delinquent taxes. A unit of the "United Farmers" was formed.

GEORGIA FARMERS MILITANT

The farmers of Georgia demonstrated their rejection of the injunction granted to the milk distributors by the federal courts by dumping several loads of milk at Conyers, Georgia, on Monday, September 27. L. K. Starr, publicity director for the milk trust asked the United States Marshal at Macon to issue warrants for picketing farmers of Rockdale county.

PICKET IN MINN.

A group of Wright county farmers organized on Friday morning, September 30, to picket lines on the highway east of Montrose, 30 miles from Minneapolis. The picketing followed a mass meeting held Thursday night at Woodland at which more than 100 farmers were present. The farmers were picketing "peacefully," but had prepared a nail studded belt in case any of the truckers did not listen to persuasive language.

In order to prevent the dairy farmers around the Twin Cities from striking for higher prices the Farmers Holiday leaders, cooperative heads, and milk distributors have been holding meetings in Minneapolis. The meetings have been held supposedly for the purpose of getting a higher price for the farmers but actually for the purpose of keeping the farmers inactive.

HOLD CLOSED MEETING

On Wednesday, September 28, a closed meeting of these groups was held in the auditorium of the Franklin Co-operative Creamery association in Minneapolis. At this meeting a "conference" committee "representing all branches of the business" was organized. This committee includes six representatives of the holiday association, 5 from the distributors, three from the unions, and the executive committee of the Twin City Milk Producers Association.

On Friday this conference committee met again at the offices of the Twin City Milk Association in St. Paul. After an all-morning meeting the committee adjourned to meet again on October 7. In this way the milk trust hopes that it can keep the farmers passive with the help of the cooperative and holiday misleaders.

600 OUT

Six hundred farmers are reported to have organized for the farmers strike in Rice county, in southern Minnesota. The leaders of the movement are trying to keep the movement one of persuasion in order to prevent picketing.

In Big Stone county about 90 per cent of the farmers are reported enrolled behind the strike, and five stock associations at Or-

ROOSEVELT ADVISES "PATIENCE"

On September 29 Governor Roosevelt spoke at the Sioux City, the center of the most militant strike in the American farm masses have put up in many a year. The selection of this city is characteristic of the entire program of the Democratic candidate of Wall Street as far as the farm masses are concerned.

In reporting Roosevelt's meeting the Sioux City Tribune said:

"His selection of Sioux City—scene of the opening battle in the agrarian revolt now sweeping across the country—is considered by political observers as a definite indication of the importance which may be attached to his talk here."

HIS SELECTION OF SIOUX CITY IS AN INDICATION OF THE IMPORTANCE WHICH THE CAPITALIST CLASS PLACES ON THE STRUGGLE WHICH WAS INAUGURATED BY THE IOWA FARMERS AROUND THE CITY.

For that reason they have sent in this, their "forgotten man," candidate to mislead the impoverished farmers away from the militant struggle that has been started and in support of the second major party of Wall Street.

The Sioux City Tribune which, during the struggle of the farmers around Sioux City tried to break the militant struggle while preaching that it was the farmers' friend, says that "Roosevelt is the symbol of a new hope."

For that reason he was sent into the strike area—to renew the faith of the farmers in capitalist politicians and in capitalist democracy.

"The meeting of the farm problem is going to be successful only if two factors are present.

"The first is a sympathetic administration in Washington and the second the hearty support and patient cooperation of agriculture itself and its leaders.

A "sympathetic administration" is only a hypocritical way of saying a capitalist administration instead of an administration of worker and farmer candidates. During all the years of the agrarian crisis the farmers have had "sympathy" not only from capitalist politicians of all parties, but from the insurance companies, banks, land banks and joint stock and federal land banks.

The present terrible condition of the farm masses is a result of the robbery and oppression which has been accompanied by "sympathy."

But a different spirit is spreading among the farm masses, a spirit of militant struggle against evictions, foreclosures, for higher prices, and for relief.

Roosevelt spoke in the center from which that struggle has spread. AND SO HE SPOKE AGAINST THE STRUGGLE.

He asked for the "hearty support and the patient cooperation of agriculture and its leaders."

The "hearty support of agriculture" means support of the capitalist parties, the parties of the bankers and of the rich by the impoverished farm masses.

"Patient co-operation" means that the farmers should not struggle but should wait on the empty promises of Roosevelt and his kind.

He and Wall Street have the "patient cooperation" of the farm "leaders." As long as the crisis has lasted the farm leaders have shown their more than "patient cooperation." They have been the willing handmaidens of Wall Street. They have preached debenture plan, equalization fee, and other "relief" schemes to the farmers, urging them to be "patient" to support the "progressive farm bloc."

Roosevelt's speeches have been designed to keep the farmers "patient." "The two great purposes of my farm policy," said Roosevelt, are "to seek relief for him (the farmer) from the burden of his expense account" and "to try to restore the purchasing power of his dollar by getting for him higher prices for the products of the soil."

Under the first "great purpose" Roosevelt had nothing to mention but taxes. Not a word about lower rail rates, not a word about reducing the burden of interest and mortgage payments. About these things Roosevelt had nothing to say.

On the question of taxes he offered the impoverished farmers absolutely no relief from the mill-stone weight that crushes them. His second "great purpose" consists only in "eliminating useless officeholders" reducing "taxing districts," "reorganization of local govern-

ment for the purpose of eliminating unnecessary machinery and unnecessary positions, and for the purpose of consolidating functions, and concentrating responsibility in fewer hands," etc, etc.

This "great purpose" is nothing but a rehashing of all the empty phrases that taxpayers leagues, politicians of all capitalist parties have been shouting. Not one word of real relief for the impoverished farmers.

His other "great purpose" "the increase in the purchasing power of the farm dollar," is nothing but the reduction of the tariff "thru the agency of the tariff commission." He tried to cover up the Democratic stand in practice, for high tariffs, with blatant attacks on the Republican administration.

The Sioux City speech showed, as the Topeka one, that the Democratic candidate is definitely trying to prevent militant action on the part of the farmers by misleading them with empty phrases. In neither speech did he touch on the immediate issues of higher prices, evictions, or foreclosures, around which the farmers are organizing for struggle.

While the Democratic party, like the other capitalist parties tries to mislead the farmers with empty phrases the Communist party urges the farmers to organize for struggle for their immediate demands.

The Communist Party demand of "Emergency relief for the impoverished farmers without restrictions by the government or banks; tax exemption for the impoverished farmers, and no forced collection of rents or debts," is the only plank in the program of any political party which answers the immediate problems facing the farmers.

For that reason the United Farmers League urges on the impoverished farmers to cut loose from any and all capitalist parties and to VOTE COMMUNIST for the candidates of the only party representing the interests of the farmers as of the entire working class.

Conville and Clinton have agreed not to ship or buy farm products. Picketing began in Yellow Medicine county, Minnesota, was started on Monday, September 26. The four chief highways leading into Canby were picketed by 140 farmers on Monday. By Wednesday this had increased to 250 farmers who had established day and night pickets. Only non-perishable products were being held up. Boards with spikes and woven wire were being used by the farmers in order to stop trucks from going thru.

PICKETS ARE PEACEFUL

The attitude of the pickets is characterized by the words of one of them who said:

"We are doing this business peacefully, but WE AIM TO STOP ALL THE HAULING OF GRAIN AND POULTRY."

Picketing in McLeod county, Minnesota, started on Tuesday, September 27 when farmers from Kandiyohi and Renville counties took up their posts at a point three miles west of Glencoe. They are being aided by McLeod farmers in preventing trucks from going thru. The trucks tried to get thru McLeod county highways when they were stopped in the other counties.

HOLIDAY ASS'N. STOPS PICKETING

The Holiday Association of the county is trying to stop picketing. Many of the farmers who are holding back their grain and livestock are demanding picketing so that trucks will not be able to bring produce through.

The Farmers Holiday Association has been organized in Dawson county, Montana. Several local units have been organized in the county altho picketing is not going to be encouraged by the county officers.

A county wide organization of the Holiday association is being undertaken in Butte county, North Dakota. Several meetings have already been held.

PICKETING IN N. D.

Picketing started in McKenzie county, North Dakota, around Watford City on Wednesday, Sept. 28. All trucks were stopped by the farmers with ropes drawn across the road. Some of the trucks were allowed thru when the farmers showed that they needed money to pay labor, thresh bills, or needed it for food or groceries.

The pickets warned everybody that these restrictions would be tightened. At a meeting on Tuesday night before picketing started Mother Bloor, 70 year old militant fighter in the ranks of the work-ers class, and state organizer of the United Farmers League for North Dakota urged on the farmers to picket.

FARMERS SHOULD BE LEADERS

When one farmer mentioned that Burdick, head of the Holiday Association had warned against picketing, Mother Bloor told the farmers that they should not have a lawyer, as Burdick is, at the head of the movement, but a farmer leader from their own ranks.

At one of the largest meetings held in months farmers of Bottineau county met in the courthouse in Bottineau, North Dakota, on September 26, to organize into the Farmers Holiday association. So large was the crowd at the courthouse that the meeting had to be adjourned to the municipal skating rink. The question of picketing was to be decided on at a later meeting.

ROADS TO STANLEY PICKETED

Thrust Mountrail county, North Dakota, picketing is being carried on intensively. By Thursday of last week all roads leading into Stanley were being picketed. The pickets on a highway are divided into three groups. The first group approached by the truck merely displays a large sign, "STOP—Pickets Ahead." A little further on another group holds a rope across the road with a red flag attached to it. If these two groups are not effective in stopping the trucks another group further on is prepared to stop the trucks with a telephone pole. Perishable products are not being stopped.

FHA IN GRAND FORKS

At a meeting of 200 farmers at Larimore on Friday, September 30 a nucleus of the Farmers Holiday association was formed for Grand Forks county, North Dakota. No strike vote was taken, however.

Between 400 and 500 farmers endorsed a pledge to withhold all non-perishable farm products from the market at a meeting called by the Griggs county Farmers Holiday association in Forman, North Dakota. Township organization is being carried on.

In the vicinity of Devils Lake, North Dakota, farmers are selling only as much grain as is necessary to pay their fall bills. All roads in McLean county, N. D., were covered with pickets, beginning Wednesday, September 28. The picketing was supposed to be temporary in nature and to cover only grain and livestock until further notice. Small deliveries of the picketed products would be made on authorization of the township chairman to obtain money for necessities.

It was also decided to call local meetings in each community to win the support of local farmers for these demands. Since it was growing late, it was decided to adjourn the meeting until Saturday, October 8, when local strike committees will be chosen.

ment was making them sign on the dotted line and he, for one, had had enough of it. He said he had lived in the county for 25 years and had paid for his farm over and over again but now he owed more than ever before. He called for a moratorium on all the debts. He said that he had been called "radical" but he wanted only the constitutional rights that had been guaranteed him.

WE HAVE HAD THE CONSTITUTION

Gonius Laursen, Communist candidate for the State Legislature, said that he wanted more than our constitutional rights. We have them now and we have had them; now we want to live and we've got to fight to do it.

Rodney Salisbury guaranteed the backing of the United Farmers League in the movement and Erik Bert, editor of The News, warned the farmers that they must keep the leadership in their own hands; otherwise they would wake up and find that misleaders had led them into the promised land but into the mire. He said, "What we need is the united action and backing of every impoverished farmer in the county."

Nominations were made for a resolutions committee to draw up a plan of action to be followed by the farmers present and all others of the county as well as of Roosevelt and Daniels county. The committee which was chosen consisted of Hans Hardersen, Communist candidate for sheriff, Thomas Sundstad, president of the Taxpayers Assn., Robert Johnson of McCabe, and K. O. Brendahl of McElroy.

RESOLUTION ADOPTED

Their resolution which was voted upon and adopted point by point by the mass meeting reads as follows:

1. Farmers of Sheridan, Daniels and Roosevelt counties resolve to strike and picket against all collectors and collections by machine companies, of government seed and feed loans, of livestock and chattel mortgages and any other, such as rents and delinquent and current taxes of poor farmers and workers.

2. We demand a moratorium on all debts for at least two years and at the end of that time, if conditions have not placed the farmers on equal footing with other business, then we demand total cancellation.

3. We demand and strike again any renewal of mortgages, signing notes or contracts and this will be strictly enforced.

4. We demand and strike again eviction of any farmer who has been foreclosed and continues to live on his land, should stay on his farm and take the full value of his crops without interference of company or other owners.

Another point was decided upon by the mass meeting which was incorporated in the resolution as follows:

5. There will be a marketing day every other Wednesday for grain and picketing will be undertaken to prevent selling at any other time. There will be no strike on cream and eggs. No livestock will be shipped out of the county but it will be sold for local use. Cash only will be accepted for grain.

It was also decided to call local meetings in each community to win the support of local farmers for these demands. Since it was growing late, it was decided to adjourn the meeting until Saturday, October 8, when local strike committees will be chosen.

So when the mass of people now complain about the conditions, they have nobody but themselves to blame for it, they have always put the small group's best man in to office instead of their own, and could not expect anything else but what they got. All they could expect was a lot of hard work and a miserable small handout, just enough to keep them in working trim and from starving to death.

This voting for the other fellow's best man has developed into a condition where there are at least eleven million people with their dependents, who our elected politicians would actually like to see starve to death, if they would lay down and do it peacefully. They are out of work, non-productive and nobody can make a profit on them, they must be fed somehow, and can't do it themselves. If these people would lay down and die without a fight, that

is just what the small group in power would like to see, but a fight is what they are afraid of; so they hand out a little soup and a few rags for them to wear. This is what we have got so far from voting for the other fellow's best man.

I hear someone say: "This might be the conditions in the nation, but we should stay out of politics and in the county it is different, here we talk that way do it for a purpose. They want to fool the people. You can't stay out of politics, and if you want to get anywhere you must start right at home, start at the bottom, right in your own county and not wait until you are able to elect the president of the U. S.

Every office in the county is nothing but politics, brought right home to you so you can see it. Right here at home we have the two opposing elements, the exploiting and exploited classes. On one side we have the farmers and workers, on the other side we have those who live off the farmers and workers, the bankers, the mortgages, machine agents, elevators, insurance agents, road contractors, store keepers and most of our teachers and preachers of the gospel.

As long as we have these two opposing classes, it should be clear to everybody that a man elected to office can not stay out of politics, he can not be fair to everybody, as some say they want to be, he must make a stand with either one side or the other. If he is elected by the bankers and his crowd, no matter what office he is elected to, he is their best man, and he is there to look after that crowd's interest first of all. Be he an assessor, a treasurer, a sheriff, or a dog catcher. At election time the bankers' crowd tells the farmer to pick their best men, some from one ticket and some from another, stay out of politics, but that crowd never splits their vote, they have their ticket lined up and vote it straight. They don't stay out of politics.

To the farmer it makes all the difference in the world if the county commissioners grab the land away from them for taxes or not, if the sheriff is their sheriff, or the bankers and machine companies sheriff, if he kicks the farmer off the land or protects them. Solving these problems is politics laid right at our door step and it is up to each voter to decide whose interest he want protected, the exploiters or the exploited, and then vote accordingly.

In this county the issue is clear cut. Here it is Communism again capitalism. The capitalist class has shown what they have been able to do, and the people in the county are in a worse condition than they have ever been before. Now the Communists want to get a chance to show what they can do. They want to protect the people who do the work and who are getting poorer and poorer all the time. They are not promising protection, and to the farmers and workers there should be no question on what ticket they should vote in order to vote for the best men. The Communist ticket.

OSCAR CRUMB OF
OUTLOOK PASSES

Oscar Crum of Outlook, passed away about noon Wednesday at the Sheridan Memorial hospital from cancer. He had been a patient there for several months.

Funeral services were conducted from the Outlook hall Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock with the Rev. Gale Anderson of the Plentywood Congregational church officiating, and interment was made in the Outlook cemetery. Arrangements were in charge of the Fulkerson-Nelson mortuary of Plentywood.

Mr. Crumb was born in Richland county, Minnesota, Sept. 27, 1883, being at the time of his death just past 49 years of age. He came to Montana in 1909 and homesteaded north of the present town of Outlook. In 1910 he had typhoid fever and bed sores developed which never healed finally developing into cancer. He had consulted with surgeons in many of the larger hospitals and underwent an operation at Rochester but the malady had progressed so far the operation was of no avail.

Besides the widow five sisters and four brothers survive. One brother resides at Raymond. The others live in Washington and most of them were here during the past summer to see their ailing brother. However they were unable to attend the funeral.

OPEN SEASON ON PHEASANTS FROM OCT. 15 TO NOV. 3

At a regular meeting of the State Fish and Game Commission, held in Helena, Sept. 27, 28, and 29, the following orders were made:

An open season was declared on male Chinese and Mongolian pheasants and on Hungarian partridges of either sex, in the entire state of Montana, with the various exceptions:

All areas embraced with State Game and Bird Preserves shall be closed and others.

In all portions of the state not closed by the above exceptions, the open season on these birds for the year 1932 shall begin with the 30 day of October and end with the 30 day of November, both dates inclusive; the bag limit per day to be five birds, no more than 3 of which may be the male Chinese and Mongolian pheasants; and the possession limit shall be ten birds, no more than six of which may be the male Chinese and Mongolian pheasants.

Several of the sportsmen's clubs thruout the state requested that the Commission open just one species of these birds. However, at the recommendation of J. F. Hendrick, Supt. of the state game farm, at Warm Springs, all areas opened will have both the Hun and pheasant shooting. Shooting at these game birds scatters the coveys and thus prevents inbreeding. It is Mr. Hendrick's opinion that there is no danger of depleting either species in any section of the state through this short open season.

The general big game season—(all and deer) is October 15th to November 15, both dates inclusive. For information as to particular counties sportsmen may write to the Fish and Game Department, Helena, Montana.

Under a big game license, Rocky Mountain Goats may be hunted in that portion of Ravalli county lying west of the Bitter Root river, Oct. 15 to Nov. 15, inclusive. This is the only section of the state open for this sport.

Bear are classed as a game animal. No special permit is needed to hunt them, but one must have a big game license. There is no closed season on bear.

International News

Fascists and Socialists Fight

Vienna, September 30.—Thirty-six persons were injured in street fights between National Socialists (fascists) and Socialist and other workers on the second day of the fascist convention. One policeman was also injured. Later a fight occurred between fascist and Socialist deputies in the Municipal council.

Two Executions In Indo-China

Paris, September 19.—Two executions which took place last July in Indo-China have just become known. Two native revolutionaries Nguen-diuk Trong and Chongkok Lang were sentenced to death and executed on a charge of "participating in a murder for political motives." Details of the case are not known. Immediately before their execution the two steadfast revolutionaries shouted: "Down with the capitalist French republic! Down with imperialism! Long live Communism."

Further Heavy Sentences In Poland

Warsaw, September 19.—The cold terror against the revolutionary working class movement in Poland is continuing mercilessly, but without success. Polish bourgeois class-justice seeks its victims amongst revolutionaries of all ages and lately young students of both sexes have been ruthlessly sentenced on charges of revolutionary activities or Communist propaganda.

In Lodz two young workers have been sentenced to eighteen months hard labor for having taken part in "a demonstration hostile to the state."

Two young girl students were sentenced by the same court to two years hard labor each for having conducted Communist propaganda amongst the fellow pupils.

The court in Lemberg sentenced a young peasant lad named Petr Grib to three years hard labor on a charge of having organized a young Communist group in his village in Western Ukraine.

Heavy Sentences Against Workers In Latvia

Riga, September 19.—The trial of a group of workers charged with being members of the illegal Communist party of Latvia has just concluded. Four of the accused were sentenced to six years hard labor each and a further sentence to one year's imprisonment. The Seym deputy Rutys was also charged together with the other accused, but since then he has been elected a member of the Seym. Special proceedings will be taken against him.

Workers Sentenced

Stockholm, September 17.—The court in Soed-erham has sentenced eight workers to a total of 73 months hard labor for charges in connection with a demonstration against strike breakers on the 29 of July. Even the bourgeois press admitted that the police "batoned and shot at running persons without reason."

Autumn Unemployment Increase Begins

Berlin, September 22.—The latest official figures of the Reich's Institute for Unemployment Insurance show that on the 15 of September there were 5,261,000 unemployed workers registered at the labor exchanges throughout Germany, representing an increase of 38,000 as compared with the 31 of August. Only 659,000 of these unemployed workers are in receipt of unemployment insurance support. The others receive their "crisis" (transitional) benefit or are supported by the local authorities as paupers. Up to the present 200,000 workers are working in the voluntary labor service colonies. Apart from these registered unemployed workers there are between one and two million workers who are not registered as unemployed owing to the fact that they receive no support of any kind.

and 50 pickets showed up, the majority Communists. The group was divided and the picketing began. It was successful the first day. Five loads of grain were turned back, three ran the picket lines, several snuck in by unpicketed by-roads and a number of loads came in after the picketing had stopped that night. For the first day we did quite well.

In the meantime Mr. Wegley and Mr. Moody, editor of the Williston Herald, had begun their scabbing activities. It was noted that Communists turned out full force to picket—that most of the other farmers who had voted to picket were absent for some unaccountable reason. These strike-breakers then told it about town that this picketing was a Communist venture to steal the show, that the Communists were using violence on the picket lines, dumping cream and eggs, all of which were lies. It was charged that I was an outsider from Sioux City trying to breed trouble in Williams county in spite of the fact that several swore I had been a hired hand on Ole Aronsens farm for some time past.

THREATEN ORGANIZER

This group got the papers behind them, a special meeting of the Boy Scouts was held to aid in case trouble occurred. Mr. Moody organized a mob to run me out of town if I continued my activities. I said mob composed of legionnaires and misguided cowboys. I had never been on the street and caution me to be careful, not to wander around alone, etc., because certain elements in town were out to get me. This, because I had outlined at our two meetings the methods Iowa farmers used and suggested that since these had been successful that they might be used here.

The second day, Thursday, only about ten farmers showed up. This time all Communists but two. The non-Communist pickets of the day before had been talked to by the business powers and warned against further participation. Hostility by this time was unbecoming. Even the high school boys were being organized for use against the pickets if the need arose.

REFUSES TO CALL MEETING

Wegley has again refused to call a meeting to get the farmers' views on picketing, afraid that the farmers would vote against him and the State Association's wishes. His tactics are to keep the farmers on the farm, to take all his orders from above without consulting or giving a damn what the farmers, who are the ones faced with immediate pauperization and starvation, think or want.

ANOTHER IDAHO BANK GOES UP

Charity Squad In Boise Ships Unemployed Out of the State

(BY BOB STEELE)

Meridian, Idaho, Sept. 22.—The enclosed clipping will verify what recently appeared in the Producers News about the Liberty party in Idaho.

Since the second bank went up in Boise the farmers' market has been smashed some more.

Loaning money on high priced sheep years ago is what has put the crimp in the banks at present. The banks have been carrying sheepmen's paper for years in the hopes of a price that would make it possible for the paper to be paid off.

LOSSES IN SHEEP RAISING

One sheepman stated at a wool growers convention that he had made a profit of ten cents a head over a period of 10 years. Another large sheepman recently made the statement at a woolgrowers convention at Salt Lake City that the sheepmen are netting a loss of \$2.50 a head.

Local papers are putting out the news that the banks will be reopened soon. "It is hoped," and "it is reported," and so and so is "of the opinion" that another loan from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation is coming up and will save the depositors of the bank. All of this does not put sheepmen and other debtors in a position to pay the banks, however.

ONE BANK LEFT IN BOISE

The remaining bank in Boise is a link in a chain of fifty three banks. Poor fish around here are of the opinion that this chain is stronger than the one that recently went up. Time will tell.

This bank is connected with a parent bank at Salt Lake City and the Salt Lake banks heard reds "whispering" before the Boise banks went up.

It is a criminal offense in Idaho to be of the opinion that a bank is shaky before the bank has collapsed. The Idaho statute on the subject was passed shortly after the Overland National bank of Boise went up some 12 years ago, as a result of loaning money on high priced sheep.

HOOVERCRATS

We refer here to people that howl down Hoover and boost for Roosevelt as Hoovercrats.

There are now over 1,000 registered unemployed in Boise. There are about twice that many unregistered jobless. This is out of a population of 25,000.

A certain period of residence in Idaho during which time the worker has been self supporting entitles him to some relief. As a result of this the charity squad considers a floater a foreigner and starts him for another state. The other states do the same thing. None of the states want to claim the unemployed. Idahoans sent here from other states are returned from whence they come or are moved on to some other state. The charity squads of this city and other cities keep each other informed about the hungry floaters.

Told In Brief

City Council Approves Wage Cuts
Rochester, New York, Sept. 30.—City Manager C. A. Poole and the City Council have approved a slash of five to fifteen per cent in the wages of city employees. School teachers are to have their wages slashed by a "voluntary contribution" of \$300,000. This and the wage cut, together with unemployment for more workers will mean savings of \$630,000.

Ford Cut Wages One Third

Detroit, Mich., September 30.—The Ford Motor company yesterday announced that the minimum wage has been cut from \$6 a day to \$4 a day. This is a cut of 33 and one-third per cent, and fifty per cent below the rates paid in 1920. Thousands of Ford workers are working three or four days a week while thousands of ex-Ford workers are walking the streets jobless and are hungry.

General Motors Corporation has announced that 15,000 office workers will go on a five day week with a corresponding cut in wages. This is more than a cut of ten per cent.

I. C. C. Gives Loans to Railroad

Washington, September 30.—Another loan of \$12,461,350 to the Chicago and Northwestern Railway was approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission. Of this loan \$5,000,000 will be used to pay off fifty per cent of the bank loans made through Kuhn, Loeb and Co., big Wall Street bankers. The remainder will be used to pay off interest and principal on other loans.

RFC Wants to Hide Its Loans

Washington, September 30.—The Reconstruction Finance Corporation has protested the publication of names of banks and other corporations getting loans from it in a letter to South Trimble, Clerk of the House of Representatives. The excuse was that it gets rumored about that those borrowing are in a shaky financial position. The real reason for the protest was to hide from the masses the fact that the RFC is handing out hundreds of millions to the rich while the workers and farmers are deprived of all relief by the federal government. Trimble agreed to stop publication of this information.

Corn Cheaper Than Coal

Corn is now selling at the lowest point in 36 years. Current bids for new No. 4 grades of cash corn, not allowing for husking or hauling, make the grain in western Iowa at present worth \$2.15 a ton.

A big Chicago Grain house stated on September 30 that it was likely that many farmers would use corn for fuel this winter instead of coal since it is at present prices cheaper than the latter.

Hoover Wants to Hush up 20 Per Cent Cut

In order to still the growing revolt among the railroad workers against the new proposed 20 per cent wage cut Hoover issued a statement on September 27 asking that "further discussion of the wage cut be deferred until the end of the year." As the wage cut would not go into effect until February 1 any way, when the present wage agreement expires, Hoover's move is designed to keep as many votes as possible until after election.

Justice Thayer's Home Wrecked

Part of the home of Justice Thayer who sentenced Sacco and Vanzetti to death on April 9, 1927, was wrecked by a bomb on Sept. 27. His wife and a maid in the house were slightly injured.

This may have been an action of agent provocateurs in order to turn public sentiment against the nine Scottsboro boys whose case is to be reviewed by the U. S. Supreme Court on October 18.
